## A MAGNIFICENT GATHERING

**A Big Crowd From all Over the Country and a Grand Time for All, Were the Features of the 3rd Annual Reunion of Stonewall Jackson Camp, U. C. V.**

The 3rd Annual Reunion of the Stonewall Jackson Camp U. C. V., has gone into history. All the old soldiers from Terry county and several from a distance were in attendance, and they all seemed to enjoy themselves very much. For the transaction of their business, they had the use of the most shady nook of the court yard, and

while somewhat interrupted by constant talking toward the rear of the crowd, they got on very well and transacted their usual routine of business, a full report of which will appear in another place in the Herald.

As it was expected and earnestly hoped for, the crowds come, and not only was a big per cent of Terry county folks

present, but all the neighboring counties were well represented, especially Lubbock, Lynn, Dawson and Hockley, although there was quite a number from Gaines and Yoakum.

The goat roping contest which was to start at 10:30 a. m. was put underway, after some little delay in perfecting rules and securing names of those who wished to contest. There was no feature of the entire day of amusement that was such a favorite to all from the baby to the grandfathers as this old time sport of the cowboys. Many of them were almost experts when it came to putting the cord over the horns of the Texas steer, but fell short on the goat, be-

cause of his sudden decision to stop stock still when least expected, or whirl and go the other way. Another stunt was to dodge in among the crowd and crawl under a vehicle and of course were safe for the time being from the whirring rope. However there were some good throws and much laughter. Milt Good won first money and Claud Criswell won second. Time 30 seconds and 39 seconds.

By this time the noon hour had arrived and the crowd repaired to the grounds where a splendid barbecue was soon spread, and as on all other occasions, Brownfield fed the crowd to perfection and the people took enough barbecue

home with them for supper.

As usual the great American game-baseball-held the attention of the larger crowd in the afternoon at the ball grounds, and a fine game was played between the locals and Lubbock which resulted in a victory for the home team by a score of 5 to 4. A write up of the game appears elsewhere in this paper.

The bronco riding after the ball game was indeed fine and there were many good riders and several out law horses present, but the boys were masters in the saddle and rode them to a finish, Holt Simmons won first money and Claud Criswell second.

## WHITE BUFFALO

### Early Reminiscences of a Veteran Hunter and Soldier

Gomez, Texas, July 14, '11  
To The Herald—

As the prohibition question is settled, and I am getting sobered up a little, my mind runs back to the 70's when I was down in this country among the buffalo. While a subscriber to the Saint Louis Republic several years ago I think it was in the issue of August 30th, 1897, there was a piece signed "Forrest and Stream" giving an account of chasing the "only white buffalo" south of Red River in the fall of '75 while out on a hunt with the Blackfoot Indians, and how the writer's hopes of a white robe were brought to a sudden end by his horse putting his foot in a badger hole and turning a summersault and sending him over his head. Now if that were the only white buffalo and Mr. Forrest and Stream is still living, no doubt he would be glad to know what became of it. He said it was in a herd of about twelve, all running south.

While L. B. Anderson and A. L. Mott, alias "Long John," were camped on Willow Creek, a few miles south of Colorado River, and 20 or 25 miles north of Big Springs, Texas, the latter part of '77, Long John killed a white buffalo some 400 yards south of Willow Creek. It was still running south and the herd had increased to 25. Long John gave the robe to Mrs. Anderson and when we came to Fort Griffin in the spring of '77, Mrs. Anderson gave the robe to Mr. Conrad, the post trader.

Forrest and Stream may have been mistaken about that being the only white buffalo, as I understand that some one now owns a white robe at Snyder, Texas, and the buffalo was killed on Deep Creek, north of the Colorado River in 1876. We would be glad if some of the old buffalo hunters would tell through the Herald how many white buffalo were killed in Texas from '75 to '78, and as Mr. Conrad has been dead several years, I think, would be glad to know what became of the robe he had.

Anderson and Long I suppose got more hides than any other outfit on the range. Had 9,552 on their books for the winter of 1876. Long John, as we all knew him, and in fact but few knew him by any other name, was considered one of the best long range shots on the range, and was just as good with his six shooter. I do not know how many men he never killed, nor just how many he did kill. He was killed late in '78 just over in New Mexico, just west of Fort Elliot, Texas. He was only trying to see how close he could shoot to a Mexican's toes without hitting them, and after he

emptied his six shooter, the Mexican pulled his and killed the man that killed the only white buffalo.

I was with Co. S, 14th Ala., Regt., last two years of war and stacked arms at Appomattox.

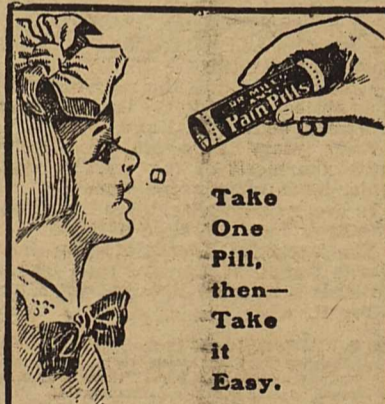

**LEGISLATIVE NEWS.**

**LETTER.**

Austin, Tex. Aug. 14th.—Our  
solons have been working as in-  
dustriously as a lot of boll weevils  
and if they keep at it they will be  
able to migrate by Aug. 31st.  
Considerable progress has been  
made on the Appropriation Bill  
and the House put a few spokes  
in the wheels of progress by  
making more liberal appropri-  
ations for the support of the  
Agricultural Department and to  
the A. & M. College. The Sen-  
ate has passed the Appropria-  
tion Bill and it will be ready for  
a free conference committee  
within a few days.

One of our solons who was evi-  
dently born a century ahead of  
his day suggested that a new  
mansion be built for the Governor  
but the prospect of an increase  
in the tax rate rose up like a  
sheeted ghost and frightened  
the members away. Our Legis-  
lators may build mansions in the  
skies, but they will never build  
anything on earth, unless they  
quit quibbling and get down to  
business.

The Federal Census Bureau  
announced last week that we  
have 146,745,000 acres of un-  
cultivated land and 285,216 Texas  
farmers who do not own their  
farms, but this information never  
phased the Legislature. Some  
folks are as simple minded as a  
June bug.

The Committee from the House  
and Senate appointed to inves-  
tigate the recent election has  
been examining the loaders on  
both sides of the issue and some  
flossy words have passed be-  
tween the witnesses, but many  
of the Antis refused to recognize  
the jurisdiction of the committee  
and the matter is to be tested in  
the Courts.

The Pros have had their inning  
and sprung some correspondence  
alleged to have been taken from  
the files of the Antileader which,  
according to the interpretation  
of the committee, pointed toward  
a Legislative jack pot, but a  
searching investigation of all  
members of the Legislature failed  
to reveal this mush talked-of  
utensil.

The Colquitt-Lightfoot con-  
troversy broke out afresh in the  
House and Senate when the item  
in the Appropriation Bill was  
reached providing for the main-  
tainance of the Attorney Gener-  
als Department. An amendment  
was offered which, in effect, pre-  
vented the Governor from veto-  
ing any section of the item. The  
amendment passed the House on  
a vote of 68 to 38. The measure  
also passed the Senate.

The Governor made it clear to  
the Legislature that he would  
sanction no Legislation until the  
subject regularly submitted  
were disposed of and he returned  
the resolution favoring the Legis-  
lation for the stricter regulation  
of the saloon traffic; endorsing

San Francisco for the Panama  
Canal Exposition; inviting the  
Advertising Clubs of America to  
hold their 1912 Convention in  
Dallas and inviting President  
Taft to visit Texas. The Legis-  
lature now has before it the  
Appropriation Bill, the re-dis-  
tricting of the State, the repeal  
of the Automatic Tax Law and  
fixing of the State ad valorem tax  
rate. The Appropriation Bill is  
the only measure submitted that  
has received serious consider-  
ation.

Politicians are as thick as black-  
berries in a fence corner and  
some of them are buzzing around  
like bumble bees in the summer  
time, while others float about  
like snow flakes in winter. Many  
of the big fellows who have been  
for years lounging around the  
porch of greatness and fre-  
quently the storm center in  
order to give the lightning a  
chance to strike them, but so far  
no casual tier have been reported.

The Southern Truck Growers'  
Associations which held its 6th  
Annual convention at Corpus  
Christi last week reported that  
more than a million and a quarter  
dollars worth of produce had  
been handled through the Associa-

tions over the State were  
favorable for a heady truck and  
fruit crop of all kinds.
