

> Of Interest to the Farmers of Texas.

According to information furnished by the U.S. Department of Commerce and Labor, 33,497,900 gallons of cottonseed oil were produced in Texas in 1909. This was worth approximately \$13,399,160. This is a considerable amount of money and the market which demands this product is an important one to the people of the state.

This fact has led men who wish to see oleomargarine take the place of butter to make it appear that the manufacture of oleomargarine furnishes one of the greatest if not the greatest reasons for this market demand. But such is not the case. In fact the value of the sottonseed oil used in the manufacture of this product is so small in comparsion that it is not worthy of theleast consideration, especially when the value of the dairy products of the state are consider-

We do not have the statistics for 1909 but in 1908 the value of the cottonseed oil used in the manufacture of oleomargarine in this country was \$499,458.42. Thevalue of all the cottonseed oil produced in 1909 wasapproximately \$63,331,400. This means that less than one per cent of the cottonseed oil sold was used in making oleomargarine.

According to the Department report, Texas produced about 20 per cent of all the cottonseed oil produced in 1909. Using this figure for 1908 and we find that the value of the cottonseed oil ball ever played at Brownfield, used in oleomargarine returned was pulled off last Saturday by to the cotton farmers of Texas the comparatively small amount of \$99,891.68.

According to figures compiled by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, the value of the butter produced in Texas in 1908 was \$13,025,936. or for every dollar's worth of cotton seed oil used in making oleomargarine the cows of the state returned over \$130 worth of dairy products.

These are facts which the farmers of Texas should carefully consider before they lend their support to any movement which discourages dairying. An increase in the production of dairy products in Texas will be just 130 times of greater value than an increase in the production of oleomargarine. This is noteven taking in, to consideration the value of dairying in building up the fertility of the soil, thus making the land more productive in growing cotton.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson XIII .- First Quarter, For March 26, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, a Comprehensive Quarterly Review-Golden Text, Ps. exliv, 15-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

LESSON I.—The kingdom divided, I Kings xii, 6-16. Golden Text, Prov. others might know Him. xili, 20, "He that walketh with wise men shall be wise, but a companion of fools shall be destroyed." The kingdom was divided because of Solomon's sins (chapter xi, 11), but shall in due time be reunited as the Lord has purposed (Ezek. xxxvii, 21, 22). Back of and through and controlling and overruling all the actions of all men, good and bad, we must always see God.

LESSON II.-Jeroboam makes idols for Israel to worship, I Kings xii, 25-33. Golden Text, Ex. xx, 4, "Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image." Although Jeroboam was well aware that the Lord had given him these ten tribes and would on condition of obedience establish his kingdom (xi, 31-38), he could not trust God, who had been so kind to him, but deliberately listened to and acted upon the advice of the devil and worshiped him.

LESSON III.—Asa's good reign in Judah, II Chron. xv, 1-15. Golden Text, II Chron. xv, 7, "Be ye strong therefore and let not your hands be weak, for your work shall be rewarded." How refreshing to find a man on whose behalf the Lord can show Himself strong (xvi, 9). He is still looking for such. The words that help me most in this lesson are xiv, 11, with the verse just quoted and xv, 15, seeing and resting in the Lord alone.

LESSON IV .- Omri and Ahab lead Israel into greater sin, I Kings xvi, 23-33. Golden Text, Prov. xiv, 34, "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." The statements concerning these two are that they each did worse in the eyes of the Lord than any that were before them (verses 25, 33). It would be difficult to find two men more given over to the devil than these two.

LESSON V.-Johoshaphat's good reign in Judah, II Chron. xvii, 1-13. Golden Text, Matt. vi, 33, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." I am much helped by the prayer of this good king and by the words: "In thine hand is power and might. We have no might, neither know we what to do, but our eyes are upon Thee."

LESSON VI.-Elijah the prophet appears in Israel, I Kings xvii, 1-16. Golden Text, Ps. xxxiv, 10, "They that seek the Lord shall not want any good thing." Now we see one of the grandest men that ever lived and yet a man of like passions with us (Jas. v. 17). His great word is, "The Lord God of Israel liveth, before whom I stand" (xvii, 1; xviii, 15). They are the first words we ever hear from him. Note the Lord's special care of him at Cherith and Zarephath.

LESSON VII. - Elijah's victory over the prophets of Baal, I Kings xviii. Golden Text, Josh. xxiv, 15, "Choose you this day whom ye will serve." See 850 men against one man, but God was with the one man and against the 850, and a half minute prayer to the living and true God accomplished what an all day crying and pleading of the 850 could not.

LESSON VIII.—Elijah's flight and return, I Kings xix, 1-16. Golden Text, Isa. xl, 31, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." In this lesson we see the weakness of one of the best of God's servants, who was not afraid of Ahab nor of 850 false prophets, but who ran for his life because of the threat of a wicked woman. Note the angel's ministry and the patience and loving kindness of God.

LESSON IX.-Elijah meets Ahab in Naboth's yineyard, I Kings xxi, 11-20. Golden Text, Luke xii, 15, "Take heed and beware of covetousness." How selfish and cruel are people apt to be who live wholly unto themselves! They must have their way at any cost, no matter who may have to suffer or even die. But there will be a reckoning, and the Judge of all the earth will do right. The Lord Jesus said, "Fear not them which kill the body."

LESSON X .- Elijah goes up by a whirlwind into heaven, II Kings if, 1-18. Golden Text, Gen. v, 24, 'Enoch walked with God, and he was not, for God took him." The man who wanted to die never did die. So it may be with some of us (I Cor. xv, 51). The other notable features of this lesson are the devotion of Elisha to Elijah and his earnest desire for a double portion of his spirit. Note "They two went on."

LESSON XI.-Elisha the prophet restores a child to life, II Kings iv. 25-37. Golden Text, Rom. vi, 23, 'The gift of

God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." The woman who enter-tained Elisha did not entertain an angel, but one to whom angels ministered and who knew the Lord, and thus

tered and who knew the Lord and thus she ministered to the Lord Himself (Matt. x, 40, 41), who rewarded her with a son and also gave him back to her from the dead.

Lesson XII.—Defeat through drunkenness, I lings xx, 12-21. Golden Text, Prov xxxi, 4, "It is not for kings to drink wine nor for princes strong drink." We might associate with this lesson the drunken feast of Belshazzar and his lords and also the birthday parand his lords and also the birthday party of Herod, all ending with death. Let us note verses 13, 28, and the Lord's desire that Ahab and we and all

Lesson I .- Second Quarter, For April 2, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES

Text of the Lesson, II Kings v, 1-14. Memory Verses, 13, 14-Golden Text, Isa. xiv, 22-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

It is a most interesting and profitable study to search out in the Old Testament all the people and the events which the Lord Jesus mentioned in His teaching and to remember that Jesus of the New Testament is none other than the Lord God of the prophets, whose goings forth have been from of old, from the days of eternity (Mic. v, 2, margin). In Luke iv, 27, He mentions both Naaman and Elisha, and of course that includes the little maid of Israel and all the other people and incidents of the story.

In chapter iv, 8, we read of a great woman, and now it is a great man and honorable, a deliverer and mighty man of valor, but a leper. He was a great man in the eyes of his fellows, but had he lived in Israel he would have had to live without the camp.

Leprosy is a wonderful type of sin, and, it matters not how great a man may be in other men's eyes, if he is an unsaved sinner he is a child of wrath, dead in sins, without Christ and without God (Eph. ii, 1, 3, 12), and those who die in that condition are forever shut out (Rev. xxi, 8, 27). In as seemingly strange ways as the Lord brought healing to Naaman He still wins sinners to Himself. He may use a captive maid, humble servants, waters of Jordan, etc., but He is always seeking to save the lost, not willing that any should perish (II Pet. iii, 9).

The little captive maid stolen away from her home might have so hated her captors as to wish them evil and be glad that Naaman was a leper, but she evidently had the spirit of Him who taught to love our enemies and to be subject even to perverse people (Matt. v, 44; I Pet. ii, 18). So she pitied Naaman and told of the prophet in Samaria, of whom she knew or had heard many wonderful things. From the slowness of believers to tell of the Lord Jesus and His wonderful redemption the world has a right to conclude that they have nothing wonderful to

The result of the little maid's testimony was that the king of Syria sent Naaman to the king of Israel with a letter and a lot of silver and gold and raiment, asking from the king health for his servant. There was a double mistake in sending to the king instead of the prophet and in supposing that money could purchase heaven's gifts. The maid had spoken of the prophet in Samaria, not the king, and a true prophet is a spokesman for God. But royalty can only deal with royalty and, as a rule, has no use for poor men even if they are prophets. Such pride must be laid low before

God can help such people.

The king of Israel thought that the king of Syria was seeking a quarrel with him in making such a request, and he rent his clothes. Elisha, hear ing of it. said to the king, "Let him come now to me, and he shall know that there is a prophet in Israel." Naaman came in all his pomp and pride to the door of the house of Elisha, thinking that the prophet would make a display of his power and in some striking way give him health. When the prophet did not deign even to come to the door, but sent a messenger, saving, "Go and wash in Jordan seven times, and thy flesh shall come again to thee, and thou shalt be clean," Naaman was so angry that he turned and went away in a rage. When we remember that even Abraham's thoughts brought him trouble (Gen. xx, 11) and Mary's supposing gave her three days of sorrow (Luke ii. 44-46) we do not wonder so much at the result of Naaman's thoughts. Simple faith in God and prompt obedience is the only safe way. Servants sometimes have more sense than their masters, and so it proved in this case, for, as they reasoned with Naaman

that he would gladly have done some

great thing, then why not do this simple thing? He went and did as Elisha had said, and his flesh became as the flesh of a little child, and he was clean.

There was no special value or efficacy in the waters of Jordan, but it was to Naaman a lesson in humility and obedience and submission to the true God. In the matter of salvation for the sinner there is only one way, one name, one sacrifice, one precious blood, and he who disdains it cannot be saved. Naaman, being healed, returned to Elisha with a good confession, "Behold, now I know that there is no God in all the earth but in Israel" (15), and he would fain have rewarded the prophet. How grand is the dignity of the soul that can turn down earth's silver and gold and say to such as Naaman, "As the Lord liveth before whom I stand I will receive none.' Compare Gen. xiv, 22-23; Dan. v, 17. See also the rich young ruler who was told by our Lord to give all that he had to the poor (Luke xviii, 22) and then follow Jesus, thus revealing to him his own heart, and that his possessions were his god, and that he was breaking the first commandment. I expect that Judas Iscariot was troubled by our Lord's words to the rich ruler, and we are quite certain that Gehazi was troubled by Elisha's rejection of Naaman's wealth. Consider the result of his covetousness (verse 27) and remember the words of our Lord in Luke xii, 15, "Take heed and beware of covetousness, for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth."
