The Executive Committee of the U. I. L. of Clay County met Dec. 16 in the office of the County Superintendent with the following members present: Paul Steph, Norma E. Scott, Katherine Witherspoon, Frank Morgan, Iris Lightsey, J. W. Callaway, Mabel Pope, A. C. Rice, and Morris Gilbert.

The meeting was called to order by Paul Steph, director general. C. C. Bock, Petrolia, Texas, was elected secretary.

The executive committee approved the rotation plan of events and places as used in the preceding years. The following dates and places were then fixed for all events of the year 1938:

H. S. Basket Ball, Petrolia, February 11-12; H. S. Volley Ball, Petrolia, February 18-19; G. S. Volley Ball, Joy, March 5; Tennis Tournament, Byers, March 18-19; Literary Events, Byers, March 25; Track & Field, Bellevue, March 26; Playground Ball, Henrietta, May 7.

J. W. Callaway was authorized to appoint directors of rural schools to conduct elimination contests leading to entries in the general county meet.

L. G. Brown Died Of Injuries Received By Vicious Dogs

The tragic death of L. G. Brown last Thursday evening has aroused the interest of two counties. Brown, a resident of Wichita Falls, was returning from a visit with his son, Lee Brown, in the Dean Dale community and was walking in the road by the T. E. Luecke poultry farm when he was attacked by four dogs and mortally wounded. He had just completed arrangements to join his wife, who is in Arizona, and was returning from a farewell visit to his son when the tragedy occurred.

Friday afternoon Sheriff E. P. Bomar with deputy Henry Fields and City Marshall John Firestone killed three of the dogs. The fourth dog, mother of the others, was spared on the plea of her master and the promise to ship her out of the state.

The dogs were used as watch dogs on the poultry farm. The three that were killed were about two years old, a combination of bulldog and police.

Luecke was charged with permitting vicious dogs to run at large and held.

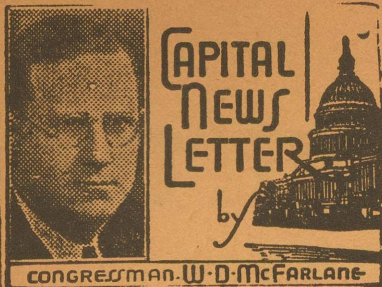
Interment was in the Hope cemetery under the direction of Moore Funeral Directors.

THE SPECIAL SESSION

Our critics are loudly complaining of the failure of the Special Session to enact the Four Point Program for which they were called by the President. Let us review the work of the Special Session and see what was done.

Take first the legislative program of the House. The first week of the session was consumed by our reactionary critics, continuing their opposition of the last campaign against the social reform as pledged in the Democratic platform of 1936. Big business having blocked this program during the first session of this year, they renewed their vicious attack through all possible channels to block the program of this administration during this special session.

We began debating the Farm Bill the second week of the session and, after considering the same continuously for two weeks, we finally passed a farm bill by a very close vote at the close of the third week.

The Wage and Hour Bill was finally forced out of the Rules Committee and before the Congress by the discharge petition and its consideration started on Monday of the fourth week; and, after debating this measure all week and after one of the bitterest controversies we have had under this Administration, the measure was finally re-committed to the committee on labor by a vote of 216 to 198.

Amendments to the Federal Housing Act were considered and finally passed in the House last Saturday and sent to the Senate.

Now, let us consider the work of the Senate during this Special Session. The Session opened with the anti-lynching bill as pending business before the Senate until disposed of, subject only to a resolution placing the Agricultural Bill first. The Agricultural Bill was brought before the Senate during the first week and was pending business before the Senate throughout the remainder of the session. The Agricultural Bill was finally passed by the Senate on last Friday by a vote of 57 to 29.

The Housing Bill was then called up and finally passed on Tuesday of last week just before sine die adjournment. It was thought for a while that we would be able to agree upon the Housing Bill and send it to the White House. However, the Senators, insisting upon the anti-lynching bill having the right of way, refused to permit this to be done. The Housing Bill

was forced to stay in conference. **RESULTS ACCOMPLISHED**

From reviewing the work of the Special Session, as above briefly outlined, the misinformed might think little was accomplished. However, by studying the kind and character of legislation before the Session, we find that the Congress was constantly working upon farm, and wage and hour legislation, the knottiest legislative problems ever considered by any Congress. It is well known that these problems have been ducked and dodged by previous administrations and sessions of Congress for many years. It is believed that construction work on both measures has been accomplished and it is hoped that worth while legislation will be worked out early in the next session, opening January 3rd.

Those familiar with legislative procedure feel that at least two months' time has been cut from the new session of Congress, starting next Monday, because of the work done by the Special Session. The Committees on appropriations, tax, government reorganization and regional planning will have their legislation ready for early consideration next session.

THE SECOND SESSION

The second regular session of the 75th Congress, opening next Monday, it is believed by many, will be the most important session of this administration. The President has already announced that he will appear personally and present his message to the joint session January 3rd. It is his attitude regarding the future program of this administration on farm, wage and hour, departmental reorganization, regional power planting, taxation and the treatment of the monopolies.

When Napoleon was confronted with what appeared to be almost certain defeat, in one of the greatest battles of history after his tried and trusted Old Guard had been driven back and his center line crushed, he called upon his drummer to beat a retreat. The little drummer, with tears in his eyes, replied to Napoleon, "I have never learned to beat a retreat but I can beat a charge that will wake the dead." Napoleon said, "Then beat the charge and the little drummer did. The Old Guard reformed and fought through to victory.

I hope and believe the friends of this Administration can reform our lines and fight through to victory and write into law the heart of this Administration the Social Reform Program for the benefit of the great masses of our people.

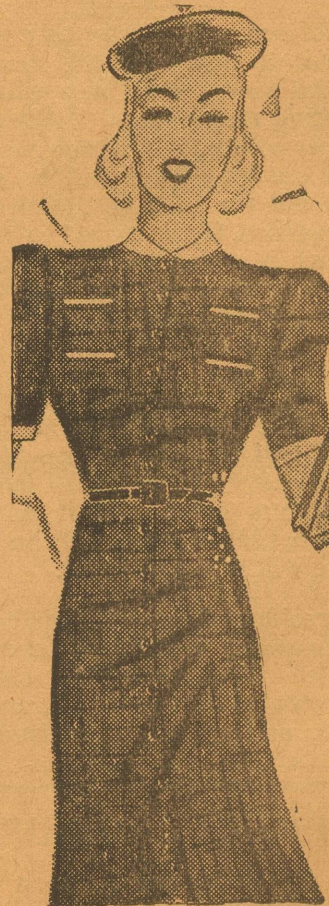
