Presidential Fortunes,

Since Grover Cleveland's estate is shown to be less than \$100,000 it becomes an item of interest to know the wealth of presidents at death. George Washington was the second American millionaire, leaving an estate worth more than a million dollars; Adams, the elder was comfortably rich for that day, but Jefferson died a puaper. Madison left several thousand dollars, as did Monroe, and John Quincy Adams was wealthy for the time in which he lived. Jackson died a pauper; Van Buren, his sucessor and friend, a million aire; General Harrison died poor, as did Tyler, but the latter was four times a rich man. President Polk was born wealthy obtained about the same as his heritage throughout life. General Taylor was a fortune cheaser and worth \$150,000. Franklin Pierce was rich; Buchanan was worth about \$40,000, largely saved from his salary. Lincoln was always poor ond gave way the most of his surplus. Johnson was what was called well-to-do for that period. Grant died a pauper, save for half million insurance and sale of his memoirs. Haves was rich and Arthur and Garfield both left nice estates. McKinly died rich, but was poor the greater portion of his life. Benjamin Harrison's estate inventoried \$78,000, Rocsevelt inherited \$3,000,000 and has added to his inheritance a third more.-Ex.



TAXATION-SUBMITTING AMEND MENT TO CONSTITUTION.

Joint Resolution amending Section 9, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted on school districts and providing for a majority vote of the property tax paying voters of such district to vote such tax. Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amend-

ed as to hereafter read as follows: Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the \$100 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the pub-lic free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein, provided that a ma-jority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voing at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE COMPENSATION OF THE GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution Special attention paid to of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8000) dollars and with the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, said Section 5 as amended, to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times,

receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$3,000) dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and

That Section 17 be so amended as to

read as follows:
Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refusa to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be suc ceeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per year, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the gov-ernment, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been em-

ployed in the duties of his office.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State 13 hereby directed to issue and have pubpersons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their bal-lots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,-500) dollars per annum." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as fellows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,-500) dollars per annum." And the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay th expenses of such publication, proclamation and election. 

STATE CONSTITUTION RELAT-ING TO COMMISSIONERS' PRE-

Joint Resolution to amend Section 13, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for subsequent redistricting of a county into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation there-

for. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Each organized county in the State, now or hereafter existing, snall be di-vided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each biennial election, one justice of the peace and one constable, each of whom shall hold his effice for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, that in post office as it is the nicest of any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance, be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as

jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.

Sec. 2. That the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State, at the next general or special election in the manner required by law, by the Gover-


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
