Already some of the finest experts in the field have signed up for many of the various contests, and the entries for this occasion promise to include some of the world's finest entertainers. Those attending the recent rodeo, held Saturday evening, June 13th will recall that the show at that time was attended by the largest crowd ever assembled for such an entertainment in this entire section, and the arrangements carried out at that time more than met with the hearty approval of the vast throng which enjoyed every moment of the entertainment.

The judges for the coming rodeo will be some of the best known ranchers and stockmen of the state and south, and this fact is also bringing many here who know in advance that they will get just what they earn in the way of rewards. Messrs. Hapgood and Cunningham state they also have secured some of the finest stock for the rodeo that can be found, including wild horses, Brahma steers, etc., and it is certain that with the best of riders, ropers, bulldoggers, etc., those attending will be more than well entertained.

## THORNBERRY, ROCK SPRINGS HELD A BOND ELECTION

Thornberry and Rock Springs school districts held bond elections last Saturday, June 20th.

Thornberry's issue was for \$3,000 for the purpose of building a teacherage and making repairs on the school building.

Rock Springs issue was for \$1,000 for rebuilding their school building. Both issues carried by a large majority. These buildings will be completed by the coming school term.

Bonds for Dean Dale and Buffalo Springs for the purpose of building gymnasiums have been approved by the Attorney General's department, and are now registered at the Comptroller's department.

The State Board of Education meets July 13th, and will either buy the bonds or waive its option and allow them to be sold to local buyers.

## Democrats Enjoy Hospitality Of The City of Philadelphia

The national democratic convention, which opened in the city of Philadelphia Tuesday, officially, is being attended by the largest gathering of delegates and prominent democrats from over the entire nation that has ever assembled on such an occasion during the past fifty years, it stated by the reports coming out of the Quaker City.

The keynote address by Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, temporary chairman of the convention, and the splendid address by Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas on Wednesday evening, which was also broadcast over radio, was another masterpiece. Senator Robinson was the vice presidential nominee back in 1928, it will be remembered, and is now floor leader in the national senate, one of the most responsible positions in the country, even surpassing that of any other official of the party outside that of the President, himself, since it is the senate majority leader who directs the carrying out of all legislation sponsored by the President and party leaders.

It is thought that President Roosevelt's acceptance address will be broadcast this evening (Friday, June 26th) over a nation-wide hook-up, and the entire nation will hear what he has to say regarding the coming campaign and the democratic platform as already announced.

## 241 Subsidy Checks Received At Office Of County Agent

Relative to the amount of acreage a producer will receive pay for when diverted from cotton acreage we have this information:

"Thirty-five per cent of the cotton soil depleting base, except that if such base is five acres or less, payment may be made for diverting all or any part of such acreage not to exceed 2 acres."

Regarding gains that have been harvested and followed by summer legumes in order to qualify as soil conserving the following information has been received:

"The acreage occupied by wheat planted as a winter cover crop, and harvested, then followed by summer legumes will count as soil conserving."

In this case it is assumed that a normal crop of legumes must be produced on land from which small grains have been harvested in order for such land to qualify as soil conserving acreage.

Two hundred and forty-one Subsidy checks have been received. Producers are requested not to come for these checks until notice is received to the effect that they have a check. Notices have been mailed to each producer who has a check in the County Office.

These chicks seemed as though their bones were not developing and had some eye infections which is due to a diet lacking in vitamins A and D, but after giving them the cod liver oil they immediately recovered.

#### GEORGE H. SHEPPARD FOR STATE CONTROLLER

George H. Sheppard who is seeking re-election at the Democrat-primary on July 25, 1936, presents a record of achievement during his term of office unexcelled by that of and Comptroller in the history of the State.

Through the installation of proper bookkeeping systems under Mr. Sheppard's supervision, proper safeguards are placed around the State funds. By careful study and preparation of adequate enforcement measures and continued diligent efforts, motor fuel tax collections during the past three year period have increased over seven million dollars, and it is estimated that revenue from this source during the Centennial Year will reach a new height of forty million dollars.

Cigarette tax receipts during the past year increased approximately \$300,000.00, and it is estimated that collections for the year 1936 will pass \$5,000,000.00.

Cross Receipts taxes were increased from \$8,843,706.00 in 1934 to \$11,136,164.00 in 1935, and gross production on crude oil from \$8,016,000.00 in 1935 compared to \$6,081,827.00 in 1934.

Records show that collection of revenues made by Mr. Sheppard's department for the benefit of the Availabe School Fund has increased from \$9,591,567.00 in 1933 to \$17,963,882.00 in 1935, an increase of \$8,372,315.00. During that period the per capita apportionment has been increased from \$16.00 to \$17.50, a \$5.00 unpaid per capita deficit has been paid off, and a balance of \$3,886,888.00 was left in the fund at the end of the year 1935. At the same time ad valorem tax revenue for school purposes has been decreased from 35c to 25c.

The importance to the people in the selection of a State Comptroller is very great, and surely the record of George H. Sheppard in past performance and his honesty and efficiency in the administration of his duties should warrant his re-election.

The Goodenought home, near the high school is being given a fresh coat of paint which adds much to the looks as well as value of this fine piece of residence property.

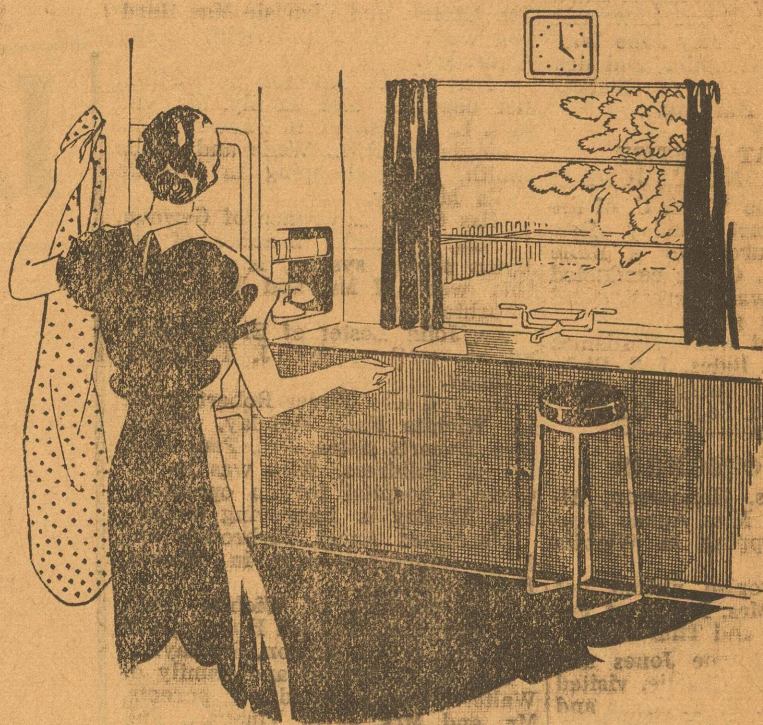
Mrs. F. R. Wood is having an additional room added to her home, near the high school, and making much to her property, and will also have it repainted before the

A. J. Harmon is another who is making interior improvements in his residence property in the north west section of the city.

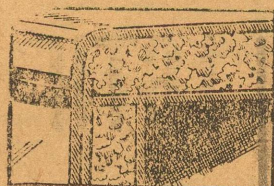

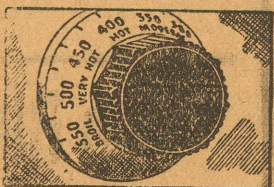

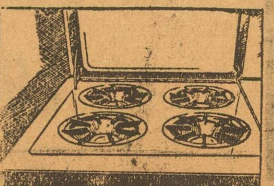

## "ANGER LOSES IN LOGIC WHAT IT GAINS IN HEAT"

"When men are angry, logic often flies out the window," observes an editorial in the financial section of The New York Times. "Some criticism has been applied by President Roosevelt when condemning practices that brought about the 1929 collapse and have since retarded recovery, and that criticism, along with the loss of accustomed influence at Washington, has created bitter resentment of a very personal kind.

"But this resentment frequently loses in logic what it gains in heat. Attacks on the New Deal have demonstrated this on many occasions. Angry critics must go to extreme lengths, which wind them up in glaring contradictions.

"The proceedings at Cleveland seemed to illustrate this quite well. The keynote address at the Republican convention was delivered by a senator who has voted for almost every New Deal measure. The Hoover address was a revamping of the 'rugged individualism' theme which is the very thing that most business men are striving so hard to change for more intelligent cooperation."
