of horticulture. The course of study covers pretty fully the different lines of horticulture; it embraces the following subjects: Elementary principles of plant culture, nursery methods truck gardening, orchard culture small fruits, plant breeding, viticulture, spraying, greenhouse, citrus fruits, experimental horticulture, besides work in landscape gardening, floral culture and elementary forestry. The student is taught these subjects by means of textbooks and lectures. In order to develop the practical side of the student, he is given from two to four hours a week in outdoor work, which comprises practice in building, grafting, pruning, thinning fruit, spraying, setting out orchards and planting vegetables. He is taught how to mix and apply fertilizers and he is also shown the best methods of cultivating the different horticultural crops. The department now has growing on the Station

his own State, but also enables him to become personally acquainted with some of the best practical horticulturists of the United States, and at the same time to familiarize himself with the methods used by such men. The recent laws passed by the legislature requiring elementary agriculture to be taught in the public and normal schools has created a demand for graduates of agricultural colleges as teachers. On account of the fact that most of the work of elementary agriculture is of a horticultural nature this department is making a strong effort to prepare young men for this important line of work. A number of the students are already engaged in this work in the State, and at the present time the department is unable to supply the demand.

This department can not begin to supply the demand made on it for young men well prepared in the different branches or horti-

We are accustomed to proclaim that 'The resources of Texas are limitless' and then let it go at that. What the intelligent citizenship of Texas—those who love their State, want to see her grow commercially, industrially, agriculturally and in every other desirable way and are willing to do what they can to help her grow—what they must do first is to know their own State; they must acquaint them-

### Work at the A. & M. College

The aim of the department of horticulture at the A. & M. College of Texas is twofold: First, to develop scientific horticulturists; second, to turn out practical fruit and truck growers. This statement does not mean that there are two distinct courses, but that when a student finishes the course he is prepared in either the scientific or the practical side

grounds about thirty-six of the different leading commercial varieties of peaches, forty varieties of plums eighteen varieties of paper-shell pecans, fifty varieties of grapes a persimmon, pear and fig orchard, and small fruits consisting of blackberries and dewberries.

Besides the theoretical and practical work given at the College, the student is sent out during the summer to work in the orchards and truck farms of the largest growers, not only in this but in several of the other leading fruit States. Excursions are arranged during the school year for visiting the largest and most successful fruit and truck farms in the State. This not only gives the young man a good knowledge of the horticultural work done in

culture, and it can be safely stated that this great industry has only just begun in the State.

### Let Texas Grow.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas—May 18—An energetic campaign with a view to building up a membership of ten thousand before the next annual meeting which will convene at Houston in December, will be launched within the next few days by the Texas Industrial Congress which has established headquarters in this city. An urgent appeal will be addressed to all loyal and patriotic Texans who are desirous of the organization. Dues have been fixed at \$5 per annum and it is believed that difficulty will be experienced in inducing

the fullest possible development of the wonderful resources of this great State. I believed, and still believe, that there are men in Texas better equipped, by knowledge of conditions and experience than I, to direct the affairs of this important organization which in my opinion, is destined under right guidance and proper support to wield a mighty influence in shaping the commercial and industrial future of Texas, but since the high honor has fallen upon me, I here pledge myself to discharge the duties incumbent upon me, to the best of my ability.

"I believe there is a great field of work for the TEXAS INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS. The organization was born of an appre-

This vote was hurriedly taken and only a small percent of the voters in the town voted, but we believe that the vote in the county will be divided between Davidson and Poindexter, with Johnson and Colquitt bringing up the rear.

The Road to Tahoka.

The Commissioners Court last term, decided to open up and put in first class traveling condition, the public road running east from Brownfield to the county line, there to intersect the road from Tahoka, and Commissioners Gist and Copeland were sent to inspect the road, and to see the Commissioners at Tahoka. They returned Tuesday evening and reported that the Lynn county Commissioners would at once put to work on the road in their county, and have it cleared out and graded to the County line. The people of Tahoka very promptly made up \$150 in cash, and turned over to our Commissioners for the work on the road. The Commissioners Court of this county will convene in special session Monday next to the contract for grading of the road to the County line. This part of the road is very sandy and with some work and expense can be made into a fine road, meeting the Lynn county road at the county line, will give us a splendid roadway to Tahoka. The trains are now running into Tahoka, which is only 28 miles east of here, and no doubt most of the freighting and travel will be to that point for railroad facilities, for this and Yoakum Counties, and the road will be greatly needed, and of convenience to practically all of Terry county. The Herald believes that bad roads cost more than good ones, and we are glad to see this progressive step taken and hope that by our next issue we can report much work in actual progress. The Tahoka people knew a good thing, and are spending money and are making efforts on the road, and Lynn county will build the road in her boundaries out of its own funds. It will be a great thing for Tahoka, and no small item to Brownfield, Gomez and Terry County, thus it is a commendable step. Maids and Matrons.

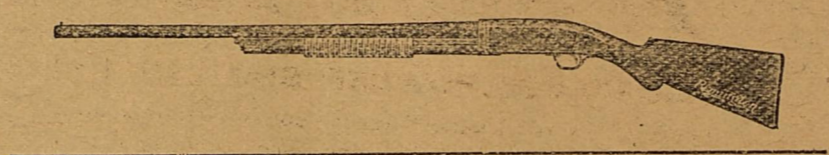

Reports come from our neighboring county, Yoakum, on the west that there is a large acreage being planted in corn and feed stuff than ever before since any farming has been done there. During the past two years there has been nearly 200 sections of land taken from the cow range in Yoakum county placed in the hands of the stock and farmer and small ranchmen. Yoakum is attracting a great deal of attention abroad for the reason that its lands are cheaper than those of most other counties on the plains. But their cheapness does not mean that they are less productive than other Counties. On the contrary, the lands of Yoakum county will grow as fine products as any other county in West Texas. They are especially adapted to the production of corn all kinds of feed stuff fruit and vegetables. Water is usually found there at shallow depths and of an excellent quality. With a fine crop this year Yoakum will be recognized as one of the leading agricultural counties on the Texas Plains, and a great flow of immigration will be attracted to it.

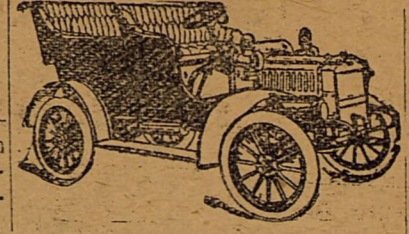

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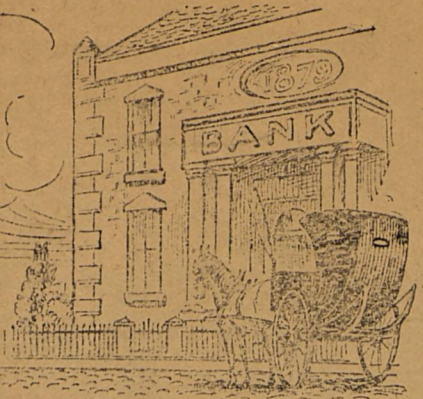
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we can fairly and accurately represent it to the world. One of the prime objects of the organization therefore, should be to help the people of Texas to know their state.

"We have heard much of late on the subject of Texas laws. We have been told by some that certain of our statutes are not calculated to attract, to the State capital seeking investment. While it may be true that particular features of some of our laws might be and probably could be improved, we have it upon high authority that, taken as a whole, Texas laws, pertaining to corporations for instance, compare favorably with similar laws of many other states.

"In the course of an address at the recent San Antonio convention of the Congress, Mr. B. F. Zoakum, who, it goes without saying, is competent to pass judgment in such matters, stated that Texas laws are not understood, but only slight modifications of certain laws is needed and that this is the prejudice against the laws, resulting from misunderstanding, rather than the laws themselves that the citizens of Texas should strive to overcome.

"This, in my opinion, describes a situation which should have the energetic and unrelenting attention of the right-thinking people of Texas. It is a condition which the Congress shall employ its utmost endeavors to remedy. In order to accomplish that end, the Congress shall stand for a definite permanent policy in legislative affairs. It shall insist upon and do everything in its power, within reasonable and proper limitations to bring about a cessation of constant tinkering with the laws of the State. It shall oppose and attempt to forever eradicate from our body politics the malicious agitator whose boastings rather than whose deeds, her laws misunderstood throughout the land.

"While the Congress will be interested in any and all legislation that may comprehend or affect the development of the state, let it now be made plain once for all that the TEXAS INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS is not and shall never be, so long as it has its present backing of the leading business men of the state, a political organization in any sense of the word. It stands for BUSINESS LEGISLATION, for laws that will help Texas grow along right, proper and desirable lines and whatever legislation it may favor or support, will be at all times in keeping with the letter and spirit of its slogan, 'Equal rights to all; special privileges to none.' Within, strictly within the meaning of that platform and only so, the Congress will be concerned in legislative affairs.

"It is too early to attempt an exhaustive exploration of the field which the Congress shall try to occupy or to enumerate the many and varied tasks which must, in time, have its attention. Suffice to say, the TEXAS INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS shall honestly and earnestly strive to support every interest, espouse every cause, exploit every resource, promote every opportunity and devote its self to everything that will tend to make Texas Greater and her people richer and happier.

"I believe the TEXAS INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS has been born to fill a long felt want. I believe the energetic and patriotic pursuit of its purpose, public-spirited, unselfish and non-sectional as they are, can not fail to rebound to the benefit of Texas and her people. I believe it can be made, with the proper co-operation and support of the people of Texas, the most efficient and effective agency for the up-building of the State in history. Its efficiency, however, in achieving results expected of it, will depend upon the extent of support it receives from the people of Texas whom it has been created to serve. Every

citizen who wants his State to grow owes it to himself and his State to rally to the support of the Congress. There ought to be 25,000, yes 50,000 Texans who would be willing to contribute the small membership fee of \$5 a year in order to make the organization the strong, active building force it should be.

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
