**New Ship-Warning System.**

In the ship-warning system of Mr. C. E. Kelway, signals by Hertzian waves are sent out from the light-houses at regular intervals at the same times as the sound warnings. A vessel in range having a receiver notes the time that passes between receiving the wireless signal and the sound warning and is thus enabled to calculate its distance from the light-house, and, on repeating the observation, after continuing a few miles, data is obtained for ascertaining the exact location of the light-house by trigonometry. **THE IDAHO ASSASSINATIONS.**

The coming sensation in criminology will be the developments in the trials of Moyer and Heywood, President and Secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, and others, for the murder of a former governor of that state. One Orchard has confessed his participation in this and other murders perpetrated. Twenty-six victims is said to have fell by the bombs of an inner circle that was constituted by the officials of this labor organization, and the unfortunate were from a former chief magistrate down to the "scab" miner. A man can belong to the union to-day and be a "scab" to-morrow, and if he wants to work, and give the proceeds to John D. Rockefeller he should be protected, and even encouraged in preference to being an assassin. Yet the accused are more than ordinary men, and were placed in more than ordinary circumstances, and granting that the confession of Orchard is true to the minutest detail, yet after the trials and executions of the accused, what has been accomplished? The Molly Maguires, the Chicago Haymarket, the Pinkertons, the Pullman car strike, were all birds of the same feather, the graft of the hog upon human production. The accused were placed by a secret labor organizations where they had "the sinews of war" at their command were too easily persuaded, by bold and unprincipled men, to countenance, then to join, in such acts. However, as long as mankind can oppress each other so long will there be crimes committed.
