Record Crowd Attend Banquet and Hear Texas' Governor

Clay County Leader Addressing some 500 persons, a record crowd, at the annual banquet of the Henrietta and Clay County Chamber of Commerce, Governor Coke Stevenson urged volunteer cooperation in the Defense Program in this great crisis. The Governor spoke in an inspirational and serious vein as he told citizens of Henrietta and surrounding communities as well as a score of prominent state officials that "Texans must expect to make sacrifices before the war is over. He declared however there was no doubt the American way of life will survive. The Governor paid high tribute to the Chamber of Commerce as a organization that in such a time of national emergencies can assemble the energies of the community, and direct them to the benefit of all."

Hon. Homer Leonard, speaker of the house of representatives, one of the honor guests at the banquet, in a short humorous talk, expressed his gratification at being in Henrietta to observe what was acclaimed by citizens to be the best C. of C. banquet in the history of the organization.

All banquet tickets were sold and some 50 persons occupied the balcony for the program.

Attorney Donley Suddath, newly elected president, served as Master of Ceremonies and the County Judge gave the welcome address.

Hon. Geo. H. Sheppard, State Comptroller gave the response, after which the Honorable Ambrose Douthitt, noted announcer, introduced the delegations from Bellevue, Bowie, Charlie, Byers, Petrolia, Blue Grove, Joy, Ringgold, Wichita Falls, Jacksboro, Archer City and Ft. Worth.

Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe introduced the following members of the legislature, Senator John Lee Smith, Throckmorton; Senator R. C. Laning, Jacksboro, Representatives, Paul Donald, Bowie; Grady Roberts, Munday; Clinton Kersey, Bridgeport; and Clay Parker of Graham.

A 45-minute program was presented by Sheppard Field soldier-artists with Corpl. Phillip MacGregor acting as master of ceremonies for Pvt. Earl Cornwell, violinist; Arthur Carr, pianist and composer; and Leroy Neal, magician and fire eater, who drew particular applause when he permitted Governor Stevenson to light his cigar from flames issuing from the performers' mouth, then swallowed the flame.

Awards of \$10.00 worth of Defense Stamps were given Miss Margie Shipp of Petrolia and Mr. J. W. Lyle of Wichita Falls and the Governor was remembered with a pair of Olsen-Stelzer boots.

The Watson Well Flows 704 Barrels

The Continental Oil Co. and Roy Lee, Trustee, No. 1, H. Watson, in south Clay county flowed natural with a potential of 704 barrels per day on a six hour test by the Railroad Commission this week and measured up to earlier predictions as good producer. The well is north of the Henderson Pool in wildcat territory. It flowed 118.25 barrels the first three hours and the second three hours flowed 88 bbls. Casing pressure at the start registered 450 lbs and at the end of the test showed 460 pounds. Tubing pressure was 380 pounds at beginning and 235 at end of test.

The new well is in the northeast part of the W. A. Farris survey, abstract 148, and is producing from Caddo at 5455-84 feet, total depth. The same Company has staked a new location for No. A-1 Watson, a 5800-foot test to be drilled 2970 feet east and 330 feet from north lines of W. A. Farris survey.

The Bridwell Oil Co. No. 3 Viola Myers, a Caddo test in the C. Thomsen survey, abstract 444, in south-west Clay county, is drilling below 4390 feet in shale sand and streaky lime formation.

South of Jolly in the Ross pool area, the Continental Superior Dillard No. 3, J. D. Avis, Estate, block 20, Rains county school lands is drilling below 4480 feet in shale and streaks of lime.

The Gulf Oil Company Corporation No. 6 Worsham Estate in section 37, block 4, H & T C survey, a semi-wildcat is swabbing at 5509 feet and showing some oil and gas.

The Shell Oil Company No. 1 E. J. Polzin in block 4, T & N O survey, treated the Caddo with 1,000 gallons of acid and is swabbing. Total depth of this well is 6445 feet and is in the Coleman Area 7 miles southeast of Henrietta, known as the New York City pool. The same Company's No. B-2 Ed Coleman in block 25 Calhoun county school lands is drilling below 6288 feet.

Back in 1939—to be exact, March 2 was the day—Col. L. T. (Bobby) Burns struck deep pay dirt in his No. 1 Browning in block 94, J. H. Belcher subdivision, Clay County.

The well came in flowing with a steady flow of black gold. On March 17, two weeks later, Fleetwood Co. paid \$15,000.00 for a 100 acre offset lease, and then the race of a wild run began in leasing, and when the dust had cleared away the results were that most of the major and Independent companies had gathered up a substantial quantity of acreage, and started a general wide-spread drilling for deep pay in Clay county.

Col. Burns did not only drill an oil well which brought about the Browning pool, the Bridwell pool, the Ross pool, the Henderson pool, the Coleman pool, the Wynn pool, and others that are now in the wild-catting category, but through his confidence in Clay County, he has proven a salvation to many of the land owners in the county by providing an avenue of escape from the pinch brought about by the years of the depression, and all because he believed in a deep pay

land here and dared to dare a wide spread leasing and drilling campaign. Col. Burns has spent his money liberally and bountifully in the drive to develop deep oil findings because he believes in Clay County and its future, so much so that he is the proud owner of the 5000 acre Roth ranch which actually has some of the finest grass land in these parts. He has stocked this ranch with pure bred registered Hereford cattle and does on what he believes will become as fine a herd of white-face as Texas can produce.

Beside shaving many wells on the drill in many parts of this section, where he holds leases, he has a well in the Wynn pool, near the pay dirt which should come in some time during next week, it is No. 5, and described as follows:

The L. T. Burns, No. 5, C. L. Wynn two miles west of Joy in south Clay county is drilling around 4370 feet in shale. This is a Mississippiian test in block 34, H. Williams Survey on the Claude Wynn ranch lands in proven territory.

Mr. Burns has been one of Clay County's biggest assets in his line.

Places to Register For Vol. Defense

A meeting was held Monday in the district court room at the court house in connection with the organization of the Air Raid Warden System of Clay County, with A. M. Douthitt and L. B. Haggood in charge. The Committee composed of Paul Hawkins, L. B. Haggood, A. M. Douthitt and A. B. Staggs, with the County Judge as co-ordinator for Clay County, have already had some training and are taking more. They want volunteer helpers from all sections of the county so that they can get the setup to functioning in order that all may get the required training.

Leaders are to have ten hours of First Aid Course; Training in Fire Prevention; How to use Gas masks, and Methods of Gas Defense, the construction and how to protect against contamination of gases.

Maps have been sent to Clay County with 18 proposed observations Posts for the county. Volunteer helpers will have charge of these posts and assist with Defense work in each community.

Mr. Douthitt stated that "we may not need this training, but must be trained for emergency". There may be need at any time he said as we might be in direct path if bombers attempt to bomb any of our Oil Fields, Training Camps, and Plane manufacturing plants. They could drop a bomb that would burn our town or grass, he said, so for that reason, "We must be ready to meet any emergencies". Not only one but many should be trained and ready in case of fires and other damage.

First Aid Course started recently at the High School and has room for others. Enroll now for that course.

Speech in House By Cong. Ed Gossett

Any American worthy of the name wants the war to be brought to successful end as soon as possible. Every American knows that the longer and harder we work at home the shorter will be the fighting abroad. In his address of last evening the President enumerated 3 principles with which every American should gladly comply: (1) we shall not stop work for a single day; (2) we shall not demand special gains, special privileges, or special advantages for any one group or occupation; (3) we shall give up conveniences and modify the routine of our lives in so far as may be necessary.

Mr. Speaker, many months before Pearl Harbor I stated that any person who slowed down or stopped defense production for selfish reasons was not a good American. Today, any person who slows down or stops our war production for selfish reasons is an enemy of our country. This applies to us all—government employes, industrial employes, all other employes, and all employes throughout the whole country. One who refuses to sacrifice social gains in time of war does not deserve them in time of peace. There is certainly nothing sacred about our limitations or profits. There is every thing sacred about American blood and American liberty.

Yesterday General Hershey told Congress that we face a serious shortage. Yet at this very time many war industries are operating on an 8-hour day, 40-hour week schedule. Today many small factories and machine shops in this country remain idle.

The country was pleased with the President's speech of last evening. The country, however, demands more of us all than mere speeches. Everything from the government down should have long since been converted to 100 per cent war effort. Some of the specific things that ought to be done by the Congress, with the support and backing of the President, are:

- (1) Non-defense expenditures should be cut to the bone.
(2) Excess war profits should be eliminated.
(3) The Smith bill, passed some weeks ago by the House, outlawing strikes in war industries for the duration, should be passed by the other body of the Congress and signed by the President.
(4) Limitations on hours of work in the government and elsewhere should be removed for the duration.
(5) Small business and factory facilities of the country should be utilized.

These things can all be accomplished by courageous action. Mr. Speaker, the boys who fight America's battles on the far-flung battlefields are doing their full duty with pride and devotion. The folks on the home front must be worthy of these sacrifices. During this hour of ter-
