A large crowd assembled in Henrietta, Saturday, October 10 to see the 23 calves on exhibit by the 4-H and FFA boys. These calves were brought in in the morning, cleaned up and placed on exhibit. At 12:30 the boy exhibitors and their dads assembled at the White Rose Cafe where they were guests at a luncheon given by the Henrietta and Clay County Chamber of Commerce. 48 people attended this luncheon. Interesting talks were given by Mr. Charles Graham, President Chamber of Commerce; Oral Jones, Vice-President City National Bank, Wichita Falls and Donley Suddath, local attorney. After the luncheon, the calves were put in the show ring and placed by the following judges: G. R. McNeil, County Agent, Wichita County; G. R. Schumann, County Agent, Archer City; D. A. Adams, County Agent, Young County and H. S. Myers, and George Spivey. There were 11 calves which were judged as being of sufficient quality to enter the Centennial Livestock Show to be held in Dallas, November 7 to 14. ## Governor Allred For Amendment No. 4

A plea to Texas voters to adopt Amendment Number four on the November 3rd ballot, was made here this week by Governor James V. Allred.

This proposed Constitutional Amendment would remove pardoning power from the hands of the Governor to those of a non-partisan Board. At the present time the Governor has absolute power in clemency matters.

"It is not fair to the convicts nor to the public," Gov. Allred said, "and no governor has the time to give the proper attention to each case. It is a full-time job and every convict's case should be subject to review without the necessity of bringing influence to bear. Prior to my election as Governor I advocated this change in our basic law and since I have been in the office I am more convinced than ever that it should be adopted."

## Auto Crash Breaks Local Farmers Back

Fred Moser, Henrietta farmer, was seriously if not fatally injured Wednesday afternoon just west of Henrietta when the car in which he was riding crashed into a ditch and overturned.

In the car with Mr. Moser was his brother Pete. They were returning home from a visit in Wichita Falls. When they were about two and one-half miles from the city, they pulled over to the left side of the road to pass a parked automobile. The car skidded from control, spun into the ditch, and turned over.

The two were brought to Wichita General hospital in a Henrietta Ambulance, summoned by spectators of the accident. John Lowry of the state highway department escorted the ambulance in.

Attaches at the hospital said that Fred Moser was paralyzed from the middle of his back down because the 11th and 12th vertebrae were fractured and exerting pressure on the spinal cord. He and Pete Moser both sustained cuts and bruises.

Mr. Tom Vickey and family of Byers, who was seriously injured in an accident Sept. 28 at Dallas Texas, is reported much improved and hope to be out of the hospital soon.

### Mr. Lewis Turner Funeral Held Oct. 1.

Mr. Lewis Turner, for 55 years, a citizen of Clay County, died at his house near Vashti; Wednesday September 30, after an illness of three months.

Lewis Turner was born Dec. 1, 1853, in the State of Illinois. At the time of his death was 83, years 10 months. Mr. Turner was married to Miss Frances D. Wiggins, who preceded him in death 2 years. To this union were born the following children who survived him: Mrs. Bettie Chappel, John Turner, Mrs. Rosa Perkins, Mrs. Ola Pierce, of Justin, Texas, Mrs. Hattie Tims and Lewis Turner of Brownfield, Texas, ten grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

The funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Oct. 1 in the Methodist church at Vashti, with Rev. Tom Mayfield of Joy, conducting the services. Burial was in the Vashti cemetery.

### MR. B. H. FAMBROUGH BURIED TUESDAY OCT. 13.

B. H. Fambrough a long time resident of Byers died at his home three miles north of Byers Monday evening, Oct. 13.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Baptist church, of which he had been a member for many years. The Rev. Stewart O'Dell, pastor of the Byers Methodist church officiated. The following members of the Byers Masonic Lodge were pallbearers; Hiram Vaughter, Ansel Yarbrough, T. F. Warren, Worsham Harding, Guy Harding, and Wallace Ligon. He was buried in the Byers cemetery with Masonic honors.

Mr. Fambrough was a well known farmer in Clay county, having resided in the Byers community for 24 years. He was born near Atlanta, Ga. Jan. 5, 1859, and died at the age of 77. He came to Texas in 1879 at the age of 20, and settled in Collin Co., later moving to Sanger, Texas. He later lived at Era, and in Dallas Co., for three years. He then spent 2 years at Burkburnett, coming from that place to Byers. He was married to Miss Nora Cason at Denton, Texas Aug. 18, 1891. Three sons and a daughter were born to the couple. He is survived by his wife; one son, Britton, of San Francisco, his daughter, Mrs. Beulah Gregory of Gainsville, Texas and by 2 grandchildren. Mr. Fambrough was prominent in community affairs until something more than a year ago; since which time he has been in ill health.

### Plans Menus

"By planning balanced menus as demonstrated by our home demonstration agent, I have become conscious of what a balanced meal of the day should consist of, that is on serving each leafy, green, or yellow vegetables, potatoes, and one of vegetables other than leafy, green, or yellow and tomatoes; two servings of fruit daily, one of these citrus or tomatoes; two servings of protein; 1 pint to a quart of milk daily; 1 whole grain cereal daily; and a serving of at least a teble-spoonful of butter" says Mrs. J. M. Turner, Doss Home Demonstration Club. Mrs. Turner added, knowing that the above foods should be had by each individual daily that the diet may have the required vitamins and minerals that protect our bodies it is easy to take an inventory of what is on hand thereby knowing what to buy that we may have adequate foods for the family.

### Makes Bulletin File

From an oblong oatmeal box covered with attractive colored designed paper Mrs. J. M. Turner, Doss Home Demonstration Club has made a most attractive file for her bulletins. Mrs. Turner cut one end of the box, then cut out an oval shape piece about four inches deep on one side, a hole was put in the back side so that the file may be hung on the wall. This file is most convenient but most of all it serves as "a place" for the bulletins.

### Makes Recipe File

Rather than digging in a drawer for a specific recipe Mrs. W. J. Wheat, Doss Home Demonstration Club has made a recipe file which is of oilcloth in the form of a large envelope. Inside the oilcloth envelope are manilla envelopes arranged and labeled alphabetically with recipes as Beverages with beverage recipes, Bread with all bread recipes etc. Mrs. Wheat finds that for her this is a most convenient and time saving method of filing her recipes as well as a means of preserving them.

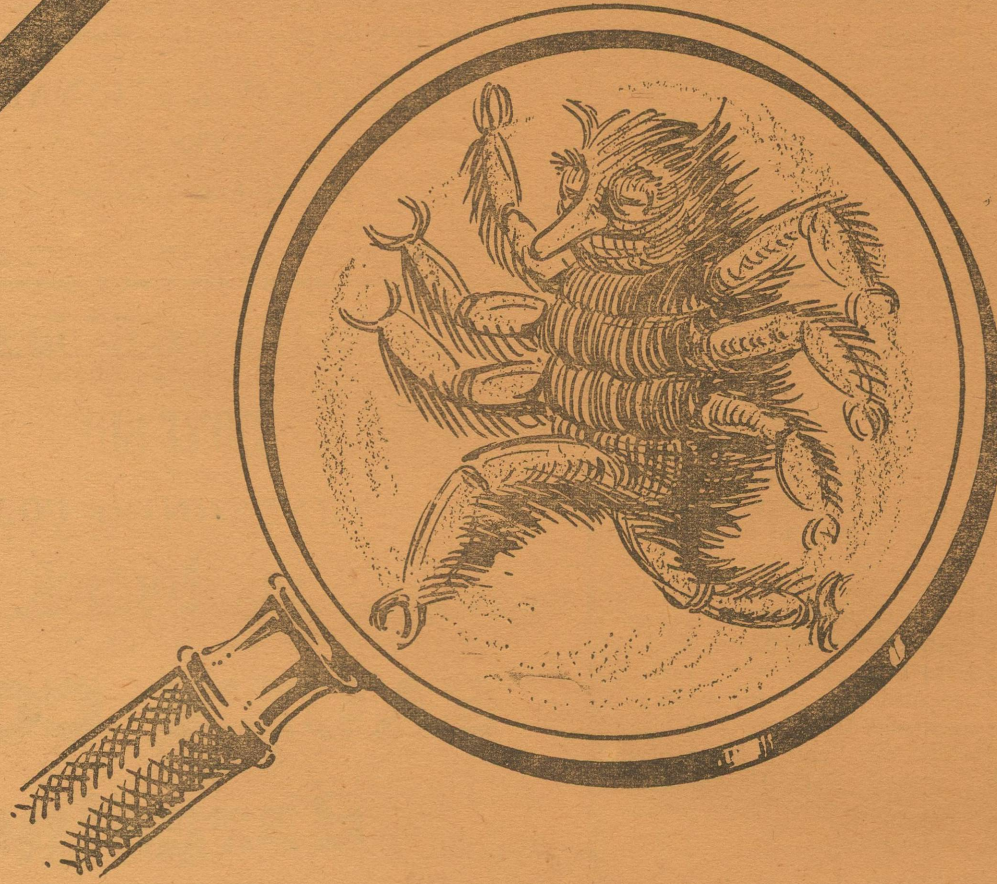

Were you fortunate enough to be "tuned-in" on Chicago Wednesday night at 8:15 o'clock at which time the President of the United States, Franklin Delano Roosevelt addressed a crowd of 32,000 citizens of Chicago and the great state of Illinois seated within the great Chicago city auditorium and to some 150,000 other interested citizens who were unable to enter the massive hall but who were afforded the opportunity of hearing their great leader's address through specially provided loud-speakers?

If you did not sit comfortably in your own home and hear that great demonstration, over your own radio or that of one of your neighbors, then you missed hearing the greatest demonstration ever accorded a leader of the great democracy of this great country! ### New Ruling Made On Farm Program

"Where an annual winter legume or alfalfa is seeded alone in the fall (Prior to October 31) of 1936 on an acreage from which a soil depleting crop was harvested in 1936, the acreage so seeded to such legumes may be substituted in lieu of Soil Conserving Crops for purposes of diversion and meeting the minimum acreage of soil conserving crops computed pursuant to section 6, part II and one for no provisions of section 2 of this part IV."

This means that a producer who lacks a few acres of having sufficient soil conserving acres to qualify may plant alfalfa, austrian winter peas or Hairy Vetch on land from which some crop has been harvested and classify this acreage as soil conserving in order to meet the minimum requirements and thereby qualify for wheat over pay he may be entitled to on any diversion he has made from soil depleting crops. However no pay will be earned on any acreage so planted to annual winter legumes or alfalfa.

For example:

A producer operating 100 acres in cultivation with 40 acre cotton base and 60 acre general crop base, plants 40 acres of cotton and 50 acres of general soil depleting crops has diverted 10 acres from soil depleting crops but needs 17 acres to meet the minimum requirements. This producer may plant 17 acres of winter legumes or alfalfa on land from which some crop was harvested and meet his minimum acreage requirements. This will only qualify him for pay on the 10 acres previously diverted.
