Lubbock Letter

As I was at one time a citizen
of Terry county, I still feel an in-
terest in what is transpiring there
and always glad to receive your
intensely interesting paper. Per-
haps a few notes from here may
be of interest to some of your
readers. Our farmers are begin-
ning to feel the effects of the day
weather but my experience has
been that rain usually comes on
the Plains country in time to
make crops.

Our town has now settled down
to a narrow condition and boom
prices no longer exist. It has
had a remarkable growth and is
now about as large as the thinly
populated country will sustain
unless more farmers come in and
the country settles up more than
it is at present.

Politics in this county are not
attracting a great deal of atten-
tion. Two of our county candi-
dates have withdrawn from
the race. Mr. W. D. Shaw is no
longer in the race for County and
District Clerk and Mr. Fred C.
Pearce has informed the voters
of the county that he is no longer
in the race for County Judge.
The race for Governor in this
county is badly mixed, and at

this time it would not be safe to
predict who will carry the county.

We noticed several Brownfield
citizens in Lubbock during the
past week namely; J. F. Winston
and J. R. Hill two of your live
real estate men, we also noticed
ye editor on the streets a few days
ago. Come again gentlemen, are
always glad to see Brownfield
people come to Lubbock, for be-
sides being good lively fellows,
they always leave some cash
among us.

A base ball team has been or-
ganized here and has some
splendid material in it and I pre-
dict it will take a good team to
defeat it.
Lubbock's next railroad will be
the Quanah, Acome and Pacific,
and expect to see trains running
in here on its track inside of 18
months. Lubbock is rightly lo-
cated for a railroad center and
we people believe it will not be
many years before it will rival
Amarillo in number of population
and as a railroad center. Now,
Amarillo, don't sneer at this
prediction, but wait and see it

New Railroad Makes Loan

Austin, Tex., June 1.—There was filed yesterday with the Secretary of State a copy of the mortgage lien note whereby the Texas and Pacific Railway lends the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific Railway the sum of \$157,511. The loan is made on equipment and trackage. Along with the first mortgage note was filed a deed of trust between the two roads with the St. Louis Union Trust Company as trustee for this deed of trust to insure the Texas and Pacific of the payment of the note. The road will soon register in bonds \$261,500, which the Railroad Commission also authorized on the 49.6 miles of road in addition to the first mortgage lien note authorized and today registered.

Yoakum County to get a Railroad

Austin, Tex., June 8—According to unofficial advices which reached the Railroad Commission, surveys have been made, right of way secured and \$350,000 in cash has been put up for the Tucumcari, Portales and Gulf Railroad Company, which is projected from Tucumcari, N. M., to Del Rio, Tex., which is a long stretch. The line is more or less located through the counties of Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Gaines, Andrews and Winkler to Pyote. From Pyote the projection is to be to Del Rio, without any definite route in view as yet. The line is said to be a certainty from Tucumcari to Pyote, which traverses a section of the State needing railroad facilities and would open a new country.
