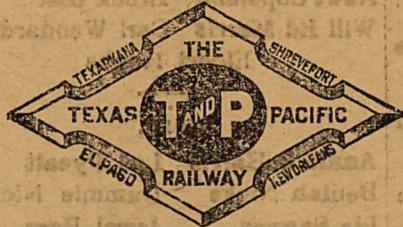

### SOMETHING ABOUT THOSE MOROS THAT GEN. WOOD KILLED.
