Now that live hog and pork prices have begun to rise again it is very pat ent that the recent slump in prices announced by the packers was chiefly for the purpose of loading up on a big supply of live stock at reduced rates. The fellow who buys bacon, salt pork and sausages will quite likely have to dig just as deep into his pockets as he has In the past.

Horses that have a tendency to kidney trouble, often manifested in azoturia, may be helped quite a bit by giving them a dose of saltpeter now and then. In severe cases, where the limbs are affected with the overflow of albumen, an excellent medicine is Fowler's solution put on the oats or ground feed. The dose should be increased from a teaspoonful at first to a tablespoonful given twice a day.

While there is little question that rapid settlement of the Pacific northwest has tended to break up the large range areas for sheep and cattle and for the time being to reduce the output of these animals, it is the view of those who have been watching the introduction of more diversified forms of farming that in the more favorable sections at least more stock will be raised under the new era of ownership of smaller areas than was produced under the old.

The question of the partition fence often arises and sometimes causes trouble. In many states the law defines quite exactly what this shall be, that it shall contain a certain number of strands of wire of a given description, or if one party erects or wants to erect a hog or sheep tight fence the other can be compelled to do so if he does not voluntarily. In case he is obstreperous the matter may be referred to the township trustees, who are usually delegated with authority to settle such matters.



The Steam Engine

The record of civilization is accurately written in the progress of the steam engine. The use of steam has enlarged the purposes of the human race, built up civilization and developed mankind. Of all the potential energies, it is the most useful and it renders a service tc every living creature.

Railroad mileage is the yard stick of progress. We have in Texas 14,000 miles of railroad and rank first of al states in the Union in mileage. In miles per area, we rank fortieth, having 5.15 miles of railroad per 100 square miles of territory. In mileage per population, we rank nineteenth, having 38.43 miles of railroad per 10,000 people.

The comparative test of railroad facilities is in miles per area. If we had the mileage per area that the state of Illinois has we would have 55,500 miles; that Indiana has 54,000 miles and that Iowa has 46,000 miles. We have only 14,000 miles.

According to the last interstate commerce commission report, compiled June 30, 1909, we constructed 273 miles during the previous year and ranked fourth in the list of states in the Union in construction during the year. We are more in need of railroad construction than any other state in the Union. The railroad development of Texas has not kept pace with the development of other lines of industry. Our railroad counter. mileage during the past ten years has, increased 35 per cent; the value of manufactured products has increased 92 per cent; the value of farm lands 157 per cent and the development of al. lines of industry has been retarded for want of railroad facilities.


