Proposed Amendment to the State The Proposed Amend. Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from

Taxation.

JOINT RESOLUTION to smend Sec. tion 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.

Be it resolved by the Logislature of the State of Texas:

Bection I. That Section 2 of Article VIII, or the Constitution of the State of Terras, what be so amended that the same shall road an collows, to-wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be squal and uniform ubon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tar; j but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public laws, exempt from taration public preperty used for public purposes; actua: places of relligous worship: places of bural not held for private corporate profit; al, buildinge used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for scheet purposes and the necessary furnituae of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutious of learning and religion ot used with a view to profit and when the same are; invested in bonds for mortgages, or in land on other property which has been and Shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under 'foreolosure sales of public buildings, streets," sewers, watermerigages; thet such exemption of such land to exceed the permanent improvements, hot and property shall ecatinue only fir two yhars after the purchase of the same at such sale by sucg institutions and no longer, and Institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting praperty from taxation othel than the proper)y above-mentioned shall be mail and void."

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Excrion 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Toxas:

That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitug tion of the State of Texag, be so amonded as to hereafter read ns follows!

Section 9. The State tax on property, ex. clusive of the tax beceasary to pay the public debt and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public iree schools, shall never exceed ?thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall lev Texas, for their approval or dis-mere than twenty-five cents for city or (county approval, the following amendpurposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and; not exceeding fiftee cents to pay Purors, en the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debtz incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment of September 25th. 1888, and for the erection to exceed twenty-five cents'on the one hundres dollars valuation, in any one 'year, and 'except as is in this Constitution otherwise provded; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax' to be levied and "collected for the further maintenance of the public roadsr provised, that a majoriyt of the qualified property tax-paping voters 5f the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taintion in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local actice feguired for special or local laws.

Section 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in Nevember exempting from taxation andowmont funds used 4988, a which election all voters favoring this arors,"

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of

izing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment to Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franks. rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons or corporations, SECTION 1. BE IT RESOLVED

BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of approval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texns, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relat. ing to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

SECTION 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensatioh for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day ier each day of every special session held during the cecend year of the term for which snid members shall be elected. In addition to said com. pensation the memhers of each nouse shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by laad, regardless of railways or water routes. and the Comptroller of the State shall HODER and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or backed by an indictment of the hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each age for any extra session that may be called within one day of United States of America, com- after the adjournment of any issued by a probate court in In-dian territory. 





He has collected details of 10,000 cases of suicide from 1897 to 1901 and analyzed them with respect to the age, sen, social relations and other common factors of their victims, and the known or apparent cause of their self-destruc-
