#### **MAIF Chairman** Elliott; Others To Board





Cont'd From Page 1 taxes include Public Road Maintenance, .15; Special Road Tax, .30; Highway 84, .20 and Road District One A, .12 for a total of \$1.57. To this was added the five cent water tax for a total of \$1.62.

This places the Bailey County tax rate per \$100 from slightly below to considerably below three surrounding counties. Lamb County has a tax rate of \$1.42 per \$100 on a 25 percent evaluation; the Parmer County Tax Office reports a tax rate of \$1.72 and a 42 percent evaluation while Cochran County Tax office reported a tax rate of \$2.02.

Judge Cihak also added that the only outstanding bond issue for Bailey County at this time is the jail bond issue. In other action during the Thursday meeting, commissioners paid routine bills.

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

Baker of Meadow; four GSPA Working For Higher Loan Rates

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association is continuing its drive to get grain sorghum loan rates set more realistically to those of corn in the new farm legislation. Elbert Harp, GSPA's Executive Director, said, "Present national average grain loan rates are now only 86 percent of those of corn; whereas, the average feed value relation has been set at 95 percent or better."

Harp pointed out that, "Presently the grain sorghum loan rates are realted to corn according to feed value and seven other factors, which virtually allow the Secretary of Agriculture to set it anywhere he chooses. We are working to remove all the other factors, except food value, and have been encouraged about the possibility of getting it passed."

Pampa plans to introduce the

GSPA amendment, which now appears to have the support of most of the Agriculture Committee members. GSPA has been seeking the support of other farm and grain organizations and Harp stated that, "We now have the support of National Grange, National Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, National Corn Growers, United Grain Growers of America, Nebraska Feed Grain Growers, Panhandle and Texas Grain and Feed Dealers Associations, and the Panhandle Country Elevator Association. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is currently studying • the amendment, but has given tentative approval with minor changes."

Harp said, "This will add eighteen cents to the national average loan rates if we get this change made in the law."



## Grain Sorghum Shows Well In Lubbock Test

COLLEGE STATION, April 2--Preliminary evaluation of micronized grain sorghum. second cousin to popcorn, as a quality feedlot ration base have been completed recently at a Lubbock feedlot, an area livestock specialist has announced.

The term micronization was coined to describe the method of dry heating sorghum grain with gas fired infrared generators, Dr. L.M. Schake explained.

"Originally, popping of the grain was thought to be essential to increase nutrient availability," he added, "However data derived from feeding and digestion trials indicated that popping was not essential. and suggested that dry heat treatment reducing the grain to about seven percent moisture followed by rolling may produce a feed grain with certain

unique feeding qualities." Four hundred uniform Hereford steers were made available for the study by the Lubbock Feedlot of Lubbock, Schake said. They were randomly placed in one of four lots of 100 head each and all were maintained on a high roughage at ACC, Abilene, after spending the Everetts and Ron home with flaked grain for 20 days previous to the start of the trial, he continued.

"Mr. Chardo Pierce, who devised the process of micronizing grain, was responsible for micronizing the grain which was obtained from the same source as the grain fed by the Lubbock Feedlot," Schake said, "Half of the test animals were fed steam flaked grain and the other half was fed the micronized grain.

"One half of each group was treated with drugs to destroy

worms in the digestive tract before the test was started."

Feedlot performance of steers fed rations containing micronized grain rations gained 0.12 pound more a day than steers fed rations containing

steam flaked grain, Schake said. "Conversely, pounds of ration required per pound of live animal gain was 0,20 pound less for steers fed steam flaked grain rations compared to steers fed micronized grain rations," he noted, adding that these data are consistent with field observations comparing steam flaked and popped grain

rations. Carcass characteristics tend to be rather uniform except for several minor advantages for carcasses resulting from steers fed micronized grain rations, he said. Most of these differences appear in accordance with observed differences in feedlot performance of the steers, Schake said.

"Results of the field trial indicate that both of these processed grains produced carcasses with near equal value with slightly improved feedlot performance of steers fed the micronized grain rations." Schake concluded, "Average carcass value of steers fed steam flaked grain rations was \$348.09, while steers fed micronized grain rations had an average carcass value of \$355."



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
