Survivors include two sons, R. F. Hise of Southerland, Nebraska, M. K. Hise of Willow Springs; and one daughter, Mrs. P. N. McKinley of Southerland, Nebraska.

## HOLLIS B. MOORE ANNOUNCES FOR COUNTY TAX OFFICE

## Officials Salaries Are Set for 1936 By Commissioners

At a meeting of the Commissioners court of Clay county held December 23, 1935, salaries of the various officers and deputies were adopted for the year 1936. Very few changes were made in the salaries and the county still remains on the fee basis.

The court voted to employ a court house stenographer at a salary of \$600.00 per annum. Miss Artie Dillon of Henrietta, was employed for the position and will do work in the collector's office and other offices as directed by the county judge.

The only outstanding changes in salaries were a cut of \$25 a month for the county attorney, and a raise of \$5 a month for the court house janitor. The salaries are payable in twelve equal installments.

The salaries adopted are as follows:

County Judge, \$1,800 per year.  
County Commissioners, Statutory.  
District Clerk, \$450 per year.  
Sheriff, \$1,560 per year (Sheriff to furnish car and up keep at own expense.)

County Attorney, \$600 per year.  
County Treasurer, near \$700 per year.

Health officer, \$600 per year.  
Court house janitor, \$780 per year.  
Jailor, \$1,200 per year.

Deputy County Clerk, \$1,020 per year.

First Deputy Assessor-Collector, \$1,200 per year.

Second Deputy Assessor-Collector, \$1,020 per year.

Third Deputy Assessor-Collector, \$1,020 per year.

County Auditor, \$1,800 per year.  
County Stenographer, \$600 year.

### Home Demonstration Clubs Notes

#### Style In Our Vegetables

Yes, the 4-H Club girls of Clay county intend to have style in their vegetables during the year 1936. They have style in their wearing apparel so why not have style in their vegetables, and not the same beans and potatoes three hundred and sixty-five days of the year.

The girls shall plant, grow, serve, preserve, and exhibit leafy or green colored and yellow vegetables which consist of the following varieties, mustard, spinach, cabbage, swiss chard, lettuce, chinese cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, brussel sprouts, rape, kale, endive, kohlrabi, cress, New Zealand spinach, asparagus, tender greens, polk salad, English peas, snap field peas, snap beans, carrots, pumpkins, and the yellow squash. Of these varieties listed at least eight will be found growing in each of the girl's gardens.

Children grow better and have more resistance to infections, and adults keep in better health when the diet contains an abundance of vegetables, fruits and milk. That the girls may produce enough of these vegetables for the family, they will grow 145 feet of row space per member of the family.

The girls will preserve at least five containers per member of the family and prepare for exhibit purposes at the county exhibit and on achievement day which will be held in the demonstrator's home; one quart each of the following: English peas, snap beans, and carrots, and a bunch or plate of at least two varieties of fresh vegetables.

The Shannon Home Demonstration Club met January 2, at the home of Mrs. Jep Fry. There were eleven members present. Miss Stewart, county home demonstration agent, gave a demonstration on foundation patterns which was very interesting. Mrs. Jep Fry was appointed as our wardrobe demonstrator and Mrs. Earl McCray our Farm and Food Supply Demonstrator.

After all business was attended to a few minutes were spent in recreation before adjourning.

### Political Calendar for Year Began With First Day in the Year

January 31.—Last day for payment of poll tax or otherwise to qualify for voting by obtaining exemption certificates.

February 10.—Election judges appointed by County Commissioners' Courts.

May 2.—Party primary conventions in voting precincts to elect delegates to county conventions (looking to national conventions to select candidates for President).

May 5.—County convention to elect delegates to State party conventions.

May 26.—Parties hold State conventions in cities selected by respective State executive committees to elect delegates to national conventions.

June 1.—Final date for filing candidacies for all State and district offices, including United States Senator. (Applications filed with State, district and county chairmen, according to office.)

June 8.—State executive committee (Democratic) meets at place of call by State chairman to select place for holding State convention Sept. 8, following second primary. County executive committees also meet.

June 13.—Final date of filing of candidacies for county and precinct offices and district offices composed of single county.

June 15.—County executive committees meet at county seats to provide ballots, assess candidates to pay expenses of primary election and determine whether nominations of county officers shall require majority or plurality of votes.

June 20.—Final date for payment of ballot fees by candidates.

June 22.—Committee of county executive committees prepare official ballot for first primary.

June 25.—First date for filing of first statement of campaign expense.

July 5.—Final date for voters who have moved from one county to another to procure new exemption certificates for voting in first primary. (Since July 5 is Sunday and July 4 is a holiday, it will be necessary for such persons to appear by July 3.)

July 6.—Opening date for absentee voting in first primary by voters who are away from counties of their legal residence.

July 10.—Opening date for absentee voting in first primary by voters in county of residence.

July 13.—First day for filing second statement of campaign expense.

July 17.—Final date for filing second campaign expense statement.

July 20.—Final date to obtain corrected poll tax receipt by persons who have removed from one precinct to another in cities of 10,000 or more inhabitants.

July 22.—Last date for absentee voting in first primary.

July 25.—First primary election. Precinct conventions. First statement of expense of second primary may be filed.

July 27.—Final statement of first primary expense may be filed.

July 28.—Final date for filing statement of first primary expense.

August 1.—County conventions meet to elect delegates to district and State conventions.

August 2.—Final date for obtaining re-issue of exemption certificates where voters have moved from one county to another. Last day upon which nominee may decline nomination.

August 3.—First day for absentee voting in counties away from legal residence.

August 4.—Final date for filing statement of first primary expense.

August 7.—First day for absentee voting in second primary in county of residence.

August 8.—Final date upon which State executive committee may meet at Austin to canvass returns of first primary and prepare ballot for second primary.

August 10.—Second statement of second primary expense may be filed.

August 14.—Final date for filing second statement of second primary expense.

August 17.—Final date for voters to obtain corrected tax receipts in cases of removal from one precinct to another providing removal was prior to delivery of lists of certified voters to election judges.

August 19.—Last day for absentee voting prior to second primary.

August 22.—Second primary election.

August 24.—Final statement of second primary expense may be filed.

September 1.—Final date for filing statement of second primary expense.

September 7.—State executive committee meets at place of State convention.

September 8.—State convention meets to announce a platform of principles and announce nominees for State offices.

October 14.—First day for absentee voting in general election outside of county of residence. Last day upon which nominee may decline nomination.

October 19.—First day for absentee voting in general election in county of residence.

October 31.—Last day for absentee voting in general election.

November 3.—General election.

November 13.—Final date for filing statement of campaign expense with County Judge of county of candidates residence.

November 18.—Secretary of State opens and counts returns of general election for all offices except Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

January 11.—Electors convene at Austin to cast ballots for President and Vice-President of the United States.

January 12.—Forty-Fifth Legislature convenes and canvasses returns on election of Governor and Lieutenant Governor on first day.

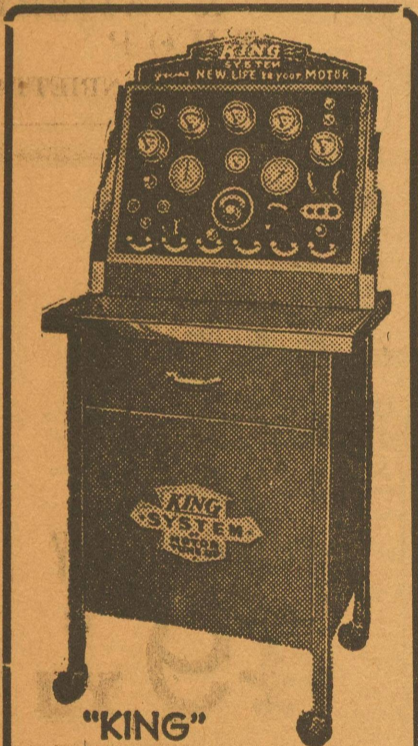

## BUSINESS GAINS, RECORD BANK DEPOSITS SHOW WHETHER GOV'T SPENDING HAS BEEN WASTEFUL

Asked his "opinion of the public reaction to the drive of Big Business on President Roosevelt," in a radio interview, Chairman James A. Farley of the Democratic National Committee, replied:

"Political history answers that question. Big Business has fought every attempt to curb its raids from the beginning of our Government. It fought President Jackson when he demanded independence for the Government from bank control. It fought the graduated income tax and the Sherman anti-trust law as bitterly as it is fighting this administration's efforts in the same direction. In turn it attacked all these measures as unconstitutional, anarchistic, confiscatory, socialistic and revolutionary. And yet the people, in every case, calmly voted the requisite legislation. On each of these occasions we had the same fulmination by corporation lawyers, giving service in exchange for their fat fees; the same screeching by that part of the press responsive to the same influences. The reaction this time is not different from what it has been in the past."

Answering the inquiry as to the charge that the President "broke campaign promises," Chairman Farley replied:

"What promises? We promised that nobody should starve; hasn't he lived up to that, and so incurred the equally baseless charge of extravagance? He promised a stable currency and the American dollar is the most stable currency in the world. Isn't the national credit better today than when President Hoover—the apostle of things as they were—let Government Bonds sink below par? Now our bonds are at a premium and the whole foreign world is sending its gold over here and investing in our stocks, simply because they regard our future as more secure than it is at home?"

"The promise to balance the budget is in process of fulfillment; nobody thinks that can be done overnight. The national deficit was not invented by the Democrats. We inherited a three billion dollar deficit from the Hoover administration. The regular expenditures of the Government—excluding the relief expenditures—are hundreds of millions less than when Roosevelt came to the White House. The carrying charges on the national debt are less than they were; we are paying less in interest on the larger debt than we were paying before the depression. It has cost a lot of money to supply relief but I have yet to hear of any charge of graft or other corruption. There are no little black bags with hundred thousand dollar bribes in them. Perhaps here and there some fellow has chiseled 4 dollars worth of dole groceries or has been paid a dollar or two for work that need not have been done. What of it? If every incident of that sort had to be examined with a microscope before relief was given, red tape would have choked the destitute to death.

"Certainly not," replied Mr. Farley when asked if money spent on non-productive projects was all wasted. "If you want to know what became of this money, look at the record bank deposits, representing savings and investment capital of the whole people. The money has been turned over and over in purchases, in wages, in production of all sorts. It is what generated the present uplift in business. It started the wheels of industry to turning again and as that process goes on with constantly increasing momentum, the Gov-

ernment's income gets bigger; its relief expenditures grow smaller and the balancing of the budget automatically gets nearer and nearer."

## DECISION LEAVES ADMINISTRATION OWING MILLIONS DOLLARS TO FARMERS WITH CONTRACTS MADE FOR THIS YEAR

### Congress Working to Pass New Legislation to Take Place of Wrecked AAA

The AAA plan set up by the federal government to reduce crop surpluses and give the farmers a larger share of the nation's income was brought to a sudden stop on Tuesday of this week by action of the United States Supreme Court. The court's decision affected cotton, tobacco, wheat, corn, hogs, sugar, rice, peanuts, rye, milk, flax, barley, cattle and potatoes. The Supreme court held the powers the federal government was using had been reserved to the states by the constitution, while the government had relied upon its claim that the plan was constitutional under the "general welfare" clause. The United States treasury, for the time being at least, has stopped collection of all processing taxes and also the payment of benefits to the farmers. However, it is believed that congress may later appropriate funds to pay farmers under existing crop control commitments. All 1936 contracts made by the farmers will probably go into the discard.

Clay county farmers who have been under the Bankhead cotton law regulations, are now free to plant any crop and as many acres as they wish, unless new legislation is enacted. If the government should try to enforce the Bankhead act, an appeal to any federal court would bring a halt to such action.

The 6 to 3 Supreme court decision which demolished it, leaves the AAA owing some \$283,000,000 to farmers for performance under existing crop reduction contracts.

Local opinion appears to be divided as to the effect of the court decision on the agricultural welfare of Clay county, due to the uncertainty of the action which will be taken by the nation's leaders in

working out a solution of the problem which now confronts them.
