Oklahoma a State.

Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and also Arizona and New Mexico have bright prospects for becoming states soon. Once in a while Congress forgets itself and does something good, that is cannot undo. These territories have been long knocking at the door, and now they have actually been given a peep inside, the consequence is, that all over Oklahoma and Indian Territory, the bands are playing, "Johnny is Marching Home."

LATER—The bill has passed and the President has signed it, and now Oklahoma can join the cotillion of states and march along in the great national wake walk of progress. Indian Territory and Oklahoma will make one state. New Mexico and Arizona will come in as one state provided the citizens of those two territories approve of it by a referendum vote. All the territory now held on the continent of America, that belongs to the United States, with the exception of Alaska and the District of Columbia, will soon have a limited self-government. Porto Rico may be disposed of by giving it to Florida or some adjoining state, or else it can be made a separate one. The Hawaiian Islands can be given to California, but as to the Philippines give them independence. This country does not need any more territory, unless it is from Mexico, and when that is done take in the whole nation at one swipe.

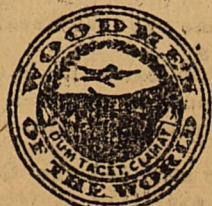

FIGURING UP A TREE.

Once in a while some fellow will take a wagon, piano, sewing machine or a jug of bug-juice and will make an estimate of its cost from the time it was started until it reached the consumer. Take for instance a Nevada pine tree that has 8,000 feet of lumber in it: it will take \$2 to have it choppen down, say \$6 to have it sawed into logs, and \$12 to have it hauled to the saw-mill. To saw it up into marketable shape the customary price is half; that leaves 4,000 feet to each of the parties, but the party that brought it to the sawmill has already spent \$20 worth of labor or money on 4,000 feet. Now it is ready for the consumer, at \$5 per thousand feet. But the consumer can't go there to get it, so it must be taken to where he is, and of course this must be done by railroads. The truth of the matter is that everything on a railroad costs money, there is no natural bridges or anything of that kind to take advantage of—everything in its construction is created by human labor, even the earth over which it glides is tortured into shape by human hands and the strength of human back-bones. The man that has a car-load of lumber in Nevada or elsewhere, cannot put it upon the trustees and slip it through. He must go plump up against the highcookers and make arrangements, and right here is where money counts. It costs something to run that car of lumber from Nevada to Big Springs in the way of coal, oil, and incidentals. It costs something to build a railroad, and if you don't believe it, go and build one yourself. It takes an army of employes to keep one in good business shape. If this nation had had no railroads the buffalo might of still roamed our prairies. In 1826 the first railroad was built, and Indiana and Illinois were then frontiers. It would have been an impossibility to have transported one Nevada tree of such size to Texas at that time. There was some commerce in lumber along the coasts and streams, but as an inland developer railroads are the real thing.

Eight Millions For Toys.
The real amount of cash money paid out in the United States alone for toys that on Christmas morning gladden the hearts of American children is conservatively estimated at \$8,000,000. This means about 60 cents apiece for the something like 13,000,000 of five to twelve year old children. The children of no other country on the globe have anything like so lavish an average amount of money expended for toys for them, not even the children of Germany—Germany, the home of toy-making and toy giving. Verily, indeed, the lot of the American child has been cast in the richest sort of clover when it comes to toy getting and not a few other things in the bargain.—Cincinnati Enquirer.
