ference met in its 43rd annual Stamford Collegiate Institute. session Wednesday morning Nov. 11th. The old town of Waco was the host of the Conference and the daily sessions were held in the beautiful auditorium of the Austin avenue church. Bishop Joseph S. Key was the presiding officer.

Waco had on her fall attire and her magnificent trees with leaves of crimson and purple and saffron and gold delighted the eyes of people from the western part of the State. A cold norther blew up the morning the conference opened and the snap of the air put vim and vigor into everything.

Bishop Key called the conference to order at 9 a. m. and after religious services the election of secretary was called and Dr. John Barcus, who has been the secretary of this conference for many years, was re-elected. The roll was called and 243 clerical delegates and 27 lay delegates answered. This number, of course, was made larger as the conference advanced and other delegates arrived. After a felicitous address of welcome by County Judge McCulloch, the conference proceeded to call the roll of superanuate preachers. Am nunition Manufacture

In the manufacture of metallic; possible shooting must be determined by many tests and experiments, after which the loading must be done by such implements general election, which resulted as will ensure the accurate measuring or the powder and seating of the bullet. So great has been the development of ammunition making, that the most accurate results in its use are demanded, and the manfacturer is obliged to use machinery that is absolutely unfailing in its many operations. 
