Owing to the washouts on the T. & P. Railway between East. land and Fort Worth, the U. S. mail has been having a roundabout way in reaching its destination. One washout a mile in length near the Brazos on last Friday has prevented any through trains arriving but it is thought the train service will soon be normal. At present one train each way makes the trip from El Paso to Baird.

The mail has been going around by way of Wichita Falls and consequently has been several days late in making its appearance. At Abilene the mail is turned over to the T & P Railway axd at one time ten tons had accumulated there.

Until the through trains are again in operation we will be several days behind in hearing the events of the day.

Several days here the post office employes have been kept very busy handling the large amount of delayed mail.-Big Springs Herald.

TERRY COUNTY.

The climate is dry in winter and early spring, and is as mild as central Texas, and it is noted that during the past two winters several severe blizzards passed far south of us, one hundred miles east, and never affected this county. Like all prarie countries the wind blows at times rather hard, and on our deepest sandy land will blow the sand when plowed up, but this is not the case with all the county.

Dr. J. D. Stocking, health officer of Donley county, has caused to be widely circulated a message containing valuable hints and suggestions as to the best method of battling with the dread disease, typhoid, which generally makes its appearance in the spring of the year.

Typhoid is emphatically a germ disease, and prevails throughout the civilized world, water, milk Typhoid is emphatically a germ and flies being the three chief sources or agents of infection.

The great source of infection is always through the excrements of the body of the patient, in all of which the bacillas typhosus literally swarms. This fact has been positively proven, and many interesting records made of the results of drinking water that has been infected by these discharges

It is neither healthful nor exhilarating to drink a clear solution of cewage from a privy, however diluted, but as a matter of fact it is astonishing how long communities may drink sewage laden water with comparative impunity, so lang as the sewage contains no typhoid discharges. This fact has been proven by investigations prompted by development of typhoid fever, when the water would
be discovered to contain the germ that could be traced to typhoid discharges that had recently been deposited in a cesspool which had for years been polluting the water unoticed.

Milk vessels should always be washed with pure water. A fact regarding the typhoid germ not generally known and yet very important to be known, that proper care may be taken, is that for months after the recovery of the patient there are millions of germs still in the system capable of being transmitted through the excrements.

The last method of the transmission of the germ is by direct contact with the patient. This method is comparatively rare, and comes from soiled hands that are not properly cleansed before something is handled and eaten. the sick room or a luncheon that has been left on the table or sideboard for the night watch, and been walked over by the filthy fly is a dangerous thing.

C. S. Giddings, of Marshaltown Iowa, collector for Spaulding Buggy Co., fell dead last Friday evening at the home of J. N. Groves about ten miles southeast of town. Mr. Giddings had been driving over the county in pursuance of his business and had come to the Groves ranch about 4 o'clock that evening and taken violently ill, no one being at home he staved in the crib nearly all evening. When Mr. and Mrs. Groves came home about 4 o'clock he was up, came forward and made himself known, told them of his sickness. They offered him a bed, but he said he was better and thought he could make it to Tahoka, but was requested to remain over night, he accepted, and about sundown went out to the barn to attend to feeding the team, and when in the act of putting some corn in the box, he fell backward and expired immediately. 


