Home Demonstration

The boys at camp are going to get plenty of food Christmas. Both the Army and Navy training camps have already planned their Christmas dinner menus and have included generous quantities of foods for the feast. But just the same a box of food from home is something special and will get a warm welcome because it is from home. So home economists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture offer these tips to help you make a happy choice in the food you ship to that boy in uniform for Christmas, or later.

Success of any good gift depends on both the food and the packing. You wouldn't want your boy with a big appetite for Mother's cooking to wait in vain for food that leaked or spilled, was moldy, or crushed or broken, or fell out of its wrappings enroute. That happens to many food gifts in spite of the best possible care in handling.

Food in the box from home must be able to stand heat and cold, shaking and knocking about, and as much as ten day's wait in the mail.

Avoid delicate food that breaks easily or greasy, sticky, or moist food unless it is packed especially for safe travel.

Never try to send any food that might spoil in transit. Even if your boy loves your friend chicken better than any food or nearth, don't try to mail it to him at Christmas.

A few days wait near a post office radiator will make that chicken unfit to eat when it arrives.

Before you pack chocolate, cheese doughnuts or any food that will drip grease, or melt when hot, put it in a sealed waxed-paper carton or tight tin.

Don't send any food in glass. The glass may break and your boy may try to eat the food anyway with unfortunate results.

Jelly or jam or any other spread needs to go in a sealed paper container or tight tin surrounded with shredded paper or shaved wood in a heavy cardboard of wooden box, and remember to send a wooden spoon.

Send only enough to eat at one time because barracks provide no room for storing food gifts. By the way, peanut butter and jelly are almost always on the dinner table at army camps so these foods may not be such a treat as some others you could send.

When you are deciding what foods to put in a box, think first of the foods your boy likes best at home. Any of his favorite foods that will ship well deserve first place. Here's one mother who has been shipping fudge cake to her son in Iceland for months. She bakes fudge cake in a pound coffee can, frosts the cake right in the can, puts on the tight tin cover, packs
