Pres. Roosevelt **Appoints Allred** Federal Judge

On his trip through Texas Monday, while addressing the throng at the Fort Worth and Denver City Ry. Station in Wichita Falls at the noon hour, President Roosevelt appointed and handed the official commission to Gov. Jas. V. Allred as Federal District Judge of the Second Judicial District of Texas.

Congressman McFarlane of the 13th Texas district presided as master of ceremonies, introducing both Senator Tom Connally and Gov. Allred who spoke to the people assembled in short addresses.

Gov. Allred accepted the appointment and will likely resign as governor following the August primary.
