Archeologists are excited over a recent find of great importance in the Valey of the Tombs of the Kings of Thebes, where the jewels of the wife of Seti I, have been brought to light. Seti was a royal lady of the ninetenth dynasty, who lived about 1,300 years B. C. and was brobably no less a person than the wife of the Pharaoh of "Exodus." It is said that there are bracelets of heavy gold. earrings several inches in length bearing the cartouche of the royal wearer, rings of elaborate workmanship, and fillets of gold which the Queen wore round her head, but no one but the fortunate finders and experts have yet viewed the treasure—with the exception of Sir Eldon and Lady Gorst. The tomb itself proved empty, but to make up for the disappointment the jewles were found a few days later imbedded in mud where later imbedded in mud, where they had probably been thrown by robbers of some bygone age, who plunderd the tomb of the royal dead.
