



days the kingdom and nation that will not serve Israel shall perish and be utterly wasted (Isa. Ix. 12). Although Uzziah reigned fifty-two years, his whole story is found in this one lesson chapter and in the first seven verses of II Kings xv. In his days Isaiah and Amos were the prophets, the Lord's messengers (Isa. i, 1; Amos i, 1), full of rebuke for sin, but also of prediction of a glorious future for Israel when she shall receive her Messiah. Every good king should turn our thoughts to the Son of God, the King of Israel (John i, 49), and their failures set Him forth more brightly as the one who will never fail nor be discouraged.

Uzziah seems to have been greatly helped by a prophet named Zechariah, who had visions of God (verse 5)-not the one who wrote "the book bearing his name, for he lived after the captivity, nor the one of II Chron. xxiv, 20, 21, who was stoned to death for his faithfulness. It is a great thing to see God, and this we can do in Jesus Christ, who said "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father" (John xiv,

Me hath seen the Father" (John xiv, 9). We can by the Spirit behold the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ (II Cor. iv, 4, 6), and thus we shall be enabled to help others to see Him, too, and know Him. While this prophet helped him he sought the Lord, and God made him to prosper (verse 5).

He seems to have been prospered through most of his reign. God helped him against his enemies, other nations brought gifts to him, and his name spread abroad (verses 7, 8). Thus God honors those who honor Him. It was so during part of the reign of Solomon when the queen of Sheba and all kings of the earth sought him and brought him gifts (II Chron. ix, 8, 9, 22-24). So it shall be in an unprecedented degree when Jesus Christ shall be King in Levesley. Then, shell, all perions when Jesus Christ shall be King in Jerusalem. Then shall all nations, like the wise men from the east, bring

their treasures unto Him (Isa. lx, 9-11). Uzziah was so greatly blessed that he became self sufficient, strong in himself instead of in the Lord, and then he fell. He presumed to take upon him the office of a priest and to burn incense in the house of God, and the Lord smote him with leprosy, and he became a leper unto the day of his death and had to live in a separate house. The only King of Israel who will be a priest upon his throne will be the man whose name is the Branch (Zech. vi. 12. 13). He will be a priest forever after the order of Malchizedek. who was both priest and king (Gen. xiv. 18; Ps. cx, 4; Heb. vii, 1, 17).

If we are redeemed we are kings and If we are redeemed we are kings and priests unto God and shall reign with Christ when He reigns (Rev. i, 6; v, 9, 10). Back of this sin of Uzziah it is not difficult to see the great adversary who said "I will be like the Most High" and who said to Eve, "Ye shall be as gods" (Isa. xiv. 14; Gen. iii, 5). Humility, not pride, is the characteris tic of a true child of God, realizing that we are not sufficient of ourselves to think anything as of ourselves, but our we are not sufficient of ourselves to only way for us is to be "strong in the Lord and in the power of His might," sufficiency is of God (II Cor. iii, 5). The Lord and in the power of His might," having no confidence in ourselves, for in us—that is, in our flesh—dwelleth no good thing (Eph. vi. 10; Phil. iii, 3; Rom. vii, 18). We have a great High Priest who is touched with a feeling of our infirmities and who is able to save to the uttermost all of those who come unto God by Him.

Let us rejoice in Him and serve Him with all humility, remembering to do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God. All self righteousness, self sufficiency, pride and ambition to be somebody or something apart from Jesus Christ we must shun as we would the devil himself.

It is written of Uzziah that "as long as he sought the Lord. God made him to prisper" (verse 5). This is in accord with Josh. i. 7, 8; Ps. i, 1-3. True seeking is always according to Jer. xxix. 11, and the exhortations thereto are very plain in Isa. lv, 6; Zeph. if. 3. Consider Hezekinh in II Chron. xxxi, 20, 21, and also see Ezra vii, 10,



No domestic animal has ever made such sacrifices to meet the demands of progress as the hog. He has given half of his life and fifty-six pounds of flesh to meet the market demand for young stock. Certainly the human race has made no such sacrifice for success as this dumb brute. According to the census reports of the Federal department of agriculture the average weight of the hog has decreased from 275 pounds to 219 pounds during the past thirty years and he is now going to the market one year earlier than formerly.

A resolution proposing to amend the Constistution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20, thereof by striking out and repealing said section, and substituting in lieu perous of all hogs in the United States. | thereof a new Section 20. prohibiting the manufacture for purpose of sale, barter and exchange and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors, on and after the second Tuesday in for medicinal, scientific and sacrimental purpos es, and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas, shall, at noon on the second Tuesday in January, A. D 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; providing, further, that this section shall not prevent any session of the Legislatare from pa any law to inforce the same; and, providing, further, that all laws in force when this amendnent is adopted, providing penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, shall remain in full force and effect until modified or repealed; flxing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment, directing a proclamation voting; prescribing certain duties for the Governor of this State, and making an appropriation

SECTION 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out and repealing Section 20 thereof, and substituting in lieu of said Section 20 the follow

D. 1912, is hereby prohibited within this State, except for medicinal, scientific and sac-State of Texas shall, at noon, on the second this section, meet in session in the city of Ausing liquors shall remain in full force and effect

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Logislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, being the twenty-second day thereof, A. D 1911. At said election the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words "Official Ballot"

Said ballot shall have also written or printed thereon the words "For Prohibition" and the words "Against Prohibition."

All voters favoring said proposed amendmen shall erase the words "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same, and those op-posing it shall erase the words "For Prohibition." If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition" said amend-ment shall be declared adopted If a majority amendment shall be lost and so declared

All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time of said election Isheld shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and in all other respects, as far as such election laws can be made appli-

SEC. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as re-

SEC. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out af any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated. to defray the expenses of such proclamation, pub-
