





New Auto Line.

What is perhaps the longest and straightest auto line in Texas is the one just opened from Hereford to Big Springs, Texas, a distance of 225 miles. A party of sixteen persons made the initial trip the first of this week, coming from Big Springs, Brownfield and other points along the route. Four big machines were used.
