Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

Joint Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars yaluation, to pay jurors.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of

That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitu tion of the State of Texag, be so amended as to hereafter read ns followsi

Section 9. The State tax on property, ex clasive of the tax hecessary to pay the publi other person, any free pass, debt, and of the taxes provided for the bonefit c frank, rebate, privilege or ad the public free schools, shall never exceed thir. ty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valua-tion; and no covnty, city or town shall levy mere than twenty-five cents for city or county company, telegraph company, purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for the recompany, or other corporation, valuation, except for the regree to the recompany. or any persons, firm or corporas tion acting as a common carrier of september 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water the Legislature violating this works, and other permanent improvements, no provision shall forfeit his office: to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundre-dollars valuation, in eny one year, and ex

The questien being pretty generally discussed among the people and being of more than passing interest as to whether a citizen of an unorganized county can hold an office in the county to which it is attached for Judicial purposes the editor submitted the question to the Attorney General of the State and received the following answer:

ATTORNEY GENERALS' DEPART-MENT, STATE OF TEXAS. AUSTIN, June 21, 1906. H.N. W. R. SPENCER,

Brownfield, Texas. Dear Sir:-

We are in receipt of yours of the 18th and in reply thereto you are advised that a party who is a resident of the unorganized county of Yoakum, which is attached to Terry County for Judicial purposes, cannot hold the office of County Judge of Terry County.

We publish this opinion early in the action so that no man can conscientiously say that he was not fairly dealt with, and that same was a campaign lie, and that no time was given for an answer. We have always thought the Statute plain on this question and free from any doubt, but as some seemed to doubt it, we thought it proper to throw all the light on the question possible.

The Act of 1895, page 81 provides that "no person shall be " elegible to any county or state office in the State of Texas un-· less he shall have resided in

" twelve months, and six months "in the county in which he offers "himself as a candidate next " preceding any general or spec-"ial election, and shall have been an actual bona fide citizen in said county fore more than six months."
