The school census must be taxen in May. Children must be enumerated

by the trustee in the district and county of their residence.

county of their residence. In case of two or more schools it the same district the trustees should make a division of the fund between the schools in the month of September,

Local tax fund cannot bs transferred.

No teacher related to any member of the board of trustees can be employed to teach said school.

Trustees may sue or be sued in any court having jurisdiction. Trustees must be able to read and write.

Trustees who are not qualified may be removed by the county attorney by suit.

Trustees removing from the district where elected vacate the office of trustee.


Trustees may expel pupils. Teachers cannot.

Trustees may extend the scholastic age in local tax districct. Trustees should approve the monthly and term report, signing the voucher. See School Laws, Sec. 71.

Trustees have power to employ and dismiss teachers. Before dismissing a teacher, the teacher should have a copy of the charges and if dismissed shall have the right to appeal to the county and state snperintendents.

Census trustees of independent districts must make their reports to the county superinfor the insanity it begets, for its tendent. The census trustee of an independent district must be appointed by the president of the school toard.

Census trustees should read carefully all of section 57 school laws of Texas
