Petrolia Visited By Big Fire Last Sunday

The grocery store of Mr. R. W. Mitchell at Petrolia was burned to the ground in the fire which started at about 7:30 o'clock Sunday morning and raged at will for about two hours.

The building belonged to Roy Fultz of Memphis. The total loss of which with stock amounted to about \$4000.00, a part of which was covered by insurance.

Roy Brazil Henrietta's newly appointed fireman, was seriously injured while hurrying over the fifteen miles of rough road from Henrietta to Petrolia when the Henrietta fire truck was overturned.

The fire was kept from spreading by absence of wind and by a 100 yard bucket brigade from a nearby filling station, water from which was used on the K. T. McDonald, dry goods and groceries next door.

Fire equipment from Wichita Falls finally put the fire out with the aid of water from H. W. Perkins private water system and water brought in on the truck.

Brazil received three broken ribs and other injuries when the truck overturned 6 miles out of Petrolia at the north end of the four-mile lane. Brazil was pinned under the truck. His injuries were not considered critical.

John Pryor, who was riding on the truck, was thrown clear of the machine and escaped injury.

Dear Mr. McFarlane:

I have your letter of August 4.

I have not forgotten your help in May 1933. The Test that year was the third that had been attempted by the U. S. Bureau of the Census. On account of the volume of this work, that Bureau, unless furnished additional help, could not complete the investigation. And, unless the investigation was completed, no statements could be made as to registration in Texas.

I appreciate very much the interest you took in the matter at that time, and the help that you and other Representatives rendered in securing a completion of this test, which resulted in the admission of Texas into the U. S. Registration Area.

One of the many benefits derived is that in the last few days we have received from the Bureau of the Census, 84,000 postage free envelopes, and 40,000 certificates of registration, which will place the Texas Bureau in position to notify the Texas mothers that their babies' births have been registered.

I want to thank you for the interest you took in the Texas Bureau while you were in the Texas Senate. For, although it is one of the most important Bureaus connected with the State government, it is so small that it usually received very little attention.



Q. Why has all the fuss been made about placing the Buffalo Bill statue on the Centennial grounds at Dallas, A. G., Columbia, Mo.

A. Claiming he was a Union Spy during the Civil War and never identified with Texas in a way to receive such an honor, a citizen of Austin sought an injunction to prevent erection of the statue, which was presented to the Centennial by the sculptress. The injunction was refused and the statue erected.

Q. Did Stephen F. Austin ever advertise for Texas colonists... S. G., Austin.

A. He advertised extensively in newspapers throughout the Mississippi and Ohio river valleys, setting forth fully the terms and conditions.

Q. What were the "Turtle Bayou resolutions?" M. P. Groesbeck.

A. Following the actions of Col. John D. Bradburn in enforcing certain costume regulations and in imprisoning W. B. Travis and Patrick C. Jack, about 160 Texans organized for resisting Bradburn. Fearing their action might be regarded as revolutionary, they passed resolutions at Turtle Bayou declaring they were not rebelling against Mexico, but cooperating with Santa Anna in his revolt against Bustamante.

Q. Where is Llano Estacado and why is it so called? E. R., Llano.

A. It is an area about 150 miles wide and extending about 250 miles from the Canadian river south to the breaks of the Colorado, so named because Coronado staked his passage across the plains with white flags in order to be able to find his way back.

Clay County Home Demonstration Council to Meet

The Clay County Home Demonstration Council will meet in the home demonstration agent's office for an all day meeting Saturday, August 22 at 9:00 a. m. The morning and early part of the afternoon will be devoted to making a mattress while at 2:30 the chairman of the council will call a regular monthly business session. Visitors are welcome.

My Work As a Wardrobe Demonstrator

My work as a wardrobe demonstrator is told by Mrs. C. J. Wilcoxen, Wardrobe demonstrator of the Charlie Home Demonstration Club.

"I have been in home demonstration club work for several years but this is my first year as a wardrobe demonstrator. I have enjoyed the work very much. It has helped me out in different ways I began the work in September, 1935. This is a few of the ways in which it has helped me.

"I didn't pay a great deal of attention to the material I was buying so long as I liked the color or pattern, so now since I have studied more about materials I find that the brand, quality, and the design mean a lot. It is also true in everything that we buy. The proper care of clothing needs a great deal of attention as it prolongs the life of garments. To keep them in good condition in proper places they look much nicer and are ready any time we need them. As I have planned our wardrobe according to our needs I find that it is much easier, saves time and trouble so that I won't have all of my sewing on hand at one time.

"As I was planning my clothes I arranged it so each member of the family would have separate places for their clothing and this is the most convenient method. I placed hanging rods low enough for my two small children to reach their own clothing as it saves me much time and it also teaches them to care for their own clothing while they are young. My clothes closet was an old bathroom about 2 feet square. First we built shelves across one side 6 feet high and 3 feet wide to keep folded clothing, shoes and hats. We also built above the hanging rods shelves for old magazines and the like. We find that a well arranged closet is most convenient and can be had with practically little or no expense.

"My foundation pattern has been a great help to me the several times that I have used it. My sewing is not a worry as it was before I had my pattern. We have 11 cooperators that seem to be very interested. There has been 11 patterns started, some are not quite complete but will be soon. All that have finished their patterns have used them and like them fine. The entire club has enjoyed the work very much.
