## County Salvage Drive Has Opened

To meet the nation's war needs for scrap iron and steel and other salvage materials, a new intensive drive will be launched on Aug. 15, in Clay County to obtain at least 500 tons of scrap materials, it was announced today by M. S. Duncan, Chairman of the County Salvage Committee. The local drive is part of the nation-wide drive announced by Donald M. Nelson WPB chairman.

"As the war becomes more intensive on the various foreign fronts," Mr. Duncan said, "the need for scrap materials has steadily increased." He declared that while collections of various types of salvage have already been made here from time to time the expanding requirements of the war program have made it necessary to obtain much larger amount of materials.

"The American steel industry this year hopes to produce a record-breaking 85,000,000 tons of steel—as much as all foreign countries put together can make. Our country alone this year is going to produce three tons of steel for every two tons the Axis can turn out.

"To bring steel production up to the industry's full capacity of 90,000,000 tons in 1942, however, our steel industry needs an extra 6,000,000 tons of scrap steel for its furnaces. Every ton of scrap we can send them will swell our national production of tanks, ships, planes and guns."

In addition to scrap iron and steel, the materials to be collected are brass and other non-ferrous metals, rubber, rope and fats.

Collection depots at which scrap iron and other salvage may be left have been established. See your local Chairman for location in your community.

Mr. Duncan said that many local civic organizations would be called upon to assist in the drive.

"An increasing number of boys from this County are already seeing active service," he said. "We on the home front must see to it that industry shall not lack the materials needed for adequately arming and equipping them.

"Every housewife can play an important part in this drive. She should carefully inspect all of her household furnishings—to find out what equipment she has that has outlived its usefulness.

"An old iron pot or a knife in the kitchen, the steel springs of an old upholstered chair in the attic, some discarded pipe or heating equipment in the cellar, unused wire clothes hangers in a closet—these are a few of the items that will provide pounds and pounds of scrap.

"Waste kitchen pots, and rubber, are also needed badly and should be turned in."

"Please get out this Scrap—and get in the Scrap!"—M. S. Duncan.

## Election Sidelights

(Readers: Please bear in mind that this reporter isn't writing these lines to try in any way to influence you in making your own decision as to whom you shall vote for in this U. S. Senatorial Runoff Saturday, August 22.)

Did you hear Jimmy's little talk over WFAA Thursday noon? Well, he sure has had "A Change of Heart!" On night of June 2nd we heard him tell ALL about Senator O'Daniel's "Book of O'Daniel, (as Jimmy called it) and "O'Daniel Revelations!" ## Get Scrap Metal And Rubber to Junk Man

According to reports, Clay County has shipped between 600 and 700 tons of scrap iron to be made into weapons to defeat the enemy. There is yet a lot of scrap iron, brass, copper, aluminum etc., that should be hauled to the junk dealers, who are required by law to keep it moving toward the furnaces and foundries.

Between 80 and 100 tons of scrap rubber has been collected and is moving toward the processors as fast as transportation can be provided.

Each community is providing a collection depot, from which points it will be hauled by patriotic citizens to the junk dealers. Money received from donated scrap we are advised will go to the USO, Red Cross or any organized on the donor designates.

Citizens are expected to find out who their community salvage committee is and give them all the help they can.—M. S. Duncan, Co. Agt.

## Applications For Wheat Parity Ready

Applications for wheat parity payments will be ready for farmers signatures next week. For the convenience of producers the County Office will make the following schedule to sign applications and to sign up those interested in wheat insurance on the 1943 crop:

Today, Friday, Aug. 14th, at Dean Dale. This afternoon, Aug. 14, at Petrolia. Other places were visited earlier in the week.

After this schedule producers will sign parity applications in the County Office. Applications for wheat insurance will be taken in time County Office at all times until Aug. 31. Wheat farmers of Clay County lost \$180,000.00 by not having insurance in 1942.

All Clay County farms should have been checked for compliance end of week. Splendid farmer cooperation has made it possible to complete this work so early. Farmers with over-planted cotton are reminded that prompt disposal of the excess and the deposit of re-check fee is required by the regulations.

Clay County is expected to earn as near as possible the \$120,000.00 set up to assist in soil improvement. If each producer in the county earns his allowance, the high record set by the county the past few years will be maintained. We are told that applications will be accepted and paid in the near future for all farms earning the complete allowance.

It is suggested that each farmer prepare a list of all essential equipment, as well as poultry and livestock in preparation for the plans this fall.—R. Dee Price, Sec. ACA.

American flesh and blood is being sacrificed for democracy in this war is the least we can do at home is to give up freedoms and privileges and devote leisure hours to work, invest savings in war bonds and stamps and give up material necessary for war production.

"SAVE" the FARMERS and Ranchmen, as well as selling the UNIONS not to charge over \$1.00 fee or dues. It just won't work!

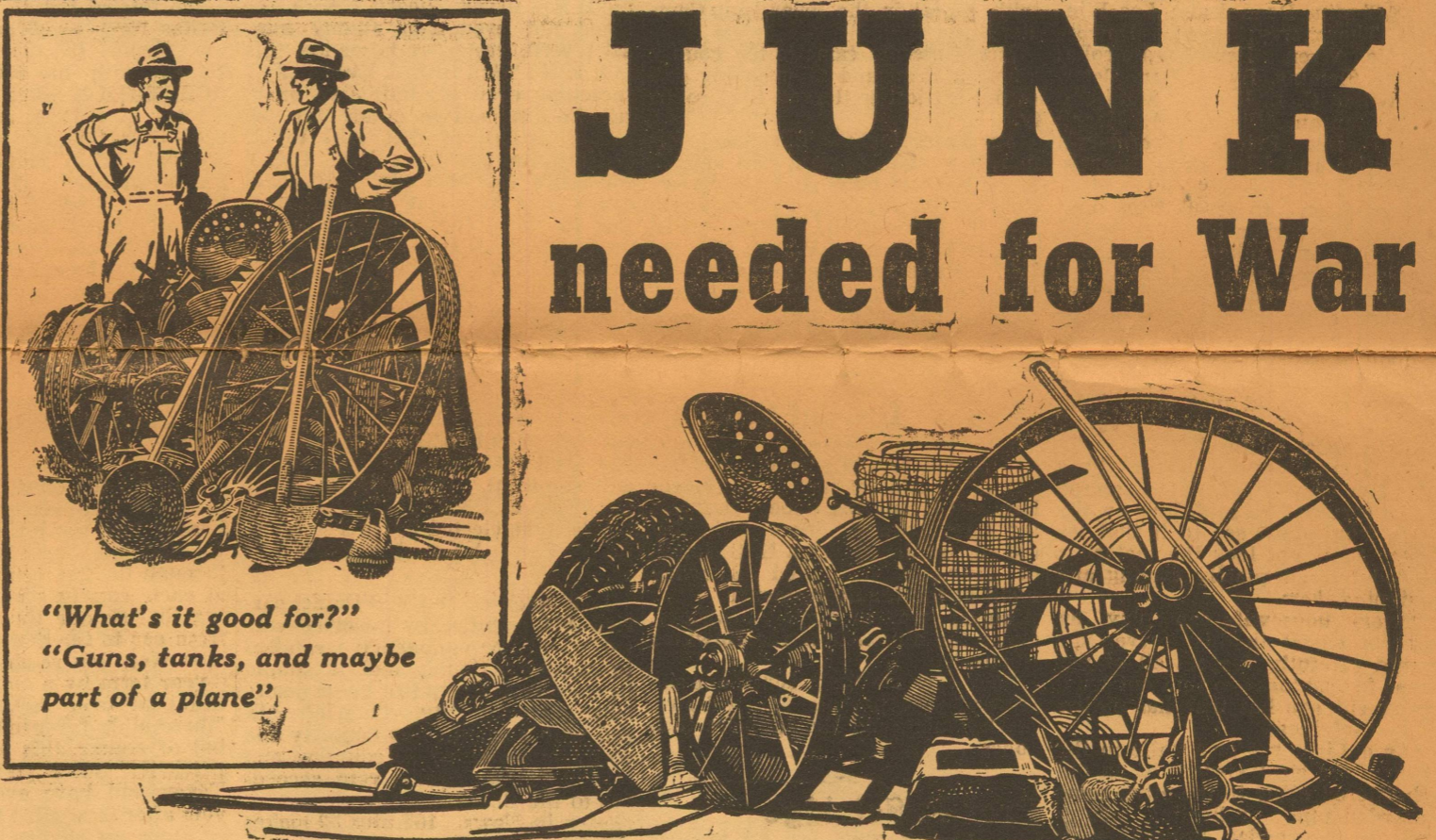

### AMENDMENT

H. J. R. NO. 24  
A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

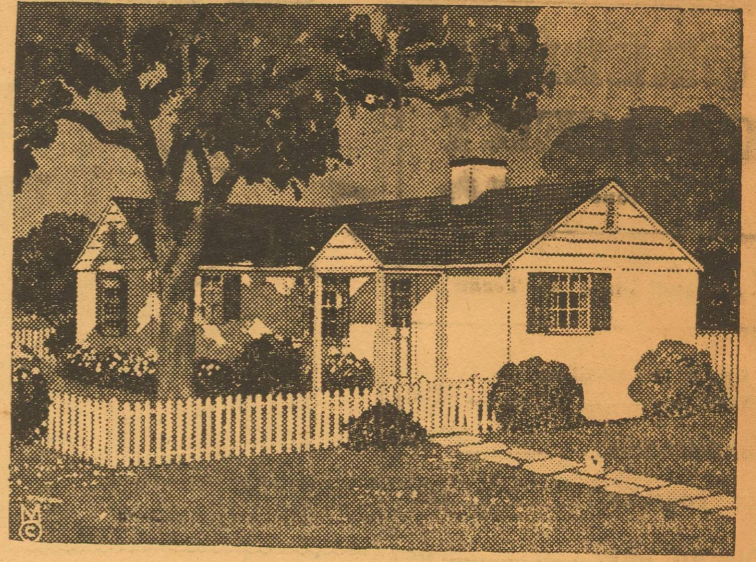

### LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows:

"Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last Federal Census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil criminal or probate matters."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

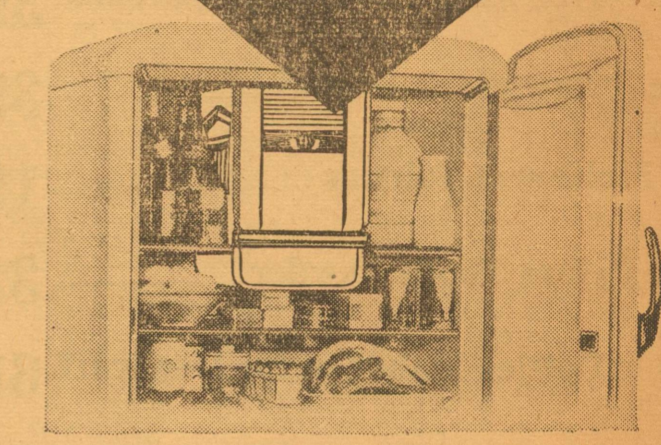
