Sometimes the University of Texas is criticised for not em ploying more of its own graduat es on its teaching staff. One rea son that the University has not not been able to give emplopment to more of its graduates lies in the fact that as yet the instituion has no Graduate School, where the higher degrees are given. To be a teacher in graded school, a person should at least be a graduate of a high school; high school teacher shoulda be graduates of a college and college teachers should have done special work in some firs class university. The University Texas has not thus far had sufficient income to permit of Garduate School of any consider able proportions, and necessarily the Regents have been forced to look elsewhere for men compe tently prepared to fill the princi pal chairs of the institution. No and then, fortunately, Texas boy and girls go away to other uni versities that support graduate schools, and receive training suf ficient to entitle them to place in the University. Many impers who are practicing these simple but effective methods, say neir corn and cotton are fresh and green, while their neighbors' rops are burning up, which emphasizes the fact that the dryer the weather conditions the great er is the necessity for continuous shallow cultivation.

Ten Commandments Worth Readi
by Farmers of All Sections. Professor W. C. Palmer, agricultu editor of the extension department at the State Agricultural college of Nort
Dakota, gives the following "ten com mandments of dry farming:"
First.-Thou shalt plow die
