### HELM-MAYO NUPTIALS

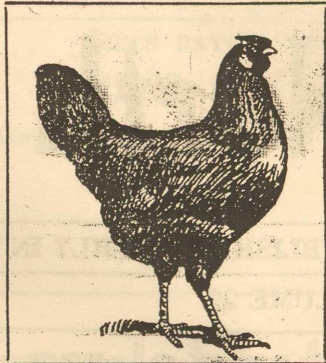
