The country being level, not having any running streams or mountains, the land catches and holds every drop of rain that falls-mone is wasted. The grass is splendid grazing for cattle and other stock, and furnishes a living for thousands of cattle every year. The land produces fine corn, taffir corn, maize, sugar case, cothon equal to and averages with Central Texas and Oklahoma per year and per acre, while me/ous, polatores, ontons and vegatables are superior to that of either place. The rainfall is amply sufficient to produce good crops every year, as the farmers who have lived in Terry county for the past four years will bear testimony. Trees of all kinds that have been planted grow very rapidly; the water is pure, free from alkali, gypsom or sait, and found in abundance at 60 to 120 feet. Several large orchards in the county to bear fruit this year, and thousands of young trees set out every season.

The climate is dry in winter and early spring, and is as mild as Central Texas, and it is noted that during the past two winters several severe blizzards passed far south of us, one hundred miles east, and never affected this county. Like all prairie countries the wind blows at times rather hard, and on our deepest sandy land will blow the sand when plowed up, but this is not the case with all the connty. Fuel is obtained from the large grubs under the mesquite, some of which are six and eight feetlong, large as a stove pipe, while some use coal, hauled from the railroad. 


