#### TERRY COUNTY.

#### LAND PRICES.

Terry county is thirty miles square, situated eighty miles north from Stanton. on the T. & P. railroad, and about eighty southwest from Plainview, terminus of the Santa Fe; was organized in 1904, and has about 2,000 population. ALL WHITE, about 400 homes, mostly farmers and stock farmers, 350 schools children, a school house in reach of every cummunity, and a school fund of \$15 per scholar. The soil is of a sandy nature,

but one-half of the county is firm mixed hard land with enough sand to plow well, level and smooth. Portions of this land is covered with short grass and mesquite and catelaw bushes: other portions with sage grass and shinery, and a great deal of the county is a mixture of both, with clay foundation. The country being level. not having any running streams or mountains the land catches and holds every drop of rain that falls-none is wasted. The GRASS is splendid grazing for cattle and other stock, and furnishea a living for thousands of cattle every year. The land produces fine corn, kaffir corn, maize, Sugar cane, cotton equal to, and averages with Central Texas and Oklahoma per year and per acre, while melons, potatoes, onions and vegetables are superior to that of either place. The RAIN-FALL is amply sufficient to produce good crops every year. as the farmers who have lived in Terry county for the past four years will bear testimony. Trees of all kinds that have been planted grow very rapidily; the water is pure, free from alkali, gypsom or salt, and found in abundance at 60 to 120 feet. Several large orchards in the county to bear young trees set out every season. The climate is dry in winter and early spring, and is as mild as Central Texas, and it is noted that during the past two winters several severe blizzards passed miles east, and never affected country. this county. Like all prairie countries the wind blows at times rather hard, and on our deepest sandy land, will blow the sand when plowed up, but this is not the case with all the county. Fuel is obtained from the large grubs under the mesquite, some of which are six and eight feet long, large as a stove pipe, while some use coal, hauled from the railroad. A man can cultivate a great deal more land here than in Central Texas or Oklahoma.


Anncuncement was made Monday of the completion of a deal whereby J. B. Gray sold to W. Q. Richards 11,000 acres of the Moon ranch in Cottle county for \$55,000 cash. Mr. Richards owns an adjoining ranch and will add this 11,006 acres to his already large holdings, making the entire tract comprise about 75,000 acre He is raising fine stock, cattle, horses and hogs and of the 11,000 Acres expects to put 1,000 acres in cultivation.

Gray bought 100,000 acres comprising the Moon ranch from some Englishman in 1901 at \$1.75 an acre. Since that time he has been selling it off in smaller portions and at advanced prices. He sold 35,000 acres to Mr. Richards in 1902 and now has only 3,000 acres of choice land left for which he expects to get about \$15 an acre.-Lubbock Avalanche,
