### Rehabilitation Loans Being Made

Rehabilitation loans for the new crop year are now being authorized by the Resettlement administration, but lack of funds requires the number and amount to be more restricted than during the past year, it was announced today by an announced today by announced toda

restricted than during the past year, it was announced today by S. D. Johnson, county supervisor for Wichita, Clay and Archer counties. "New borrowers in drouth or flood areas will receive what we term emergeacy loans, for purchase of seed, feed and supplies for human subsistence," the supervisor said. "We are not authorized to make any new "standerd rehabilitation" loans, which are for purchase of teams and equipment, as Fore, Jr. of Floresville, Charles K. Devall of Mt. Vernon, and myself. 
