Mundy is preparing to irrigate a part of his farm on Dry Fork creek next year, He is building a dam across Dry Fork and will erect a wind mill to force the water over some 30 or 40 acres, which he intends planting all in garden truch. We believe success will crown Mr. Mundy in his efterprise, as one acre of land irrigated will produce as much as ten that depends upon providential rams. For instance, say irrigate one acre of good land, plant in sorghum and by irrigation you can easily raise three crops of sorghum in one year, as only six weeks is required for its production, and three times three is nine, counting on getting three tons of sorghum per acre, which is about the average crop, and you have nine tons of choice feed which sells for \$10 per ton. Early American Sculptors.

It is worthy of special notice that when Rush began to model in clay not one of the artists who have given celebrity to our native sculpture had seen the light of day. Frazer was not born until 1790, nor Ezekiel Augur of New Haven until 1791. The latter was originally in the grocery trade, but failing in that took up modeling and wood carving without any guide except his natural instincts; but like the majority of our early sculptors, with the exception of Rush, his efforts are interesting only as evidence of what talent entirely unobstructed can accomplish.

It was not until 1805, long after Copley, West, Malbone, Allston and Stuart had demonstrated our capacity for pictorial art, that Iliram Powers was born. The same year Horatio Greenough first saw the light of day. In the remote wilds of Kentucky Hart was brought into this world in 1810, and Clevenger, Crawford and Mills followed in 1812, 1813 and 1815. Thus we see that, without hereditary genius or predecessors from whom to copy, Rush achieved his artistic results, and succeeded in winning for himself a European renown which made him the equal of some of the leading foreign carvers and sculptors of his age, and at the same time well earned the title of "father of American sculpture."-Lippincott's.



A peculiar and intensely interesting part of the bacteriological exhibit is one pre-pared for the World's fair by Professor Brieger. It is a collection of the swiftest and most powerful poisons on earth, all gained from the dead bodies of those who fell victims to various deadly bacteria.

FLOWER AND TREE.

The tallest tree on earth, so far as known at present, is a gum tree lately measured in the Cape Otway range, Victoria. This Eucalyptus regnans is 415 feet high.

Plants breathe through the "stomata" or breathing pores in the leaves. In case the plant or tree is of the leafless variety the stem, which is also provided with stomata, performs the office of breathing.

The Japanese persimmon has been grown for some years past in parts of the western shore of Maryland, protected from early frosts by the proximity of the Chesapeake. It is believed that Commodore Perry first sent the seeds of the Japanese persimmon to the United States in 1856.

One of the most remarkable productions of the isle of Chileo is the celebrated "barometer trees," which grow in great profusion in all the salt marshes. In dry weather the bark of this natural barometer is as smooth and white as that of the sycamore, but with the near approach of storms these characteristics vanish like magic and the bark turns black.
