TOTAL POLL TAXES PAID IN COUNTY IS HIGHEST SINCE '29

Poll tax payments for 1936, which closed January 31, reached 3,139 by midnight Friday, according to W. H. Douglass, assessor and collector for Clay county. Poll tax exemptions were issued to 164 voters. The total number of poll taxes paid this year is the best since 1929.

Mr. Douglass also reports \$78,425.06 current taxes and \$7,702.44 delinquent taxes now collected.

Named Loveliest Mother of West In National Photograph Contest

Mrs. John Schwend, 87, resident of Clay county for 62 years, died at her home here at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist church in Henrietta at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The Rev. E. L. Moody, pastor, conducted the services and burial was in Hope cemetery under the direction of Moore Funeral Home.

Mrs. Schwend was born near Hannibal, Mo., in 1849. Before her marriage to Mr. Schwend in 1866 she was Miss Mary Taliferro. In 1874 they moved to Texas and settled on a ranch in the northern part of Clay county. When the county seat was moved from Cambridge to Henrietta they came to Henrietta and it has been the family home since. Mr. Schwend, a union veteran of the civil war, died in Henrietta, 19 years ago.

During her long residence in Clay county, Mrs. Schwend had been active in civic and religious affairs. She had been an active member of the First Baptist church since she was 16 years of age. She was typical of the old school of the early west and in 1930 she was chosen as "the loveliest mother" in the western group in a national contest conducted by the National Photographers association of the United States and Canada.

She was the mother of 10 children; six of whom survive. They are Mrs. George Cunningham, B. P. Schwend and Mrs. Lee Street, Henrietta; J. M. Schwend, Dallas; Mrs. Frances LeBus, Gladewater, and Mrs. J. C. Terrell, Wichita Falls. Mrs. F. P. Webb of Petrolia and H. H. Schwend of Henrietta died several years ago and two children died in infancy. Twenty two grandchildren including Glenn Cunningham of Bowie, Herbert Cunningham of Benjamin, Mrs. Jack Kerbow of Olney, Mrs. R. W. Watkins, John Terrell and Mrs. Rayworth Huff of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Jack Porter of Weslaco, Mrs. Sam Roberson of Petrolia, John Burton Schwend of Indianapolis, Ind., Willie Lou, Jake, Jr., and Howard LeBus of Gladewater, Frederick and Mary Jane Schwend of Dallas, Jesse and John Cunningham, James Schwend, Mrs. J. R. Ingram, Edna Nell, Louise, Marie and Lee Street, Jr., and thirteen great-grandchildren are also among the survivors.

DEATH CLAIMS TWO PROMINENT BYERS PIONEER CITIZENS

Within a few hours the lives of two of Byers' first citizens were closed in deaths Friday afternoon, January 31, of Mrs. J. W. Harding and of R. P. Grogan early Saturday morning, February 1.

Mrs. Harding, who came to north Clay county in 1892 as the wife of the late J. W. Harding, foreman of the Byers Tree ranch, was killed instantly about 2:45 o'clock Friday afternoon when her Buick sedan overturned as she was crossing the pasture between her home four miles northeast of Byers and the home of her son, G. H. Harding. She had been a prominent leader in business and community affairs during the town's entire history, and at her husband's death in 1912 had taken over the management of his farming and stock raising properties. She was a member and active leader in the First Baptist church of Byers, and a director in the First National Bank. She is survived by seven brothers, Frank and J. D. Smyers of Byers; Dick Smyers of Iowa Park; John Smyers of Temple; Will Smyers of Ryan; Joe Smyers of Arlington; one half-brother, L. C. Smyers of Byers; two sisters, Mrs. George Lee of Wichita Falls; and Mrs. John Grogan of Shamrock; seven children, G. H., Dru and Worsham Harding of Byers; John Harding of McClean; Mrs. M. E. Harrison and Mrs. Floyd Smith of Byers; and Mrs. Spurgeon McClung of Pueblo, Colorado; and 15 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 Sunday afternoon from the First Baptist church, and burial was at Riverside cemetery in Byers.

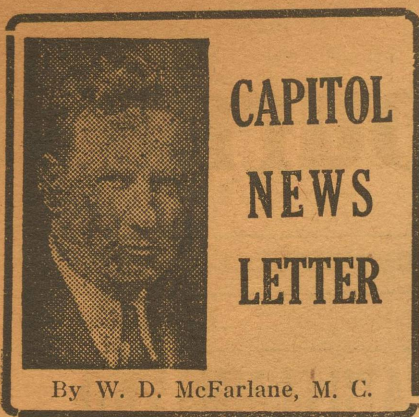
R. P. Grogan, Pioneer

Mr. Grogan, who died early Saturday morning after having been ill for several weeks with heart disease, was born in Brownstown, West Virginia, Sept. 19, 1860, and came to north Clay county with his father in 1874, settling first in the Charlie section, but moved east to Benvenue after a few months because of Indian depredations. He married Myra Jones in 1888, and operated a general mercantile store and postoffice at Benvenue until 1895, when he began operation of a store at Sugden, Indian territory. The first telephone line in this part of the state was built between his Sugden and Benvenue stores.

When the town of Byers was established on the Byers ranch properties, in 1905, Mr. Grogan went into established on the Byers ranch property as a general merchant store there, one of the first business enterprises in Byers. His life was the history of this region, in whose affairs he was always a

CAPITOL NEWS LETTER

New Taxes

Monday the Senate by a vote of 75 to 19 overrode the President's veto on the Adjusted Service Certificate bill, which veto had been overridden by the House on Friday by a vote of 324 to 61.

On Wednesday the President transmitted to the Speaker of the House the Bureau of Budget's recommendation for an appropriation of \$2,237,000,000 with which to pay the bonus baby bond issue. The President has repeatedly stated that new taxes must be levied in case payment is made. Congressman Patman and his steering committee met Saturday to formulate plans to fight for payment through the issuance of new money rather than payment through bonds, the interest of which would cost tax payers more than \$2,000,000,000 additional to pay the \$2,000,000,000 debt. This course would require this much additional new taxes to pay the big bankers who have the free use of the Government's credit. There is a strong block in the House and the Senate demanding payment through the Patman plan which provides safe limitations, backed with adequate gold and silver reserve now in the Treasury which plan would save the two billion dollars in interest and eliminate any necessity for additional taxes to pay this indebtedness.

AAA Decision

It now seems assured that additional taxes must be levied with which to finance the farm program and to replace the processing tax revenues lost because of the AAA Supreme Court decision. Legislation has already been submitted in both House and the Senate to replace the AAA Act and early action is promised from both committees in reporting same for the consideration of the Congress. The Frazier-Lemke Farm Mortgage refinancing bill H. R. 2066, now has 213 of the 218 signatures required to discharge the committee and force this bill before Congress. The real friends of the farmer are earnestly working to force immediate consideration of this legislation. It is expected that this legislation will be approved in the House by a large majority as soon as same is considered. The different farm organizations are backing this legislation.

The Calendar

The House has spent all this week considering the Interior Department Appropriations bill. This measure was finally passed by the House Friday and sent to the Senate. On Thursday Representative McGroarty of California, made a bitter fight against appropriations for Indians and his amendment to practically strike out their entire appropriation for this Department was approved in the Committee by a vote of 36 to 21 which action was later disapproved in the House by a vote of 305 to 28.

The Senate passed the baby bond bonus bill over the President's veto on Monday and appropriated \$7,369 additional to complete the Munitions investigation by the Nye Committee on Thursday. The Senate was not

Does Your Meal Planning Become Monotonous?

If meal planning becomes monotonous, let's make a checking game affair of it—checking to see if the menus planned are adequate to supply the least amount of food needed daily by an individual to furnish vitamins and minerals. Here is the pattern to follow that the individual may have the food requirements that are necessary for the best of health and to be well nourished: Vegetables, 3 servings (serving is one half cup), one of leafy or green and yellow in coloring, one serving of starchy, and one serving of other vegetables; fruits two servings, with tomato or citrus fruit at least 3 times per week; milk one pint for each adult, one quart for each child, but preferably one quart for each member of the family; butter, one tablespoon, preferably more protein, (other than milk) two servings of meat or eggs or cheese or nuts or dried beans and peas; grains, at least one serving of a whole grain; and then fats, sweets and other grains (flour and cereals) in addition to above. If you can check these foods off each day you have won. Housewives seem to have the habit of using just bolted wheat flour altogether in making their breads while there is any number of flour that maybe used as the whole wheat flour, and cornbread (not bolted), which contains more nutrients than the bolted flour and cornmeal. When flour and meal is bolted the bran is removed and along with it goes the vitamins and minerals of the wheat and corn grain.
