Mr. Burns feels that he has at last "struck rich pay" sand; has gone the limit, so to speak, in setting and cementing casing and getting ready to properly preserve this well before taking any unnecessary chances of losing it because of some fault of the drilling.


Clay County's Agricultural Building is Pride of Everybody in Entire County.

Hull "did his stuff" and every buyer was more than well satisfied with his purchases. The 32 bulls and eight cows were selected by George W. Barnes of the A & M extension service and County Agent M. S. Duncan for this first sale.

Clay county's livestock building is shown above. It is one of the most modern structures of its kind in North Texas, and the annual Purebred Sale will be held here each year. It has ample space for cattle, comfortable seats for a large audience arena in full view of visitors and buyers.

THE VOICE OF TEXAS

Governor O'Daniel's recent statement that regardless of the millions a bill might raise, he would veto same if it linked government with crime today, stands out as a classic of truly great utterances.

One of the fatal delusions of tyrants is to blend pleasure and amusements with crime, levy taxes for same, and thus concealing the deadly, downward tendency society and government plunge into the vortex of ruin.

It is heartening to our aged Texans to know that they have a Chief Executive who is now doing his very best to have to pass through channels which to some are to say the least, objects of questioning.

His statement recalls an admonition used in a chapel talk in the long ago by Reverend Doctor Rufus C. Burleson, of Baylor University; "Shun whiskey shops, gambling houses, race grounds, as you would the sting of a scorpion or the bite of an adder."

RURAL SCHOOL PROBLEM

Education in the rural schools of Clay County, and in the majority of the other schools in other counties, is failing to a great extent in equipping the rural boy with a working knowledge of the things he will need if he is to remain on the farm.

From a survey made in several schools in this county, three reasons were given by the students as to why they were in school, in brief they are; First boys go to school so that they may learn to get a position in some town or city; Second, boys go to school so that they may learn enough to carry on the business necessary for them if they are to remain on the farm; Third, boys go to school because they have parents who make them go.

The first group of boys receive the foundation for a high school education in the rural school; their specialized training is gotten in high school or in business college. For this group of boys our present set-up is probably adequate but for the last two groups we are failing sadly in providing for their needs.

"James A. Garfield, who became president in 1881 was once a towpath boy on a canal in Ohio"

The above quotation from the present History text of the fifth grade is inspiring to the boy in the rural school, and might spur him on to greater things, but if it did not, it would help him but little with his problem of cutting a rafter for a new chicken house, creep feeder, or in making minor repairs on home furniture or farm tools, neither would the fact that an abstract noun denotes a quality or condition to help him in making a screen door, brick flue, or rebuilding a window casing.

The writer does not deny that these historical and English facts have their place in all education, but he does insist that a more practical course would be of equal value to a certain group or groups, of boys who are now almost completely ignored.

The fact that rural boys drop out of school in great numbers at the completion of the sixth and seventh grades is almost enough in itself to convict our present system, and it is a problem that Rural schools and their patrons must solve. How can we keep the boy interested and at the same time put before him the information and materials that he will need when out of school, even though he drops out at an early age?

The writer's answer to this problem is a wide program of Industrial Arts, or as sometimes called, manual training, carried on by one or more instructors spending a half day in each of several schools once or twice each week. A program teaching a consumers knowledge of materials and services, care and use of simple hand tools, simple construction and repair problems on furniture and buildings, making of working drawings and the reading of blueprints, and many other activities could be carried out with a very small outlay of money by each district school
