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Weathlest Ruyal Family.





Proposed Amendment To the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of State

Legislators. House Joint Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of this Article. of the poople of the State of

Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 2, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and Proposed Amendment mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves, or for others, by members of the Legislature, of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

Section 1. 

Proposed Amendment TO THE

State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax*to Pay Jurors.

Joint Resolution amending Sectlon 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows.

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefitof the public free schools, shall never / exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, and no county. city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or connty purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection /of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improve-ments, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Leg to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads, provided that a majorbloom ity of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Section 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation of for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring a this amendment ehall have written or printed on their ballots:



It requires men of sterner stuff than what Russians are made of to establish the genuine article of liberty in that nation. When it comes to bragging and howling, and incendiary clamor, the Russians can not only take the cake but they appropriate the whole bake oven. Russia has never produced such characters as the Bidneys, the Raleighs, and Har-risons of England, who can look calmly beyond the grave and sacrifice their few remaining days for the benefit of posterity. Occasionally a misguided royolutionist shows nerve, and dies. bidding defiance to tyranny, but to make; a hero it requires calm courage with deliberateness. Russia to-day is about where England was under King John. Ehe difference is that the present Czar is trying to give his people a coat of galvanized liberty, while the subjects of King John had to just naturally sick a re-spect for liberty into him.

Oest of Oarangie Libraries.

Carnegie libraries cost something. Mr. Carnegie recently said: "I have helped found 760 libraries and have 800 more under advisement." This will make, say, 1,500 in all. During last year he gave 158 library buildings, at a cost to him of \$6,-679,000, so the average cost of the buildings is \$42,270, and 1,500 of them will aggregate \$63,405,000. Now, under the contract with Carnegie, the cities blessed must tax themselves annually 10 per cent of the cost of the buildings to provide funds for their maintenance. This would be \$6,340,500 every year in addition to the interest on more than \$30,000,000 paid by the cities for fibrary sites. By these transactions the libraries will cost Mr. Carnegie each year, at 5 per cent interest on his investment, \$3,170,250, while the interest to the cities at the same rate will be \$7,840,500, or two and a half thoses as much.
