TAX EXEMPTION CERTIFICATES ARE NOW AVAILABLE

County Agent M. S. Duncan Releases Information Concerning Sale.

County Agent M. S. Duncan states that he has been furnished with the following information concerning

cotton exempt from taxation:
Section 42 of the Amendments to
the Agricultural Adjustment Act reads as follows:

"The Secretary of Agriculture is directed to exempt by regulation from the payment of the tax on the ginning of cotton, as levied under authority of this act, an amount of lint cotton not in excess of one hundred and ten pounds, produced by or for any producer and retain. by or for any producer and retained for domestic use in his house-hold."

Producers who desire to take advantage of this provision are instructed to hold back from the gin the seed cotton in quantity necessary to produce the lint they desire to use in the household and secure one of these applications forms before taking such cotton to the gin.
These forms are expected to be
available in all County Agent's
offices before October 1.

It is important to remember that cotton exempt from the tax on this provision cannot be sold or exchanged for anything of value nor can articles manufactured from it be sold or exchanged for anything or value.

Mr. Duncan has a limited supply of tax-exemption certificates on hand for sale to producers who need to buy. These must be sold at 5c per pound and paid for in cash or cashiers check, no personal check can be accepted.

GOOD COTTON CROP IS PREDICTED FOR

Five-Year Average Is 19,000 Bales; Estimates Around 17,500 This Season.

Up to the middle of this week, the two gins in Henrieta had ginned around 250 bales of cotton from the present crop. Harvesting of the fleecy staple has been retarded somewhat the past few days on account of rain, but with dry weather gathering of the crop will soon be under full swing.

The price range has been around 9% cents per pound, with seed sell-

ing at \$28 per ton.

According to statistics, the fiveyear average production in Clay County is 19,000 bales. 

NO NEED OF A SALES TAX

Advocates of a general sales tax in Texas are obviously planning to make the most of the opportunity that the old age pension amendments seems to give them. With estimates of the annual pension cost ranging from \$4,000,000 to \$6,000,000, and the state's general fund still very much in the red, there is no other way to finance pensions, the sales tax crowd insists, except by the general tax. In view of the fact that most of those who have been advocating the sales tax were among the opponents of the pension amendmnt, this solicitude for the pensioners is something the good faith of which is open to challenge. At the same time, opponents of the sales tax must recognize that old age pensions will give added leverage to the sales tax proposal.

The sales tax is just as unfair, just as indefensible in the economic sense, is it was before the pension amendment was

adopted.

In Missouri, where the sales tax went into affect a faw weeks ago, the citizenship is on the verge of open revolt against it. There is profound dissatisfaction in New Jersey, with the prospect that next year's campaign will have sales tax repeal as its main

The time may come when Texas' finances are in such desperate shape that there is no alternative except to levy a sales tax. Before we reach that stage, however, the program of tax revision which Representative C. M. McFarland is going to sponsor should be given a trial. If Texas can get rid of the tax-dodgers that it has under the existing system, and derive a reasonable amount of revenue from the liquor tax, it will be able, as Mr. McFarland points out, to pay the annual pension bill without resorting to a sales tax. But the opponents of that revenue devise would do well to remain on guard.-Wichita Daily Times.


