Julian M. Bassett, founder of the town, owns about 50,000 acres of land surrounding the now townsite. He recently this huge tract up into sma farms and proposes to sell it out to actual settlers who wish to cultivate the land. It is stated tha he will adopt a poliey of extreme $\mathrm{l}_{\text {iberality }}$ in the disposal of the Rassett town property, and will probably use it to a very larg purchase the surrounding farming lands. Reports say that he will give away some of the town lots to the purchasers of th farming lands.
Importance is given the Bas sett move by the peculiar condi tions now prevaling in Crcsby county. That section of the country is largely in possession of a few men who own large blocks of land. Many of these owners have persistently refused to cut up their property and tlers. This is true of the immediate locality in which the county seat Emma, is located, and this very condition is said to be responsible for the great handicap that town has suffered in the past and is still suffering.
Men conversant with the situa tion declare it is practically im possible for the present count degree of growth until these large holdings are cut up and disposed to settlere, and as the ${ }^{0}$ wners refuse to cut it up it ap. pears that town is doomed to long period of inactivity. An important feature of the situation is the fact that the pressnt move for the establish ment of a new town is believed by many to have for one of its objects the removal of the coun. ty seit from Emma to the new town. Once settled up with number of small farmers with the land cut up into tracts suit able for farming on a small scale, it is poin on a smal scale, it is pointed hold overy advanBat or overy adan be remembered that the seat of government for Crosby county has already been changed once. Yoars ago it was looated at the old town of Marietta, now known as Estacado, but was finally moved to Emma,--Hale County Herald.
