## The Terry County Herald, Ono Santa Fe Spending Nearly \$5,000,000 on the Newest Thing in Cars.

The modern steel underframe mail cars now in general use on the Santa Fe System lines are the nowest thing in railway equipment. They are of the lat est design. Everything has been included that could add to the comfort and safety and facilitate the work of the postal clerks. It is claimed that the improved underframe postal cars, with their six-wheeled trucks, move over the rails without appreciable jar or vibration. The Santa Fe enjoys the distinction of being the only railroad in the United States operating such cars as a parl of the regular equipment. A few other lines are experimenting with them, but it has remained for the Santa Fe to be the first to adopt them. In addition to those now operated on the Santa Fe there are undar way at the shops thirty-nine more of thece cars, all of them to be sixty feet long.

The steel underframe cars last longer and are more economical than the old style. They are also practically proof against destruction in any ordinary aceident. The steel underframe marks a notable step forward in ear-building-as important in sky-scraping cffice buildings. It means greater safety and greater durability. It has come to stay, No up-to-date railway can hereafter be without it.

The underframe of the new cars consists of four massive steel sills extending the entire length of the car. To these sills are attached, by steel needles, heavy solid steel cross-beams. This construction renders the buckling up or breaking in two of a car almost impossible.

Of the steel underframe class to be operated by the Santa Fe System, there are now under way sixty standard baggage cars seventy feet long; 4,500 standard box cars, 38 feet long, capacity 70,000 poundei 850 coal cars with drop bottoms, capacity 100,000 pounds; 450 Rogers ballast cars, capacity 100,000 pounds; 1,250 flat cars, JO feet long, capacity 80,000 pounds: 100 side cars, 80,-One would think that the dust 000 pounds capacity; 1.000 dropnuisance had been banished for bottom stock and coke cars, and 300 furniture cars of 70,000
