He fashioned it to a train which had been literally wrecked; was in the ditch; how he and his cabinet had lifted the train back to the track; rebuilt the worn parts, and started it out again on a clear track towards a much brighter future! It was a most fitting description of what had preceded during the past four years, and what has been accomplished during the past three and a half years since March 4th, 1933!

Never, in all the history of this great American Republic, has a president used plainer language or simpler words in expressing his own thoughts. His was a masterful address, and it fell upon sympathetic ears, and doubtless those who are running about over the country, criticising him and saying all manner of ill things about him, received "the chill of a life-time"—if they were also hearing his wonderful address. We can't help but wonder if The Literary Digest mailed a copy of its Presidential Ballot to that vast throng, as well as to those who cheered our

great President at Kansas City? November 3rd will tell the story!
