Lesson III.—First Quarter, For Jan. 15, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Memory Verses, 1, 2-Golden Text, Il Chron. xv, 7-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

Although Abijah, son of Rehoboam. reigned only three years and walked in all the sins of his father (I Kings xv, 1-3), yet there is in II Chron, xili a remarkable record of a great victory which the Lord gave him over the army of Jeroboam, which was just twice as great as his because he relied upon the Lord God of his fathers. The Lord has often seen fit to do mighty things for very unworthy people for His great name's sake. Jer. xiv. 7, is very strong and effectual pleading.

Our lesson today introduces us to good King Asa, who reigned forty-one years and did that which was good and right in the eyes of the Lord his God. He also defeated an army twice as large as his own because he relied on the Lord (xiv, 8, 9; xvi, 8). His prayer in chapter xiv, 11, has often helped me: "Lord, it is nothing with Thee to help, whether with many or with them that have no power. Help us, O Lord our God, for we rest on Thee, and in Thy name we go."

Yet in the thirty-sixth year of his reign he was led into making a league with the king of Syria, and, being reproved for it by the Lord through His servant Hanani, he became so angry that he put the prophet in prison. He seems never to have got over this reproof of the Lord, for when, three years later, he became diseased in his feet he did not seek the Lord in his affliction.

All the Lord's dealings with His people are intended to bring them nearer to Himself, but to this day many become so offended by what He does or does not do that they turn away from Him and lose all fellowship with Him. Some of my friends know something of the preciousness to my soul of these words of the Lord through His serv ant Hanani, "The eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth to show Himself strong in the behalf of them whose hearts are per fect toward Him" (chapter xvi, 9). We need such a word as this so much, for it. As a roaring lion he walketh about, seeking whom he may devour (Joh i. 7; ii, 2; I Pet. v, 8).

Early in the reign of Asa the Spirit of God spoke to him through Azariah. the son of Oded, in the words of verses 2 to 7 of our lesson, referring to the years past when the people had been out of fellowship with God, but whenever they in their trouble sought Him He was always found of them. Much of the message takes us back to the days of the judges. By the Lord's gracious dealings with His people in the past, notwithstanding all their sin. He encouraged Asa with the words. "Be ye strong, therefore, and let not your hands be weak, for your work shall be rewarded" (verse 7). His exhortation to us still and always is, "Be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might" (Eph. vi, 10). See also Isa. xl, 28-31; xlv, 24; Josh, i. 6, 18; Hagii, 4, and note by contrast Uzziah, who strong, but then his heart was lifted up to his own destruction (chapter xxvi. 15, 16). The danger is our own strength or self confidence, for it is only when we are weak that we are really strong (II Cor. xii, 9, 10). Isa. xii, 13, is a grand word for weak hands, and, as to works, how full of encouragement is I Cor. xv, 58! Rev. xxii, 12; Luke xiv, 14, are two of the best

The first use of the title God "Al-God who is all sufficient," is in Gen. xvii. 1, where Abram is encouraged to walk before God and be sincere or upstand that Mr. M. V. This turning to God in the days of Asa was such a reality that they decreed that whosoever would not seek the Lord God of Israel should be put to death, whether small or great, whether man or woman (verse 13). It might be a question whether this compulsory turning to God would, after all, prove to be a real turning of the heart. With us it is either life or death. Lesson IV.-First Quarter, For Jan. 22, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, I Kings xvi, 15-33. Memory Verses, 25-30-Golden Text, Prov. xiv, 34-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

Today we are introduced to two of the worst kings in all the history of the ten tribes, Omri and Ahab. Of the former it is written that he wrought evil in the eyes of the Lord and did worse than all that were before him, and of the latter it is written that he did evil in the sight of the Lord above all that were before him and did more to provoke the Lord God of Israel to anger than all the kings of Israel that were before him (verses 25, 30, 33). What a record of increasing iniquity Jehovah that could bear with it! But xvii, 14; xix, 19, 20). Then shall be we must consider that ever since the serpent tempted Eve, and how much longer we do not know, God has patiently borne with the devil and will continue to bear with him till the time of Rev. xx, 1-3. While there is no hope for that great adversary revealed in Scripture, as to men it is written that the Lord is long suffering toward us, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance (II Pet. iii, 9).

The greatest sinner may be saved if he will only turn from his sin to God, but for all who will not turn there is naught but the flaming fire and vengewhich burneth with fire and brimstone of Rev. xxi, 8. If any will not receive lie, and for all who will not bow to the word of God there is no morning for them (II Thess. ii, 11, 12; Isa. viii, 20, margin and R. V.). In all the hisone ruler who feared the Lord, but all walked in the way of Jeroboam, the son of Nabat, who made Israel to sin (verses 26, 31).

During the forty-one years of the reign of Asa over Judah, who was on the whole a good king and most of the time did right in the sight of the Lord, six of the kings of the ten tribes either reigned or began to reign, and each one is mentioned by name in connection with the year of Asa's reign when he began to reign (xv, 25, 28, 33; xvi, 8, 10, 15, 23, 29). No less than eight times do we find Asa mentioned in connection with the names of these kings, and it is to me suggestive of the wheat and tares of one of our Lord's parables, concerning which He said. "Let both grow together till the harvest." In this case it was not difficult to distinguish the righteous from the wicked, but often we cannot tell here, wheat and tares in some stages of growth look so much alike.

The wicked prosper, are not in trouble like other men, they are proud and lofty and very often die peacefully (Ps. lxxiii, 2-12), and Asaph is not the only one perplexed thereby. 
