To Keep Water neions.

Some one has suggested a very simple method of keeping watermelons fresh for several months and preventing them from becoming too ripe. We have not tested it, but the plan is inexpensive and has some merit of reason in it, and we would suggest that it is worth a trial. The melons should be taken from the vine as soon as it is fully ripe, by cutting the stem near the the melon. There should be no bruises nor soars on the rind. Take a piece of ordinary sealing wax, melt it and cover the cut part of the stem scurely and put the melon away in a cool place. > PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE COMPENSATION OF THE GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

> Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$5000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$3000) dollars and with the use and

as amended, to read a Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

That Section 17 be so amended as co

read as follows: Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refusa to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be surceeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per year, and no more. During the time he administers the government as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been em-

ployed in the duties of his office.
Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be voted upon on the day of the next general election of some of the finest specimens or on the day fixed by law therefor. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,-500) dollars per annum." opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as fellows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,-500) dollars per annum." Joint Resolution to amend Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation theresubsequent redistricting of a county

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of

Section 1. That Section 18, Article of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

venience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each his successor shall be electcity of eight thousand or more inhab-Itants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance, be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualifled. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall com-pose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.
