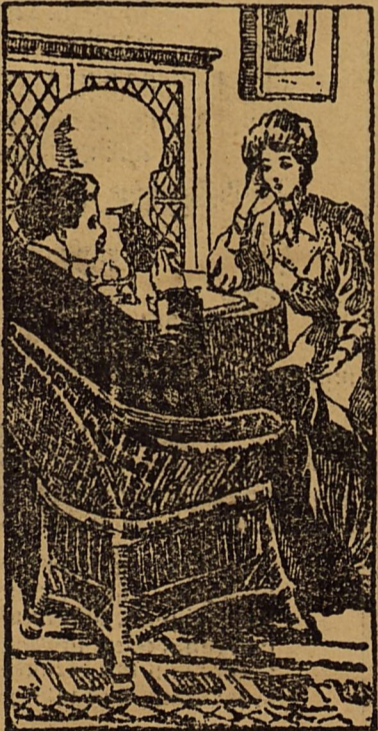

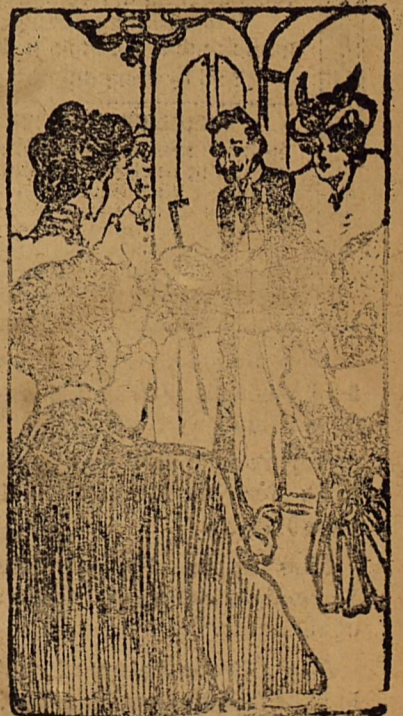
This is the Artist's best girl. Leave her alone, and keep at a distance, young men of Brownfield—she's not for you!

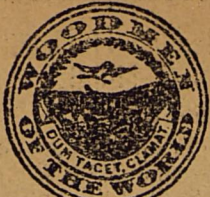

Special Session Commissioners' Court.

The Court having convened in special session on Monday the 26th day of March, A. E. 1906, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at a Special Election held at the several voting places in Terry County, Texas, on Wednesday, March 14th, A. D. 1906, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in Terry County, Texas, and there being present on said day the County Judge and all the County Commissioners of Terry County, and the Court having opened the polls of said election, and counted the votes and verified the returns thereof, and it appearing to the Court that there were cast at said election eighty-two (82) votes, and that sixty-eight (68) votes were cast at said election "For Prohibition" and that fourteen (14) votes were cast "Against Prohibition." It is therefore ordered by the Court that the sale of intoxicating liquors in Terry County, Texas, be and is hereby absolutely prohibited except for the purpose and under the regulations proscribed in Title 69 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, until such time as the qualified voters of Terry County, Texas, may at a legal election held in said county for that purpose, by a majority vote decide otherwise.

The Century Magazine published recently an article written by William J. Bryan, entitled, "Individualism vs. Socialism." Bryan, in a measure, has this disadvantage: in the future, there is a probability that he may be a candidate for the Presidency, and he would not be apt to write anything in the way of political opinions that would be awkward for him to explain afterwards. S. court to enable him to thump his pulpit again. Cheap Summer Rates to California.

The transcontinental lines always have made reductions in the round trip rate to California for a few days each summer, on account of some big national gathering. Not until this year were such low rates authorized for the entire summer. This new departure was adopted in order to stimulate travel to California, and thereby induce Americans to see their own country first, instead of going abroad.

Beginning June 1st, and until the middle of September, first-class tickets will be sold to the principal California points at \$75 from Chicago, \$69 from St. Louis, \$60 from Kansas City, and proportionately from the East generally. These tickets will be limited for return until October 31st.

The Santa Fe also announces that the summer rate to the Grand Canyon of Arizona and return, also to Phoenix and return, will be \$5 less than the above figures.

Tickets sold at rates named will be honored on the California Limited.

During the last week in April and the first week in May, also during the last week in June and the first week in July, the Santa Fe will make a rate of about one fare to California and back, on account of Mystic Shriners' convention at Los Angeles and N. E. A. convention at San Francisco. Several special excursions will be run from Chicago by way of the Grand Canyon.

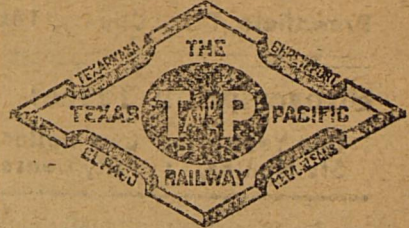
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
