Geography; a Subject For Public Schools

Realizing that there is a national move on foot to change the old method of studying Geography to that of the new (which will be set out in this discussion) I ask that this be published in the Brownfield paper. This article is not for the teacher alone, but I hope that every father, mother and child will get from this the principles set forth.

The purpose of geography in the public school has been misused for these many years of

school development. Geography has never been taught as a science. Neither has the teacher used that natural art to develop the scientific phase of the subject. On the other hand, the pupils has been made a machine, and the subject has been given to him in a mechanical way. This is an injustice to the child, and by all means should cease. Until it does cease the teacher will continue to be an obstacle in the child's way to proper education.

Geography is taught to visualize the pursuits, activities, etc., of the world. We should study the earth in its relation to plant,

animal and man. More properly spoken, we should study the earth as the home of man. How he masters and utilizes the forces of nature for his own good, how it is adopted to his needs and wants, and the ways he overcomes obstacles, are all in the scope of geography.

Before I set forth the plan of study, I would ask the following questions: Can I see the surface of the earth? Does it stand out in all its features? Can you see the great natural forces at work? Do you understand the relation of the forces to each other? Do you see the vegetable life? Can

you visualize the great dense forest of South America where man has to cut his path with an axe, where vines interlace the mighty trees with an impassable net work, where the limbs of these mighty trees almost touch each other over the broad streams of that country? Do you know the the relation of this life to forces of fertility and heat, and moisture? Do you stop to think that the hardy fir tree grows on the top of the mountain to protect the under vegetation of the valley from the wind and cold? Do you see the animal life? Can you fix in your mind the ele-

phant, the lions and tigers among the dense jungles of India? Can you see the relation of animal to vegetable life; understand why certain kind of animals are never found outside of fixed boundaries and know the food supply, winds, insects, rainfall, etc, effect the flora and fauna of a country? Can you see the human life? Can you see the wide expanse of the white cotton fields and sugar plantations of the south, or the busy factories of the north? Can you understand the amusements, worship and art life of the different people of the world? Can you explain the presence of the

different cities of the world? If the answer of these questions are at tongues tip, then you have had the proper training in geography. If not, then, at least a part of your time spent on the subject has been lost.

Why do we teach geography? Two reasons are commonly given. 1. To train the memory 2nd to aid us in our travels, both of which are erroneous. Geography is not a subject to train the memory. Teachers who give this as a reason usually cram their students on states and their capitals, boundaries, important rivers, cities, etc., and in reality are not training memories

but forgetters. Geography is of little practical aid in traveling. We ask the railroad agents which train to take and where to change without any reference to the geography which we have studied.

Dr. Claxton, the Commissioner of Education sets out the following reasons for the study of Geography.

1. For culture, life is a failure without culture.
2. Gives the mind fulness.
3. Gives sympathy.
4. Gives us an understanding of people.
5. Shows our relation with other people.

6. For discipline, language and mathematics do not solve life's problem's. From geography we learn to observe closely, to judge correctly.

7. To think correctly, we can not follow the dication of the heart. The heart is for motive power, the head for guidance: 8. The suspended judgement, this is the greatest thing of all.

9. To deal with the unknown factors the care is illustrated in John McDonough who thought that New Orleans was destined to be the greatest city of the world, because it was at the mouth of the greatest river of the world. All his fortune was ex-

pected in buying up land around the city. John McDonough's prophesy didn't come true because he failed to deal with all the factors. He did not take into consideration the great network of railroads which was to make Chicago, almost at the source of the river. Venice is another case. At one time one of the greatest cities of Europe, now a second rate city, because of a change of steamship lines.

Helpfulness of geography in other subjects: History especially in the relief maps, to Literature, art, music, painting and architecture. The art of a people is the expression of their life. By the study of geography we learn

the style of architecture best suited to our locality. For instances a Swiss villa would be out of place on a western prairie.

From geography we learn the conditions of the earth, its relation to plant, animal and man, we learn the condition of of vegetation, thereby know what particular localities are best adapted to certain products and business concerns. Then it is a guide to financial investments. We learn from its study where our investments will bring the best returns; what regions of the world will return profits from investments and insure us against its loss.

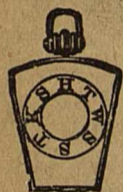

Only this week the subject of piping water to a convenient distance of the school building was being discussed by the trustees and Mr. M. V. Brownfield asked why they didn't pipe it into the building, and offered \$10 as a starter and within thirty minutes the required amount was raised.

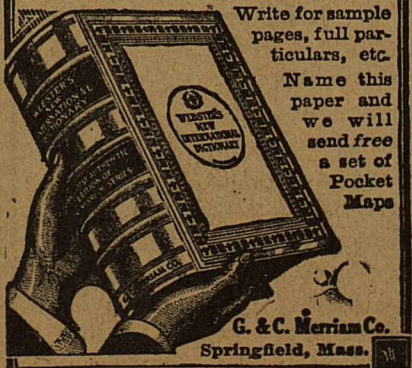

A Boosting Preacher

Rev. Artemus Jamerson, pastor of the Methodist Church at Gomez, was a pleasant caller at the Herald office last Saturday, and as usual was boosting Terry and her sister, Yoakum County.

This preacher has been about the two counties quite a great deal and has seen all kinds of farming and being a close observer, has kept a tab on each method and has found a balance.

He gave us a special pointer on one crop in Yoakum county, where the farmer went way down deep in mother earth and brought up a big fleet of clay and deposited it on top the sand. Results: There were no blowouts in that farmers field, and as the surface of the field was not constantly moving and not unnecessarily opening pores, there was a minimum evaporation. As a result that farmer is reaping a reward in bumper crops.

Word was received from Mrs. Horace Randal this week who left some two weeks ago to attend the bedside of her dying mother at Graham, Texas, to the effect that her mother died last Wednesday, Sept., 20th. Deceased was bitten by a spider some five months ago, which finally resulted in blood poison. Herald sincerely sympathizes with the grief stricken family.

Texas Farm Mortgages.

According to the Federal Census for 1910, we have 416,377 farms in Texas, and only 131,161 of these farms are owned by the farmers who operate them; we have 219,106 tenant farmers, 2,278 farms operated by managers and 63,832 farmers who partly own their farms.

There are only 32 per cent of the farmers of Texas who now own their farms, and in 1900 there were 38 per cent of our farmers who owned their farms, free from debt, showing a decrease of six per cent in the number of farmers who own their farms. In the absence of detailed reports, we can only speculate as to the causes that have led to this undesirable result.

We have opened up during the past decade 64,187 new farms and a portion of the increase in indebtedness will undoubtedly be found in this item. A large number of immigrant farmers have come to us and, as a rule, they buy farms and make only partial payments. The young farmer starting out in life may be justified in buying a farm on credit, but certainly there is no good business reason why the Texas farmers who have been farming for years should be in debt or why a tenant farmer should not, in the course of time own his farm and if such results cannot be reasonably hoped for, then there is something wrong with our economic system.

Uncle Sam has given us facts and figures, but he leaves us to solve our own problems. When we consider that 352,545 farmers have rented or have mortgaged farms, we get a conception of the tremendous importance of the problem. The question would seem to justify thoughtful consideration at the hands of our foremost economists, if indeed it does not warrant the attention of the Legislature.

Next to the importance of a bountiful Providence in getting the farmer out of debt, is cheap money. No farmer can pay 10 or 12 per cent interest and prosper and no other line of industry can thrive under such a handicap. Texas should secure access to the cheap money markets of the world by removing such legislative restrictions as may exist and pass such laws as will encourage the flow of cheap money into Texas

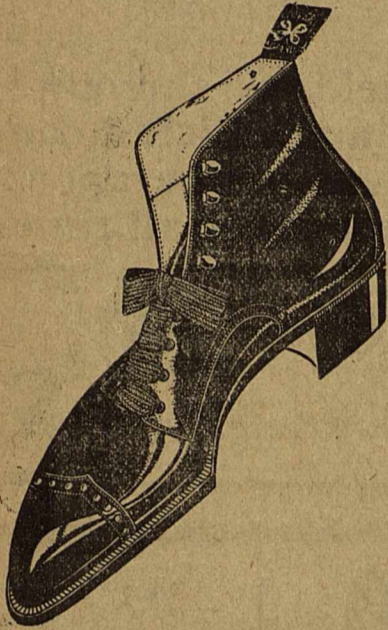

PROFITABLE HOG RAISING.

Selection and Care of the Brood Sow of Vital Importance.

The brood sow is the foundation of all profitable pork production, and her selection, care and management are the most important factors of the whole industry, writes Professor C. G. Wheeler in Kansas Farmer. It is a subject upon which volumes have been written, and in spite of this fact probably more hog growers fall in this point than in any other phase of the industry.

In making the selection of sows it must be borne in mind that we cannot expect uniformity in the pigs unless we have uniformity in the parents. A type must therefore be kept in mind and the selections, as far as possible, made to conform to this type. The sows should be broad between the eyes and of refined appearance about the face and neck. The shoulders should be smooth and deep. The body should be fairly long, with well sprung ribs, giving plenty of room for the vital organs. There should be no pinching in just back of the shoulders. The various other requirements of the market type must be followed—the well developed hams, broad, straight back and deep sides; short, straight legs should support the animal, with good width between them; the bone should not be too fine, and the feet

should begin as soon as the pigs are weaned, discarding those which have produced small litters or those which are such poor sucklers as to be unable to raise a good litter and the cross, nervous sows that are always getting excited and killing pigs. A tried brood sow that has fulfilled all the requirements is worth keeping for several years. In the selection of gilts study first the dams, giving preference to those from large, even litters from mothers having the desired characters. From the standpoint of fecundity it is well to look to the sire also, for a sire selected from a large litter will be more likely to transmit that character to his female offspring.

The mature sow makes by far the best brood sow. It would be better if the gilts were not bred until a year old. If the practice of breeding too young is continued the vigor and vitality of the herd will be greatly reduced after a few generations.

Mutton on the Farm.

With the sheep on the farm the problem of fresh meat for family use is partly solved. Mutton butchered on the farm can nearly always be used to advantage, and then you will know whether you are eating spring lamb or something else.

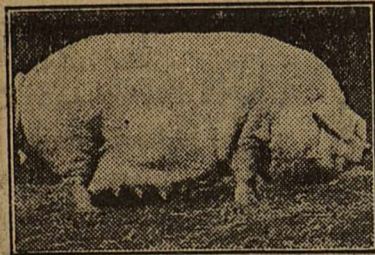

should be strong; weak pasterns are far too common in breeding stock and must be guarded against.

Selection of brood sows for the succeeding year should be made early. In fact, the most successful hog man will have this thought in mind continuously as he goes about among his pigs. The culling of the old sows
