THE RECOVERY PROGRAM

The new Recovery Program passed the House Thursday by a vote of 329 to 70 and now goes to the Senate for their consideration. It is estimated this work will furnish employment to more than 4,000,000 persons. Projects to be constructed under the new program must be approved by local communities which will insure work on the most worth while projects where the greatest amount of labor will be employed. Since February 1937 more than 3,000,000 workers have lost their jobs in private industry and this has caused more than 2,000,000 additions to the relief rolls.
