The 3rd Annual Terry county Fair promises to be the best yet.

Clay County will vote on a \$200,000 bond issue for good roads on August 5th.

Already talk is ripe about prospective candidates for the respective county offices.

Farmer friends, don't be taken over to bad about fine crops and orchards to give those colts proper attention. We want to see some stock at the Fair this fall.

A greater acreage may never be devoted to cotton in Terry county than there is to the cereals, but just so long as cotton is made a secondary industry and feed the principal, just so long will we be a prosperous people.

Not only is the subject of good roads the most important which now confronts the farmer and one of the most important now before the people of Texas, but it is one in which the people are most deeply interested.

Well that big mud hole at the public well has not received attention yet. Looks like some of the prospective candidates would fill 'er up to show their somehow before the reunion.

Aid the farmer in building good roads, thereby assisting him in getting better schools and churches. Forty miles of good roads, leading out of different directions from a town is worth more to a town than a big factory or a new railroad.

The reciprocity business has been threshed out and over so far as the American side of the agreement is concerned, and now our Canadian neighbors can have their share of the high flown oratory, intermixed with the plug sort. Canada is at the bat, and Mexico on deck, England in hole; play ball!

We certainly do not have many of the conveniences of metropolitan life in Brownfield, and people often poke fun at us about our distance from railroads, but as against all this we never have to study where the next drink of water will come from; we have no race question or foreigners; the bubonic nor no other plague is on our mind, and on top of this we are all sociable and neighborly. Which condition is most favorable.

Mr. Prospector, don't you let the idea of our being a matter of 28 miles from a railroad stand between you and some Terry county dirt. Dont you realize the fact that all other level, fertile countries of the United States are healed for transportation facilities, and many of the mountainous ones also? Yes. Well bless your heart honey, a county as fertile as Terry, where railroad building is very little trouble on account of the level

nature of our land and no bridging to be done, is not going to be without railroads long. Do you hear?

A Good Report From Terry Co.

Dr. J. W. Ellis came over from Brownfield Wednesday evening in Arthur Tubb's car and spent the night with Plains friends. In the practice of his profession Dr. Ellis visits all parts of Terry county which enables him to form correct conclusions as to crop conditions. He says that during more than five years residence in Terry county he has never before seen such fine prospects for crops as they have there this year. That the recent fine rains came in time to save their corn and feed crops, and the yield will be so great that the farmers will have all they can do to harvest and garner what they raise. He says there were about 3,500 acres of land in Terry county planted in cotton this year, nearly all of which is as fine as can be seen in any blackland, cotton raising country; that it will now average hip high and has every indication of a great yield. He also gave a glowing account of the fruit crop in Terry; he says they have good apples there, notwithstanding the fact that the trees are young and are not bearing like trees of mature age. That no part of the country can produce finer specimens of peaches, plums and grapes than can be found there. He says that their vegetable and melon crops can not be excelled in any country, and that Terry county will be able to send an exhibit to the Dallas Fair this fall that will be a credit to the Plains country. The editor of the News takes pleasure in producing any favorable statements made concerning Terry county; he will frankly say that there is no better county on the Plains. He made his home there more than two years and formed associates and friendships among its people that will remain with him among the fondest memories of his life.

feet in circumference? Aunt Lou
has one. Did you ever see butter
beans scale a wall of 48 inch net
wire and so dense you could
hardly see you neighbor on the
other side? Did you ever see
many okra patches with stalks
as thick as hops, that reached
your neck? Well did you ever
see sweet potato vines knee deep
on the ground? Aunt Lou has
them, and she thinks she has not
accomplished anything extra; in
fact she informed us that she
would rather we wouldn't men-
tion it, but such news is too good
to keep. In fact a photo of this

GOOD ROADS.

**What We are Doing to Make
Wagon Transportation
Light**

In this issue of the Herald is
shown a good representation of
a typical good road scene near
Waxahachie in Ellis county, Tex-
as. Through the courtesy of
the Texas Commercial Secreta-
ries Association, this cut is be-
ing reproduced in weekly news-
paper all over Texas with the in-

tention of converting as many
people as possible to the "good
road habit." While it appears
from first consideration that the
sole intent of the picture is to
advertise this particular section
of our State, it will be seen from
a closer study that its real pur-
pose is to work and talk goods
roads, no matter in what section
of the State. This scene only
goes to show what may be accom-
plished even by the people in the
black land regions, if they but
will it.

Here in Terry county, we have
only to scrape of the loamy soil
to the clay, and the wind does
the rest. So we see that even
nature itself aids us in making
transportation easy.

We already have something
like thirty miles of dirt road be-
yond the experimental stage in
Terry county and road construc-
tion is yet in its infancy. The
first five miles between this city
and Gomez being constructed
merely as an experiment, a little
more than two years ago, and
the Commissioners having found
that the experiment hatched a
huge success, contracts were let
for the construction of a road to
county lines east and west. The
western division proved another
success and was everything that
could be expected of it, but it
was found that places on the
eastern division needed addition-
al grading in the sandiest places
to put it in good order, and ac-
cordingly the contract was let
for this purpose and work is now
under way. Contract has also
been let for a new road begin-
ning at the town section and ex-
tending five miles south.

We are now in a good way to-
ward road building in Terry
county, and as long as we have
such a progressive citizenship,
and as long as they elect a set of
Commissioners who wish to ad-
vance Terry county, just so long
will we continue to build good
roads.

Happy are we, that we have
not issued a bond, nor given a
penny's worth of script for road
or any other improvement. We
have the money in the bank and
every check is worth its face val-
ue. Script is an unknown part
of our county's currency as the
cold cash is paid for everything.

Terry has advanced her sister
counties all along in an educa-
tional or road building line, not
to mention crop production and
many other lines, even if some
of them have the advantage of
railroad facilities.

The Struggle for Power.

The problems in the industrial horizon today are gigantic and their solution awaits the patriotic and careful consideration of men of noble mind and big hearts as they sit by the fire side.
