### STATE SUPERINTENDENT RE- PORTS YEARS EXAMINATION

Austin, Texas. 3-21 11.  
To Applicants For Teachers' Certificates:

It will no doubt be of interest to those who contemplate taking an examination during this year, either at the summer normals or in the county, to know that the state department has introduced some features that make the preparation much easier and makes it possible to do more substantial work.

The following announcement have been made by State Supt.

F. M. Bralley for this years examinations;

(a) The course in General History should be confined to medieval history from 395 to 1500 A. D. Robinson's History of western Europe (Ginn & Co.) will be used.

(b) The work in Physics should be confined to Mechanic, Properties of matter, and Heat. Any one of these texts may be used: Millikan & Gale's First Course in Physics (Ginn & Co.) Carhart & Chute. (Allyn Bacon) Hoadley's Elements (American Book Co.)

(c) The work in Literature will be confined to American Literature with the following as

texts: Bronson's History of American Literature (Heath & Co.). Literary Masterpieces (Houghton, Mifflin Co.). English Literature will studied next year.

(d) History of Education should be confined to the Middle Ages and the Renaissance. Texts to be used: Williams' History of Medieval Education (C. W. Bardeen); Monroe's, A Briefer Course in the History of Education (The Macmillian Co.)

(e) The following topics in Psychology should be carefully studied and discussed: Psychology in Teaching, Nature of Mind, Nature of Education, In-

stinct, Attention, Will. This work will based on James' Talk to Teachers (Holt & Co.)

(f) The work on methods and on management will be based on McKeever's Psychologic Method in teaching (A. Flanagan Co.)

(g) The work on Agriculture should be based on Welborn's Elements of Agriculture.

(h) The course in Reading will be based on Brigg's and Coffman's Reading in the Public schools (Row, Peterson & Co.)

(i) The work in arithmetic will be based on the following topics in Meyers and Brooks Grammar School Arithmetic: Common Fractions, Decimal Fractions,

Percentage and Interest, Common use of Numbers, Constructive Geometry, Mensuration.

(j) The work in Geometry will be confined to the first three books as given in Wentworth's Plane Geometry, with much attention to the solution of original theorems.

No announcement have been made relative to other subjects. We presume there will be no departure from the former plan of attempting to cover the entire subject.

### Large Outline Map.

Dallas, Texas, March.—In the Dallas office of the Texas Industrial Congress there is displayed a large outline county map of the state on which is shown by tacks of different colors the contestants in each county who are trying for the \$10,000 in cash prizes offered for the best yield of corn and cotton. The men who

represented by blue headed tacks, the boys by pink tacks, the women by brown tacks and the girls by green tacks. The map as a whole, is very interesting, showing at a glance the leading agricultural sections of the state, and while a number of the counties in the extreme western portion of the state are blank, there are 130 counties that show entries. Many of these are well filled, notably Collin,

Dallas, Hill, Kaufman, Johnson, Ellis, Navarro, McLennan, Williamson and Falls. The Panhandle is represented in Hutchinson, Gray, Donley, Collingsworth, Hall and Childress counties. West Texas has a number of contestants in Lynn, Borden, Kent, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard and Mitchel. In South Texas there are farmers in Starr, Nueces, Live Oak, San Patricio, Refugio, Goliad and Calhoun

have entered the contest are counties who are striving for the big prizes. Every county bordering on Louisiana has contestants except Shelby, Sabine and Orange. All the Red River counties from the Panhandle to Texarkana are entered in the contest.

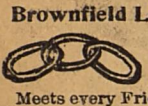

## THAT BALL GAME

By odds, the best game of base ball ever played at Brownfield, was pulled off last Saturday by the Lubbock and the Brownfield High Schools. It was all the way through an exhibition of clean, snappy sport, and the manner in which the youngsters handled the stick and fielded the ball, would have done credit to any team. Lubbock succeeded in getting a runner in home in the first half of the second inning, Brownfield tying the score in the last half of the ninth amid scenes of the wildest excitement. Two more endings were played in an attempt to get rid of the tie, but neither side could do the job, and the eleventh ending closed with the score one and one, and both sides in the best of humor.

Not only were both sides to be complimented on the way they played the great American game, but all fussing and chewing-the-rag was conspicuous by its absence. The Lubbock boys are one of the most gentlemanly bunch that ever donned uniforms, and created a very favorable impression with the Brownfield rooters.

The feature of the game was the pitching of Earl Hill. He was

in the box for Brownfield during the entire eleven innings, pitched a no-hit game, struck out thirteen men, and only walked one.

### Of Interest to the Farmers of Texas.

According to information furnished by the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor, 33,497,900 gallons of cottonseed oil were produced in Texas in 1909. This was worth approximately \$13,399,160. This is a considerable amount of money and the market which demands this product is an important one to the people of the state.

This fact has led men who wish to see oleomargarine take the place of butter to make it appear that the manufacture of oleomargarine furnishes one of the greatest if not the greatest reasons for this market demand. But such is not the case. In fact the value of the cottonseed oil used in the manufacture of this product is so small in comparison that it is not worthy of the least consideration, especially when the value of the dairy products of the state are considered.

We do not have the statistics for 1909 but in 1908 the value of the cottonseed oil used in the manufacture of oleomargarine in this country was \$499,458.42. The value of all the cottonseed oil produced in 1909 was approximately \$63,331,400. This means that less than one per cent of the cottonseed oil sold was used in making oleomargarine.

According to the Department report, Texas produced about 20 per cent of all the cottonseed oil produced in 1909. Using this figure for 1908 and we find that the value of the cottonseed oil used in oleomargarine returned to the cotton farmers of Texas the comparatively small amount of \$99,891.68.

According to figures compiled by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, the value of the butter produced in Texas in 1908 was \$13,025,936. or for every dollar's worth of cotton seed oil used in making oleomargarine the cows of the state returned over \$130 worth of dairy products.

These are facts which the farmers of Texas should carefully consider before they lend their support to any movement which discourages dairying. An increase in the production of dairy products in Texas will be just 130 times of greater value than an increase in the production of oleomargarine. This is not even taking in, to consideration the value of dairying in building up the fertility of the soil, thus making the land more productive in growing cotton.

The farmers of Texas should awake to the benefits of dairying and should use every legitimate means to foster and promote this important industry.

**April Fool.**

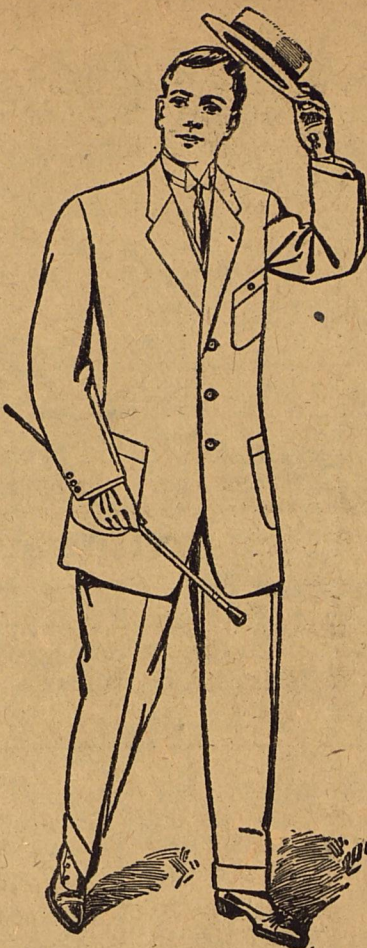

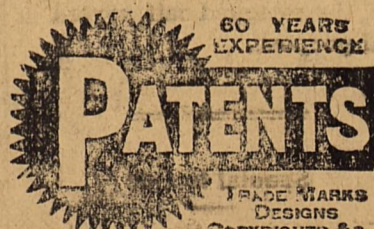
