Kaffir Corn for Export.

G. S. Patterson, the grain buyer, says he this week bought the "boss" kaffir corn crop of the season from T. F. Lewallen, about twelve miles west of town. Mr. Lewallen's kaffir was all sod these products to maket, the crop and brought him 90 cents a hundred. Mr. Petterson says he paid over the market price because the grain was extra good and free from other seeds. He also bought from Mr. Lewallen 600 bushels of Big German millet seed, the best millet, Mr. Patterson says he ever saw here, and which brought the producer \$1.50 per hundred weight.

The kaffir corn has been sold by Mr. Patterson to Galveston parties who are loading a ship for England, where it will be manufactured into pancake flour for the English trade. There will will be about 100,000 pounds of the Donley county grain in the shipment.

Mr. Patterson is loud in his praise of Mr. Lewallen's farming methods, and considers him one of the best farmers in the Panhandle. That he knows how is evidenced by the fact that his kaffir and millet alone have brought him about \$2,000. This shows conclusively that kaffir corn is a paying crop when properly handled.—Banner Stockman Clarendon.

Late experience shows that kaffir corn and mile maize are to be the great paying crops in West Texas in the future. The above article is only one instance where kaffir corn has paid the raisers great profits. This paper is reliably informed that the farmers of Scurry county have found a ready market for this year's crop. One grain dealer in Snyder has paid out \$50,000 already for these greins. The crops there are being threshed, the stalks being tern into threads and with the fodder baled for hay, and the grain hauled to the railroad and shipped to mills at Dublin and other places in in that part of the the state. There it is mariufactured into flour and put on the market. It is said that one bushel of either grain will make 25 pounds of flour which will sell for \$3,50 per hundred.

Heretofore the farmers could only utilize these grains for stock feed, but in the future they will find as ready market as wheat and corn. There is no other place in all the world where milo maize and kaffir corn can be raised with greater success than on the Texas Plains. They will grow here with a great deal less cultivation than any other

crops, and make a greater yield to the acre.

Kaffir corn and milo maize will pay much better than cotton or wheat, and there is no such thing as crop failures in planting these grains. With a railroad to carry Plains will be made the best farming country in Texas.






