Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VIII, of the Conatttution of the State of Texas, shall be so amended that the same shall read an

House Joint Resclution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amend-ment to Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of memhers of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons or corporations, Section 1. And it shall be un. lawful for any of such mem-bers to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or in-directly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone cempany, sloeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corpora-
