Bailey County Water Group Formed

'69 Junior Livestock Show Largest Ever 52 Members Join

Next week will be a big week for youngsters in FFA and 4-H Clubs in Bailey County.

Beginning Thursday, February 13, at 1 p.m., the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show will get underway. Preparations were begun months ago as youngsters obtained their stock, and started feeding and grooming them for the annual presentation.

This year, the board of directors, 4-H leaders and FFA instructors expect an all-time high entry list for the show. County Agent J. K. Adams said that Tuesday, February 11, is set as deadline for paying entry fees and filling out entry cards for the 4-H and FFA livestock show. The board of directors authorized the fees to be either mailed or brought in person to the county agent's office or they can be left with any of the four vocational agriculture teachers in Bailey County. The fees are \$1 for beef animals and 50 cents per entry for all other entries.

Show rules are as follows: ARRIVAL OF LIVESTOCK: 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., February 13th.

Area Pork Potential Revealed by Research

Heftier pocker books for farmers is the object of an economic study in pork production during 1969 at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

The study began this week at the Research Foundation with the arrival of a portable pig pen with raised slatted floors which features two-thirds of the pen being closed with a roof and three sides, and according to Dr. Tom Longnecker, Research director, "should provide maintenance for a disease-free operation."

The Jimm/Dean Meat Company has created a local market for pork raised in this area and has caused increased excitement in pork industry on the High Plains.

Due to this increased interest, the Foundation will begin an economics study of limited pork production.

According to Dr. Tom Longnecker, object of the study is to find a livestock enterprise small farmers can use as a means to increase profits in today's farming operations.

Potential for pork production in this area is here now due to the meat packing plant. We believe farmers can get as much as \$1.00 per hundred weight more for their grain sorghum marketed through pork and we hope this study will show this," Longnecker said.

The portable pen was supplied for use in this study by Central Supply Co., Amarillo and Berger. The eight-foot by 24-foot pen is constructed of steel with slatted wooden floors.

Resolution Adopted By New Water Board

During the water meeting at Muleshoe High School cafeteria Monday night, a resolution was presented the newly formed Bailey County Water Association for consideration.

R. C. Dick' Godwin of Deaf Smith County read the resolution to those present for the meeting. Following the reading of the resolution it was adopted unanimously by those attending.

The resolution reads as follows: RESOLUTION FORMATION OF IMPORT WATER DISTRICTS KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, THAT:

Whereas, the importation of supplemental water supplies to the High Plains of Texas and Eastern New Mexico at an early date is essential to its social and economic survival; and

WHEREAS, the state and federal governments have been and continue to be busy at the task of performing studies and formulating plans for the importation of water supplies to the High Plains from the Mississippi River; and

Whereas, all the people of the High Plains have a stake in its social and economic survival and expansion, and therefore are affected by whether or not such water importation project becomes a reality, and if so, when it becomes a reality; and

WHEREAS, the original costs

of such project are sufficiently high that they would have to be paid through state and federal appropriations of public moneys; and

WHEREAS, in order to make such project a reality as soon as possible, it is necessary for the people of the High Plains to undertake immediate action for uniting themselves together in an organized effort to sell the project to the entire nation; and

WHEREAS, the people of the High Plains cannot afford to take the risk of undesirable delay by attempting to secure necessary funds for promotion through voluntary subscription; and

WHEREAS, the people need to be represented by a legally established organization, one for each state, funded on a fair basis throughout the import area, governed by directors elected by the people, uniting all elements toward their single purpose of obtaining water for the High Plains.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the undecided:

(1) That the Board of Directors of Water, Inc. at the annual meeting of its membership on February 18, 1969, needed to inform and educate the people of the High Plains of the necessity of the immediate creation of political subdivisions for the import area, in order to promote all of the actions neces-

sary to secure water, one of such subdivisions for the Texas High Plains and another for the New Mexico High Plains.

(2) That such subdivisions be import water districts established for the purpose of directing the unified efforts of the people in the necessary task of selling the High Plains water importation project to the entire nation, in order to acquire public appropriations for its construction.

(3) That, in order to provide a guaranteed budget of sufficient financial capability, legislation and elections creating such districts provide for ad valorem taxation on all prop-

erty within the import area, not to exceed five cents (5¢) on One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) valuation.

(4) That the governments of such districts be composed of directors duly elected on a fair representative basis by the precinct method.

(5) That time is of the essence in that the last day of the introduction of bills without a two-thirds majority in the Texas Legislature occurs on or about March 14, 1969, and unless a special session is called by the Governor, it would be necessary to wait another two years before securing such legisla-

Water . . . lifeline of our area's economy . . . was featured subject at a meeting at Muleshoe High School cafeteria Monday night. Joe Harbin, of Bailey County Electric Association, acted as official chairman for the meeting, which was called to discuss organizing a Bailey County Water Association.

Farmers, businessmen, local citizens and civic administrators turned out in full force to hear men from Farmer and Deaf Smith Counties present the present and future needs for water importation on the High Plains.

John Aikin, Hereford attorney, associated with the firm of Witherspoon, Thomas, Aikin and Langley, was principal speaker of the evening.

He began by congratulating those present for the excellent response to the notice of the meeting. Noting that all economic and business areas were represented in the cafeteria, Aikin said, "It is good to see that so many realize that water is important not only to the farmer but to each and everyone in the area."

"I know," he continued, "that we will see the day that surplus water will not be a hope, a dream, but a reality in our area."

Stressing the fact that water education is the principal problem at the present time, Aikin told his audience that not only do the people on the High Plains need to be educated, but also those in East Texas, West Texas, Louisiana, straight up the Mississippi to Missouri and on to Maine. He reiterated the fact that only by presenting the water problem to the people, all the people, of the United States, could the preliminary water plans presently underway

\$5,000 Horse Accident Victim Near Muleshoe

An accident three-tenths of a mile south of Muleshoe on Highway 214 Thursday night at 8:30 p.m., killed a mare with an assessed valuation of \$5,000.

Denver City Accident Injures Local People

Editor's note—The below story was taken from the Denver City Press.

A United States Army officer, his wife, and two-year-old son, and the family dog, escaped serious hurts at about 7:40 p.m. Tuesday when their 1962 Chevrolet station wagon collided with a cow about 10 miles south of Denver City on the Seminoe Highway.

First Lieutenant Clifford White, 25; his wife, Carolyn, 24; and their son, Patrick, were enroute northward to Muleshoe when the accident occurred.

The station wagon rolled two, possibly three, times following impact with the 800-pound animal, reported Gaines County Sheriff Ed Welch.

The White family, and the pet dog, a two-year-old French poodle named Souffle, were brought to Youkum County Hospital by a passerby. Den-

ver City Patrolman Casey Bownds said that Don Borman of Midland brought the injured persons to the hospital in his pick-up.

Lt. White and his son were treated for minor cuts and bruises. Mrs. White was treated for possible neck injury.

Denver City Patrolman Bownds took the dog for safe keeping pending the White family's release from the hospital.

Lt. White, in the army's transportation corps and on leave pending transfer to Viet Nam, said that he and his wife were wearing seat belts and that young Patrick was in a seat harness — factors which, likely prevented more serious injury. The station wagon virtually was demolished. The cow was killed.

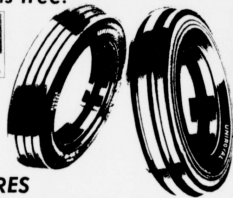

start the Friday show at 2:15 p.m.
HOGS: Will show alphabetically by breeds: Barrows followed by Gilt Show.
HEIFERS: Show next and Steers climax show.

ELIGIBILITY: Any boy or girl who is a member of the 4-H, FFA or FHA whose projects are supervised by the County Agent or Vocational Agriculture teachers of Bailey County and attend school in Bailey County, is eligible to show in the Bailey County Show. DEADLINE RULE: Club members must own and have their animals in his care not later than December 15, 1968. Exhibitors must notify their supervisors of their show animals by December 15, 1968. LIMITS ON ENTRIES: Each exhibitor limited to three hogs which may be barrows, gilts or any combination of same. Each exhibitor may also show three lambs which may be ewes or wethers or any combination of same and two beef animals which may be steers, heifers or any combination of same. LIVESTOCK PERMITTED TO SHOW:

A. Barrow division will show by breeds when eight or more of a breed arrive at show, but breeds of seven or under will show grouped together as one breed. Barrows may be purebred or crossed with all crossbred barrows handled as a breed of hogs. Only barrows weighing over 160 and under 245 pounds will be permitted to show. Each breed of barrows will be equally divided into weight divisions. Ties will draw for class.
B. Beef division restricted to the heifers or steers of beef

breeds and steer crosses of same. Steers will be weighed and equally divided into light, medium and heavy classes. Beef animals cannot have permanent teeth in wear. Calves must be gentle and halter broken to the satisfaction of the superintendent.
C. Breeding gilts must be purebred and shown after July 15, 1968. They must weigh at least 150 lbs. on arrival for show. Gilt classes will be by breeds. Judge will be authorized to disqualify completely clipped gilts and all gilts must meet breed requirements for registration. Exhibitor may clip ears, tails and underline of the gilts only.
D. Lambs must be lambs carrying milk teeth on show day. Lamb classes will be: 1. Southdown and Southdown Crosses. 2. Other mutton breeds and crosses of same. 3. Fine Wool. 4. Fine Wool Crosses.

PREMIUM LIST: Heifer and Steer Classes: 1st \$60, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$40, 4th \$30, 5th \$20, 6th \$10, 7th \$8, 8th \$6, 9th \$6, 10th \$4, 11th \$4, 12th \$4. GRAND CHAMPION STEEF \$100.00. If you are in business for yourself, or you are fortunate enough to earn sufficient income so as to require an estimated income tax return each year, you will be getting an additional tax form package from Internal Revenue within the next few days. The Internal Revenue Service Centers have gone through all the taxpayer accounts on the computer tape and are sending out a set of controlled vouchers to all the individual income taxpayers who must file an estimate. You will use these annual-red vouchers to file your estimate and make your quarterly payments.

In the past, you waited for your bill from Internal Revenue and sometimes the taxpayer and the computer crossed in the mail or just plain got crossed—anyway the good tax folks hope that this will help you send your estimated tax payments through on time without any m'x-ups.

be finalized and water importation become a reality.
Aikin said it will take a lot of hard work, a lot of help and like anything worthwhile, it will take money. "It will take money for research," commented Aikin. "It will also take money for hiring the best public relations people we can find to take the water story all over the United States; it will take money for construction and for transportation of the water once the Bureau of Reclamation completes its present study," he continued.

He told the men present at the meeting that California presently receives 90 per cent of every reclamation dollar spent in the entire United States each year, stressing that California has nine full time employees who work each and every day that Congress is in session in Washington.
"We need to let the world know what we are doing and what we need from the world. We need to tell them about the production of crops, food and fiber on the High Plains and what the loss would do to the economy of the United States."
"It is essential that we organize county by county and farm from this one large organization; it is essential, without it we will never get to the other stages of the problem. This is the most important thing we have ever worked on in our area. It is getting real bad when a farmer has ten less water tubes in the rows at the end of the summer to what he had when the season began. For some reason, which is less water, his crops don't look good and he hopes his neighbors won't notice because he doesn't want the value of his property to drop from \$450 an acre to \$200," said Aikin.
Bruce Parr, who lives and farms in the Black community in Farmer County followed Aikin to the speaker's rostrum. He further explained the purpose of the proposed water district and what would be needed for water importation. Parr emphasized the fact that there would be problems but added that Texans are known the world over for working out their problems.

He added the fact that in the next few years while the plans and possible construction are in the working stages that on the day water from one of the

far off rivers runs into Bailey County, some man will say "I don't even know this was going on." Parr was stating the fact that it was imperative to inform the general public what is going on.

Ross Goodwin, district representative of the High Plains Underground Water District also spoke on past accomplishments of the U.G. Water District in the field of preliminary study and plans for water importation.
R. C. "Dick" Godwin from Deaf Smith County also spoke briefly and told those present that the time to organize was now and the place to organize was at the well attended meeting.

Joe Harbin asked Ben Roney to give the nominating committee report on the election of directors to the newly formed Bailey County Water Association which was formed shortly after being proposed by Harbin.
The county was divided into six parts with directors nominated and elected from each section. profit solution only on a small-time operation.
"There is no question that farmers planning to produce 4,000 to 5,000 pigs per year should build adequate permanent housing. The investment required in the portable pen is something a small farmer can do and provides another avenue for farmers wanting to get into pork production," he said.

Pigs for this economics opportunity study will be provided by the Jimmy Dean Pig Parlor, an SFF pork production operation owned by Troy Fritchard, Don Dean, and Jimmy Dean.
"As an indication of the interest in pork production in this area, we have been approached by two area companies to conduct studies on new feeding rations," Dr. Longnecker added.

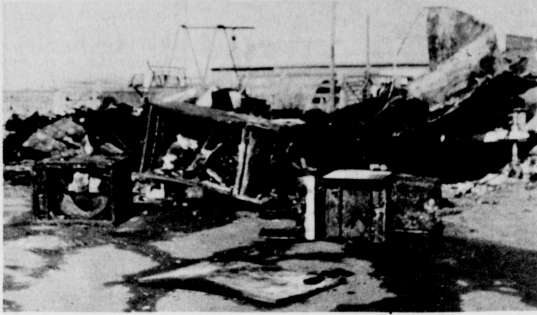

When is time to prune? Should you think you have the answer, we will question the wisdom of just that alone.

"The book says..." How many of us have roses or fruit trees that read books?

Of course any one that has been to school has read a number of books and in the plant world that is only a place to start. How many books can you find that pertain to the elements that we have to deal with on these dry, windy plains where we have chosen to live? The southwest gardening books are more applicable to the river valleys of N.M. or just off the caprock and very little actually applies to the area we call home.

The next best is to follow the advice of the book as far as is practical and then depend on someone that has had some years of success at the business to form your own opinion as to what to do, when to do it, and the degree that you should do it.

Personally, we hold the theory that says to prune a rose bush grow, really prune it. I other words, to start cutting on a rose bush is to start growing and we think that should be done about the first to the middle of March. Fruit trees some of the evergreens, an number of other plants can be trimmed any time during the winter months and the will let a person get the feel of the idea and then be in good shape for the more touchy items like roses.

The trimming of roses is also very controversial in that there are several ways to trim them some successful and some not so much. Again, it is well to start with the knowledge to be obtained from books, tempo that with a little common sense throw in a little to alter to this and that, and again allow for the climate we have here and go from there.
